RAILWAY EXHIBIT CAR DRAWS MANY VISITORS

School Children and Growups View Natural Wonders of Northern Minnesota.
Hundreds of school children and other hundreds of growups were given an opportunity to inspect a railway exhibit car Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning on the Chicago Great Western tracks in Carroll, showing the wonders of the North Lakes country of Minnesota, a large portion of which has been set aside by the government as a free "playground."
The car was an advertising proposition originating with H. Johnson, general passenger and freight agent, auditor and vice president of the Duluth & Iron Range railroad. It is being sent through Southern Minnesota, Iowa, and parts of Kansas and Nebraska.
The car was a veritable wonderland on wheels, showing exhibits of grain, vegetables and minerals of Northern Minnesota, containing more than 50 large scenic pictures, 14 large transparencies or pictures photographed in colors upon the windows, more than 60 specimens of fish-bearing animals, game birds and fish, and other interesting specimens of outdoor life.
Those accompanying the car were: Mr. Johnson, J. Moonan, of Ely, Minn.; G. Carlson, president of the Tower Commercial club; C. A. Dahlgren, supervisor of Superior national forest; H. N. Wheeler, United States government forestry department, of Denver; N. D. Cole, land department of the Duluth & Iron Range railroad; R. S. Forsy, publicity director, Duluth Daily Herald; Jack Bennett, electrician; and William Crocker, commercial agent.

COUNTRY CLUB BUYS GROUND FOR COURSE

Will Erect Club House on George Selzer Farm Two Miles East of Carroll.
According to Dr. G. L. Sherman, originator and promoter of the newly organized Carroll Country club, the club has contracted for the purchase of 40 acres of rolling land two miles east of Carroll on the Lincoln highway, this tract being the northeast portion of the George Selzer farm, and the construction of a club house will begin as soon as legal organization of the club can be completed and a contract awarded.
Dr. Sherman believes that when the "returns" are all in the club will have a membership of not less than 150. Each member is required to buy stock to the amount of \$100 and to pay a year's dues, \$32. A sufficient amount of money has been subscribed by the men composing the actual ownership of the property to insure the erection of the club house, laying out a golf course, providing water and other conveniences.
Dr. Sherman gave a dinner at Glidden Monday night to several citizens of that city who were anxious to hear the proposition explained. Quite a number of Glidden men are expected to become members of the club.

HOLD FUNERAL SERVICES FOR MRS. JULIA MILLER

Funeral services for Mrs. Julia Miller, whose death was mentioned in the last issue of The Times, were held at Sts. Peter and Paul's church Friday morning and burial was made in Sts. Peter and Paul's cemetery. Mrs. Miller became a Catholic a short time before her death, but in early life she had had training in the Catholic faith and for two years attended a convent.
Mrs. Miller, whose maiden name was Julia Baumgartner, was born in Wisconsin, August 26, 1850. She was married twice, her second husband, Stephan Miller, dying about 15 years ago. She had been in poor health for several months and entered the hospital a few days before her death. The neighbors of Mrs. Miller were untiring in their efforts to make her as comfortable as possible during her last illness, and devoted many hours in looking after her and her home.
