

# Kuemper Wallops Carroll High, 9-0

The Kuemper Knights defeated Carroll High, 9-0, in a shower-shortened exhibition baseball game here Friday afternoon.

The game lasted only four innings and was halted by mutual consent about 6 p.m.

Kuemper then wound up the proceedings with a one-inning intra-squad test to give each player on the squad an opportunity to bat under game conditions.

The Knights jumped off to a two-run lead in the first but both runs were unearned and only one came in as a result of a base hit. Dave Schmitz walked with one away and stole second. Ernie Golwitzer fanned for the second out. Louis Billmeier was safe at first on an error Carroll's third baseman and Tiger hurler Gary Sundermann should have been out of the inning.

By this time Schmitz had moved to third and Billmeier stole second. Dave Staiert grounded to third and the third baseman was charged with another error when he failed to get Billmeier moving to third. Schmitz scored.

Larry Pirotte singled to right to plate Billmeier and Jim Irlmeier ended the frame with a whiff.

Carroll got Kuemper's starter, Staiert, in a jam in the bottom of the first but couldn't score. With one away, Tom Subbert singled to center. Denny Wilkins was safe on an error by the pitcher and Doug Ohde grounded to second as the runners moved up. Staiert extricated himself by striking out Sundermann.

Frankie Golwitzer led off the second with a single to center but was stranded as Scott Wille,

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Pete Kelly and Schmitz failed to move him around.

The Knights jumped on Sundermann for five runs off three hits and two errors in the third. Ernie Golwitzer singled to center and stole second. Billmeier popped to the catcher and Staiert drew a walk.

Pirotte grounded to third and another error was charged to the third baseman as Golwitzer made it safely to the bag. The bases were loaded and Irlmeier walked to force in a run.

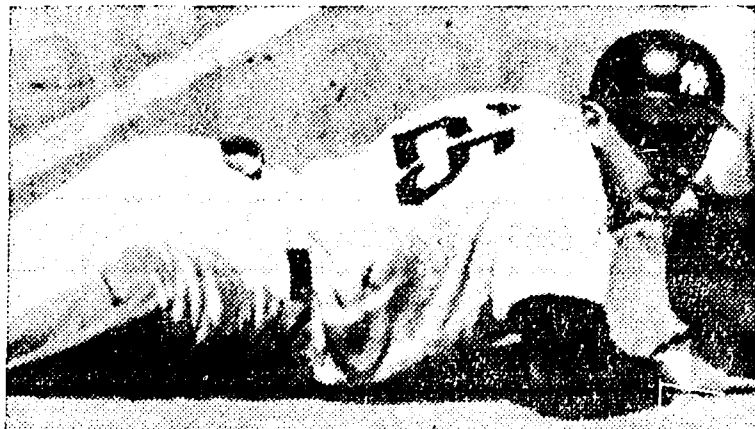
Frankie Golwitzer tripled into the right field corner to plate Staiert, Pirotte and Irlmeier and continued on home as the Carroll first baseman bobbled the relay.

Denny Oxenford came in as a pinch-hitter after Wille had fled to left and kept the inning alive with a double to center but Schmitz went down on strikes to end the inning.

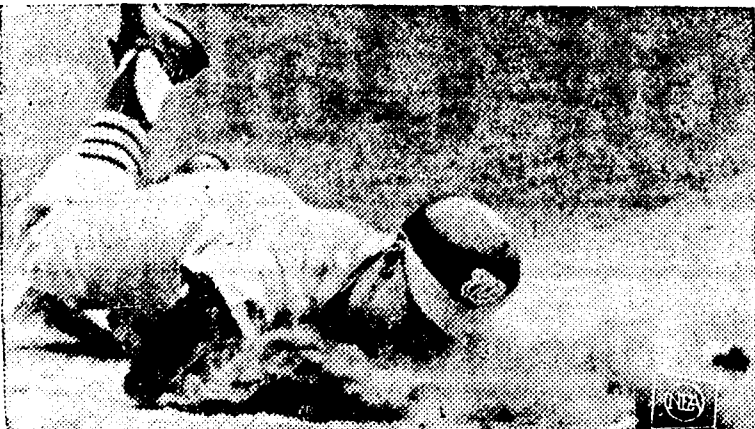
Carroll's second and final hit came in the bottom of the third when Mark Baudler led off with a single to left. Art Fisher fled to center, Subbert fanned, Wilkins walked, and Ohde went down on strikes to end the frame.

The Knights counted two more in the fourth. Ernie Golwitzer picked up his second hit with a grass-cutter to left, and Louie Billmeier drove him home with a long blow to left. Billmeier converted a double into a triple with alert base-running and scored easily on Pirotte's second hit.

Billmeier took over on the mound in the bottom of the fourth and set the Tigers down in order. Sundermann grounded to second and Tom Dryden and Steve Stroh were strike-out victims.

# Mighty Mouse Leads Tribe to 11-6 Win

Mighty Mouse to the rescue again — only this time swathed in bandages.

Mighty Mouse would be Vic Davalillo, the 5-foot-7, 150-pound package from Venezuela who became the first player in the majors to drive in six runs in a single game this season while

leading the Cleveland Indians to an 11-6 victory over Boston Friday night.

His left thumb, left hip and right ankle taped to ease a variety of bruises, the 25-year-old

pitcher turned outfielder lashed a homer, double and single, and moved to within one point of Detroit's Willie Horton in the American League batting race with a .364 average.

Not bad for a little guy whose main claim to fame three years ago was his collection of Superman, Superboy and Mighty Mouse comic books in Spanish. He brought his RBI total to 19

against the Red Sox, smacking a two-run double in the first inning, a two-run homer in the fifth and a two-run single in the eighth as the Indians extended their winning streak to five games.

Elsewhere in the American League, the Los Angeles Angels edged the Chicago White Sox 1-0, Minnesota defeated Kansas City 6-4, Baltimore whipped Detroit 5-2 and Washington downed the New York Yankees 5-4.

Davalillo's second homer of the season gave the Indians a 5-5 tie before they moved ahead on Rocky Colavito's two-run seventh inning homer off ace Red Sox reliever Dick Radatz.

Besides Colavito and Davalillo, Chuck Hinton and Al Luplow homered for Cleveland while Tony Conigliaro and Ed Bresoud connected for Boston.

Tommy John of the White Sox pitched no-hit ball for six innings but wound up the loser despite a three-hitter when the Angels scored in the eighth inning on singles by Lou Clinton and Bobby Knoop around a sacrifice.

The loss was John's first in four decisions. Fred Newman, 5-1, won his fifth in a row with Bob Lee's ninth inning relief help.

Unbeaten Camilo Pascual won his fifth game for the Twins despite considerable wildness and Jim Gentile's ninth homer. Pascual walked five, hit one batter and needed relief help from Bill Pleis and Al Worthington.

Tony Oliva's run-producing single was the key hit in a two-run fifth that pushed Minnesota out front before Zoilo Versalles followed Pascual's sixth inning single with a homer that put it out of the A's reach.

Milt Pappas, also unbeaten, also won his fifth and also needed ninth inning relief help as the Orioles defeated the Tigers.

## Giants Rap Astros, 8-1, In Houston

All Ron Herbel needed was a roof over his head.

Once he got it, he erupted with the first hit of his major league career and helped San Francisco clobber Houston 8-1 Friday night.

Herbel was a surprise starter for the Giants in the Astro dome, replacing Juan Marichal, who was suffering with a cold. He responded both with the hit and his first complete game of the season.

The 27-year-old right-hander never had a hit since joining the Giants late in 1963.

Coming to bat in the second inning after Hal Lanier had tripled Friday night, Herbel lashed a single to right field off Don Nottebart, and the Giants

were on their way to a four-run inning.

Herbel evened his record at 3-3 and reduced his earned-run average to 2.86.

In other games, Pittsburgh beat Milwaukee 6-1, St. Louis edged New York 5-4, Cincinnati nipped Philadelphia 6-5 and Chicago trimmed Los Angeles 4-3.

Besides his own support, Herbel relied on Willie McCovey's ninth home run, which took care of the other three runs in the second inning. McCovey also drove in a fourth-inning run with one of his two singles. John Bateman homered for the Astros in the eighth.

The Pirates ended an eight-game losing streak while Vern Law ended a five-game losing string. Law, gaining his first triumph, needed relief help from Al McBean because of a pulled groin muscle. Bill Mazeroski led the attack against the Braves, driving in three runs with a single, double and sacrifice fly.

The Mets had a 4-3 victory until shortstop Roy McMillan threw past first base attempting to complete a game ending double play. Julian Javier and Lou Brock raced home on the play, though, and the Cardinals won instead. Ron Swoboda had given New York a 4-2 lead with a two-run homer in the seventh.

Pinson and John Edwards' solo blast, both in the sixth inning, powered the Reds past the Phillies. Cincinnati, however, needed Pinson's run-scoring single in the seventh, because Richie Allen belted his third hit, a homer, in the ninth.

Dick Ellsworth gave up 14 hits, but the Cubs still defeated the Dodgers. Ron Santo cracked a solo homer in the fourth, and Vic Roznovsky connected with one on in the sixth.

## Liston Favored To Regain Title

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Sonny Liston is an 8-5 favorite to regain the heavyweight boxing title when he fights champion Cassius Clay next Tuesday, according to Las Vegas bookmakers.

The bout will be held in Lewiston, Maine.

Liston lost the title to Clay in Miami Beach in February 1964 when he failed to answer the bell for the seventh round because of a shoulder injury.

## Challenger Predicts a Short Fight

LEWISTON, Maine (AP) —

"If he comes to fight, it'll be a short one," challenger Sonny Liston said of Cassius Clay.

"If he comes to run, I'll have to track him."

The man with the brooding face and a history of trouble admits he's known gnawing loneliness since he lost the heavyweight championship to Clay a year ago February in Miami, and is determined to redeem himself in their rematch Tuesday. He discussed his feelings at his camp at nearby Poland Spring Friday.

"Clay will open the door and I'll get to him," Liston said. "I got to get to him. I let down a lot of people. I never realized how much I could hurt inside doing that . . ."

There are plenty of other things Sonny could worry about.

Liston, however, is thinking only of proving to "everyone I'm not a quitter and the only reason I didn't come out for the seventh round in Miami was because I was in such great pain and couldn't throw my left hand."

"The only way I can convince people is to beat Clay this time. I've been thinking over the mistakes I made the first fight. There will be absolutely no excuses this time. My shoulder is healed. I won't say what round I'll knock him out. But I'll get him sometime."

The camp buzzed with a report the New York State Police had informed their Massachusetts counterparts that a carload of armed men, members of the Black Muslim faith of which Clay is a member, may be heading for the fight.

Local police — there will be 300 added to the normal 70-man force for the bout — expressed confidence they can handle any and all eventualities. Liston was asked if he were apprehensive over the reports.

Kuemper's bench strength was good, as expected, as Coach Tighe fielded a club without two regulars (Leo Collison and Rollie Kitt) and still was able to platoon with two players for each spot.

Carroll used only nine players in the game and the adequacy of replacements could not be determined because they didn't get a chance to show their wares.

One thing is evident from the first clash of the season. The Knights have a good all-around club with sufficient pitching and will be a definite contender for the league crown. The Tigers

So as far as the record is concerned, the 9-0 Kuemper triumph does not constitute a win for the Lancers nor does the setback represent a loss for the Tigers.

However, the players involved and the sprinkling of fans in the stands were aware that the two teams did engage in a practice game and that the veteran Knights won it going away.

This calls to mind the two-quarter exhibition, clinic basketball test between the two schools last fall. It didn't count in the records but there is hardly a sports fan in the entire area who didn't know that the Tigers outscored the Knights in that fray. It was a subject of conversation throughout the cage season and will not be forgotten.

Back to the baseball action, it was mutually agreed the two clubs would get together for a contest under game conditions and the results were gratifying. Suspected weaknesses in Carroll's initial venture into baseball in recent decades were apparent, as expected, along with some unexpected short-comings.

Kuemper's hitting was not as lusty as expected and starting pitcher Dave Staiert's fast ball was not moving as well as expected.

The Knights indicated they will be a running team, and the Tigers discovered they may have problems with base thefts by opposing clubs.

Carroll's over-all hitting prowess, as expected, was nothing to write home about at this stage.

Kuemper will be back in action again on Monday when the Knights host Fort Dodge (St. Edmund) in a double header starting at 6:30 p.m. The first game will be a five-inning affair and the second will go seven innings.

Coach Tighe will have his line-up strengthened, starting next week, as Rollie Kitt, pitcher-short stop, and Leo Collison, third baseman, join the club.

Machine-buffed tires were barred from the Indianapolis Motor Speedway by the U.S. Auto Club, but Goodyear said it had enough unbuffed tires for practice, qualifications and the race.

Several drivers practiced on the new tires Friday with no difficulties reported.

Three dozen cars are eligible to try today and Sunday to make the race line-up. There are only a dozen vacancies.

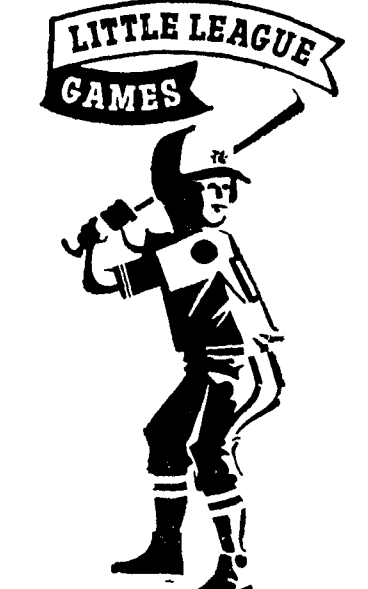
The list shrank Friday when Ralph Liguori of Tampa, Fla., crashed in the No. 99 Demler Offenhausen roadster four minutes before closing time at the Speedway.

Liguori, 038, a veteran of the stock car circuit but a rookie at the speedway, suffered a severe whiplash injury. Doctors said there appeared to be no fracture or nerve injury, but they kept him at Methodist Hospital for further checks. The car was damaged extensively.

A familiar figure at the speedway, but a stranger in the second weekend of qualifications, was Roger Ward of Indianapolis, two-time winner of the race.

Ward, who has qualified for 14 straight years, made it on the first day the last seven years. He used two of his allotted three attempts last Saturday and can try only once more.
