# Kuemper Beats Carroll, 8-3

Brilliant relief pitching by Louie Billmeier, sophomore fast-baller, and lusty, late-inning extra base hitting by Ernie Golwitzer and Tom Lewis highlighted Kuemper's 8-3 win over Carroll in high school baseball here Monday night.

Billmeier came in relief of starter Rollie Kitt with one down, the score tied at 3-3, the

lead run in scoring position at second and clean-up hitter Doug Ohde at the plate in the fifth inning.

Tom Subbert's single, a perfectly executed sacrifice by Gary Sundermann and a double by Denny Wilkins had netted

the Tigers a tie score. When Kitt was derrickd in favor of Billmeier, Tom Lewis came in to do the catching for the Knights.

An ill-fated base theft attempt helped doom the Tigers. While Billmeier was pitching to Ohde, Wilkins broke for third base and was thrown out by Lewis. That erased the lead run

from scoring position and resulted in two outs.

Ohde coaxed a pass from Billmeier and became the final Carroll base-runner as the big right-hander struck out each batter he faced the rest of the way. In two and two-thirds innings, Billmeier fanned seven, walked one and allowed no hits.

Gary Sundermann's curves kept the Knights under control through the first half of the game and he should have been out of number of predicaments with no damage done.

In the first inning, Dave Schmitz tripled with one away and scored on the pitcher's overthrow at first on Ernie Golwitzer's tap. Billmeier followed with a whiff which should have been the third out. The Knights picked up another run in the top of the third when Dave Staiert was safe on a two-base error with one away, went to third on a wild pitch and scored on Jim Irlmeier's sacrifice fly.

Kuemper's defense sprung a leak in the bottom of the third and the Tigers tied the score at 2-2. After Subbert walked, Sundermann was safe on a fielder's choice. Wilkins was thrown out at first as the base runner moved up.

Doug Ohde's single to right plated Sundermann and an error on the throw allowed the batter to reach second. The Lance second-baseman booted Phil DenAdel's grounder and Ohde raced to the plate.

Kuemper took the lead in the top of the fifth when Billmeier was safe on an error at short and stole second. Dave Staiert and Irlmeier each popped out, but Leo Collison kept the rally alive with a single. Scott Wille singled Billmeier home, but Kitt forced Collison to end the threat.

The Knights wrapped it up in the sixth. Frankie Golwitzer drew a pass with one away and rode home on Ernie Golwitzer's ringing triple to deep center field. A wild pitch let Ernie Golwitzer cruise home.

In the final frame, Denny Henkenius singled and scored on a triple to deep center by Lewis. Dave Neary was safe on an error and scored on a two-base error in center field on Frankie Golwitzer's single.

The Knights out-hit the Tigers, 11-4, as they won their second league game in a row and tied with Manning for the top spot in the West Central League.

Next action for Kuemper will be at Lake City on Tuesday at 8 p.m.

# Stu Miller Stops Twins For 4th Win

Stu Miller has started on his fourth straight shutout in slightly more than a month while Dick Radatz has begun his second within a week.

But for piecing together a spectacular achievement, it would be difficult to top Howie Koplitz, who has won seven games without a defeat in the past five years.

Koplitz posted his second triumph of 1965 as Washington defeated Kansas City in the first game of a 5-2, 5-1 doubleheader sweep Monday.

The 27-year-old right-hander first reached the majors with Detroit in 1961, winning two games in four appearances. The next season, he pitched in 10 games with the Tigers, gaining three victories.

A two-year exile in such minor league vocations as Syracuse, Tacoma and Toronto followed, and Koplitz didn't get another crack at big-league hitters until the Senators purchased him from Hawaii earlier this season.

American League hitters, meanwhile, are beginning to wonder whether there's any chance of exiling Miller and Radatz.

Miller scored his shutout to 29 scoreless innings in 15 relief appearances in Baltimore's 5-4 second-game triumph over Minnesota. The Twins won the opener 6-0.

The 37-year-old relief ace stopped the Twins on two hits in two innings and earned his fourth victory against two defeats. He hasn't given up a run since April 24, reducing his earned-run average from 7.88 to 1.70.

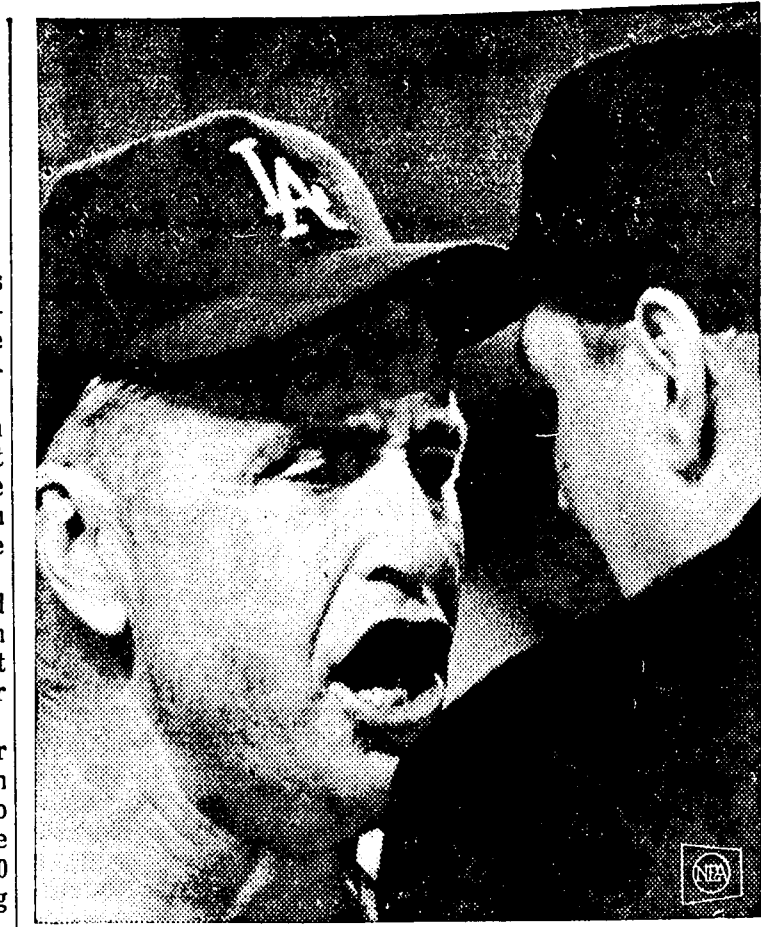
Trailing Miller by three relief shutouts is Radatz, who didn't permit a hit in 3 2-3 innings as Boston blanked Los Angeles 3-0. The Angels took the first game 5-3.

Radatz, who horrendous 7.43 ERA, hasn't allowed a run in 10 2-3 innings, relieving in five of Boston's last six games. In that time, he has given up only four hits and has struck out 18. He has lowered his ERA to 5.21. Elsewhere in the AL, Chicago nipped Cleveland 4-3 in 10 innings before losing 4-3 and Detroit defeated New York 5-1 after dropping a 3-1 decision.

# Giants Stretch Win Streak to 5 in Row

Gaylord Perry, best known for the pitch he made against a dugout wall, has found he's more effective aiming at the catcher.

The 26-year-old San Francisco right-hander strayed off target in the first inning Monday when he allowed two hits, but he settled down quickly and held St. Louis hitless over the final 8 2-3 innings as the Giants stretched their winning streak to five games with a 4-1 triumph.

It was the best performance of the season for Perry, who put on quite an act last year when he precipitated the zany case of the many-splintered bat.

In a game at Houston, he was tagged for a game-winning hit by Nellie Fox and immediately stormed off the mound, picked up Fox' bat and threw it against the concrete dugout.

The concrete dugout didn't give. The bat did. And Perry was billed by the Houston club for the cost of the bat, \$2.98.

Apparently, he's learned his lesson well. Instead of splintering bats, he's taken to stilling them. In his last three starts, he has allowed only five runs for a 1.80 earned-run average while bringing his record to 5-3 and moving in behind Juan Mari-

chal as a stopper for the Giants.

The Giants' victory moved them to within three games of the National League-leading Los Angeles Dodgers, who split a doubleheader with Cincinnati, winning the opener 4-3 before Joey Jay ended the Reds' six-game losing streak with a three-hit, 6-1 nightcap triumph.

# Roeth Wins \$500 With 700 Singles

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP)—Ken Roeth of Dubuque was \$500 richer Tuesday as a result of the best series of his bowling career, a 700 in the regular singles division of the American Bowling Congress tournament.

Roeth, 28, who bowled his three games April 26, was still on top Monday when the ABC tournament ended a 68-day run here.

The Dubuque draftsman had never rolled better than a 663 in league or tournaments before his appearance here.

In addition to his cash prize, he won a trip to Guatemala City for the 1965 Inter-American Bowling Tourney.

None of the 1964 champions repeated in this year's ABC competition.

# Flying Scot Wins 500 With Record Time in Lotus-Ford

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—The bagpipers played long and loudly for Scot Jimmy Clark's record-smashing big Indianapolis 500-mile auto-race triumph in a safe, sane but mechanically fatal Memorial Day motor classic.

It was the first victory by a foreigner since the 1916 race was won by Italy's Dario Resta. However, pacans also sounded for the greatest showing by rookie drivers, who won five of the first nine places in Monday's methodical grind which bowled out ailing machines like ten-pins.

The new breed of rear-engine speedsters, 27 in all against four one-time Offenhauser roadsters and two ill-fated Novis, was far less durable than the new breed of drivers.

Twenty-two cars were knocked out of the race, most of them before it was half finished, leaving only 11 running when Clark won with a record average of 150.686 m.p.h., about five miles ahead of runner-up Parnell Jones of Torrance Calif., the 1963 champion.

Nine of 17 rear-engine Fords

and nine of 10 rear-engine Offys limped off the track. Two of the four Offy roadsters finished, but neither Novi did.

Third was Italian-born rookie Mario Andretti, now from Nazareth, Pa., who as well as Clark and Jones shattered the former record of 147.35 m.p.h. set by 1964 winner A. J. Foyt, of Houston, Tex.

Luckless Foyt, Monday's pole driver and also 1961 champion, virtually handed the race to Clark when the transmission failed on his modified Lotus-Ford after battling the Scot closely for 290 miles.

Then, all the slick-driving bachelor farmer from Duns, Scotland, had to do was keep his snarling green and yellow Lotus-Ford on the beam for a no-contest triumph.

That set off a screeching band of bagpipers, led by two tethered Scottish terriers.

The last half of the 200 whirls around the 2 1/2-mile Speedway found the more than 220,000 fans applauding the tight second-place battle between Jones and Andretti.

With a cupful of fuel in his tank, Jones loafed under the checkered flag with a 149.2 m.p.h. average for second and the 25-year-old Andretti, also driving a rear-engine Ford, was third with 149.1 m.p.h.

Jones, who loaded only 25 gallons in his 55-gallon-capacity car in his last pit stop, ran out of fuel on the post-finish lap.

Behind Andretti, other placing rookies were Gordon Johncock, Hastings, Mich., fifth; Mickey Rupp, Mansfield, Ohio, sixth; Bobby Johns, Miami, Fla., eighth; and Al Unser, Albuquerque, N.M., ninth.

Fourth went to Al Miller, "sophomore" driver from Stansish, Mich., fifth; Don Branson, Champaign, Ill., making his seventh start, was seventh; Eddie Johnson, Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, 12-year veteran, 10th; and Len Sutton, Portland, Ore., starting a seventh time, was 11th in the only surviving entry.

Clark gets his slice of about a \$600,000 purse at tonight's victory party. Last year, winner Foyt's share was \$153,650, based on a total prize melon of \$506,625.
