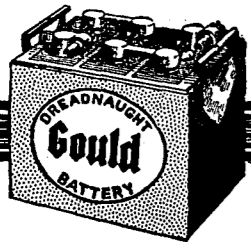

PLAN ORGANIZATION TO FINANCE COUNTRY CLUB

Dr. G. L. Sherman Gives Dinner for 30 Members—May Purchase Grounds, Erect Home.

Dr. G. L. Sherman, who has been working for several days to form an organization for the purpose of financing a country club, entertained 30 members of the embryo organization at a 6 o'clock dinner last evening at the Burke hotel. If present plans mature a tract of ground will be purchased immediately and a large club house constructed. The tract most favorably considered at this time is one of 40 acres known as the Heirs farm, situated just northwest of Carroll.

According to Dr. Sherman, it is planned to obtain a membership of at least 100, and the prospects for obtaining at least this number of members are very favorable.
