

Denison Halts Carroll, 6-1; Fort Dodge Raps Kuemper, 7-4

Tigers Get 2 Hits Off Soph Hurler

Strong Denison pitching snapped Carroll's two game win streak as the Monarchs posted a 6-1 high school baseball victory here Wednesday night.

Terry Stoll, a sophomore, made his first start of the season for the Monarchs and blanked the Tigers over the first four innings as he yielded two hits and fanned nine. Phil Den Adel singled in the second and Doug Ohde singled in the fourth.

Bob Lingle, the lanky Denison ace, came on in relief in the sixth and promptly gave up an earned run.

Tom Subbert led off with a walk against Lingle and successfully stole second and third and scored on a wild pitch.

Lingle worked out of that threat by getting Gary Sundermann on a pop-up and Denny Wilkins and Doug Ohde on strike-outs. In the seventh, Phil Den Adel led off for the Tigers and reached first on an infield error. He got to second on another error and stole third.

The Denison hurler buckled to the task and fanned the next two batters before issuing a walk to Steve Stroh who stole second unmolested. With run-

ners at second and third, Lingle cut down Tom Dryden on strikes to end the game.

Denison, making a strong move for contention in the West Central League standings, hiked the loop mark to 3-1 with the win over Carroll.

The Monarchs hopped on Gary Sundermann's offerings for three hits and a pair of runs in the first frame. Bob Powell led off with a single and Joel Franken followed with a one-ply knock. After Tom Neumann popped to short, Jim Lindstrom hit into a fielder's choice as Powell was cut down at third.

With two down, Mike Holihan doubled and both Franken and Lindstrom rode home on the blast. Sundermann then got Keith Kroeger on a pop to first to end the explosion.

The young Carroll hurler put the Monarchs down in one-two-three order in the second and pitched out of a bases loaded jam in the third. A single by Neumann and walks to Lindstrom and Holihan had loaded the sacks with two down. Sundermann fanned Kroeger to stop that threat.

The visitors stranded a runner at third in the fourth but plated two more in the fifth. Franken led off the fifth with a single and held when Neumann popped to first.

Lindstrom tripled to plate Franken and scored himself when the relay throw from the second baseman sailed over

third. He would have scored in any event because of subsequent happenings. After Holihan grounded to short, for the second out, Kroeger doubled.

Denison's final runs came in the top of the seventh. With one away, Lindstrom drew a pass off relief hurler Tom Dryden. Holihan kept the rally alive with a single. The runners moved up when Kroeger grounded from third to first and Vince Boldin's single plated Lindstrom and Holihan. Dryden then got John Sharp to pop out to end the inning.

In other league action, Breda shocked Jefferson, 10-8, by pinning the loss on Jefferson's ace, Tom Lawson, in extra innings. Lake City moved into the winner's circle with a 6-4 decision over Audubon. Perry cut down Manning, 10-0, in five frames as Stan Groot limited the Bulldogs to two hits and fanned eight.

Mays is Tired; Earns Rest by Belaboring Mets

Herman Franks would like to give Willie Mays a day off, but every time the San Francisco Giants' star earns a rest he gives his manager another reason for keeping him on the job.

Weary Willie, who came into New York two days ago nursing a heavy cold and a deflated batting average, worked over the Mets Wednesday night for the second straight game, driving in three runs with a single and his 18th homer in the Giants' 4-2 victory.

The previous night Mays had ended an 0-for-18 famine by doubling home two first-inning runs that stood up for a 2-1 decision over the National League tail-enders.

"I would like a real day off," the great center fielder said after that game. "I'd like the manager to tell me stay away from the park for one full day."

Franks has held Willie out of his starting line-up several times but invariably has had to call on the 34-year-old slugger as a pinch hitter or defensive replacement.

Wednesday's night's spurt gave Willie 41 RBI and a .324 batting mark for the season.

Kitt Leads 4 Hit Attack By Kuemper

FORT DODGE — The Kuemper Knights dropped their first game of the season, 7-4, in a non-league affair with Fort Dodge High School here Wednesday night.

The Dodgers hopped on Louie Billmeier, Kuemper soph, for a pair of runs in the first and added two more in the third and three in the fifth.

A base hit by "Zip" Hanson was followed by a pair of fielder's choices, an error and a passed ball. That accounted for two big runs before Billmeier extricated himself with a pair of strike-outs.

The Knights threatened in the second but got caught in a double play to wipe that out in a hurry.

Fort Dodge added two more runs in the third when Hanson hit again, with one away and stole second. After Bill Goodman flied to center, Joe Loomer plated Hanson with a single. John Brand followed with another hit and Loomer raced home.

The Knights bounced back in the fourth with a three run rally. Jim Irlmeier was hit by a pitch and Dave Staiert and Billmeier drew passes to load the sacks with one away.

Rollie Kitt singled two runs home, and Leo Collision followed suit with a single that plated the third.

The Dodgers regained a bulge in the fifth on successive hits by Goodman and Loomer, a walk to Brand, a base knock by Don Yeager and a Kuemper error. The net result was three more Dodger runs and a 7-3 lead.

Alert base-running by Kitt accounted for Kuemper's final run in the sixth. Rollie singled with one away and moved up with Denny Oxenford was hit by a pitch. When Tom Louis was safe at first on a dropped third strike, Kitt scored.

Next action for the Knights will be back in the West Central League when they trek to Breda on Friday to battle the Bobcats.

Twins' Jim Kaat Needs Seamstress

If there's one thing Jim Kaat needs, it's a seamstress.

Kaat, the Minnesota Twins ace left-hander, found out about a stitch in time saving two runs Wednesday night when he was ordered to make some alterations on his sweat shirt during the ninth inning and wound up losing to Cleveland 2-1.

The incident occurred with Kaat working on a three-hitter in the ninth and trying to protect a 1-0 lead over the Indians.

With a 2-1 count on Rocky Colavito, Cleveland Manager Birdie Tebbetts complained to plate umpire Bill Haller that Kaat had a hole in the left sleeve of his sweat shirt. The umpire ordered Kaat to the dug-out to have both sleeves shortened, eliminating the hole and keeping the sleeves the same length.

When Kaat returned to the mound he proceeded to walk Colavito on two more pitches and then was tagged for a game-winning homer by Max Alvis.

It was the second time this season Tebbetts had complained about Kaat's tailoring. On April 28 at Cleveland, Tebbetts complained in the first inning that one of Kaat's sleeves was longer than the other. The two sleeves were evened out in the dugout.

When Kaat returned that time, Alvis was the batter. Right. Alvis hit a homer.

Despite the loss, the American league-leading Twins remained 2 1/2 games in front of the Chicago White Sox, who lost to Boston 4-2. Elsewhere, Detroit downed the Los Angeles Angels 4-2, Washington edged Baltimore 3-2 in 10 innings and the New York Yankees whipped Kansas City 5-1.

Kaat, now 5-6, was involved in a scoreless duel with the Indians' Ralph Terry until the Twins pushed across a run in the eighth on a double by Jerry Kindall, Kaat's bunt and a wild

throw by catcher Joe Azcue on the play and a sacrifice fly by Zoilo Versalles.

Tebbetts then took a hand, apparently shaking up Kaat, and Terry finally posted the 100th victory of his career. Terry, now 5-3, had taken seven shots at No. 100.

Tony Horton, playing his second game since being recalled from Toronto, stroked three hits and drove in three runs for the Red Sox while Earl Wilson checked the White Sox on five hits.

Horton singled in two runs in a three-run third-inning uprising against starter Bruce Howard and hit a sacrifice fly in the sixth inning following Tony Conigliaro's triple.

Willie Horton drove in two runs for the Tigers with a double and Al Kaline hit a two-run homer, his 12th, in support of Hank Aguirre's five-hit pitching. Kaline finished the three-game series against the Angels with seven hits in nine at-bats, including three homers.

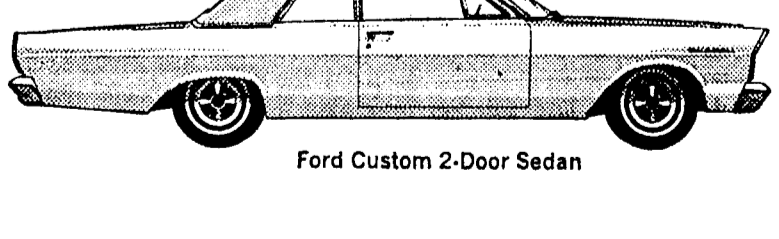
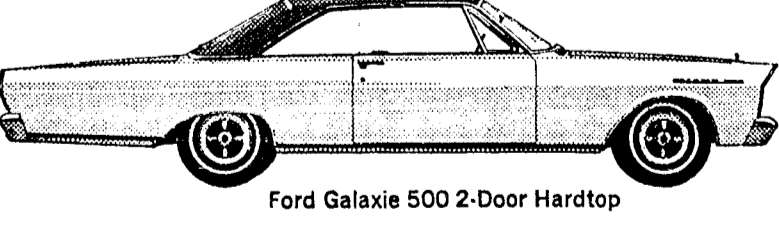
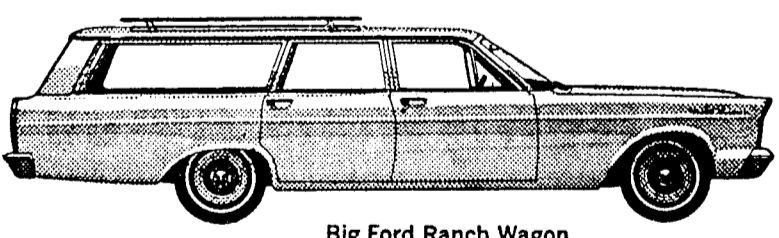
