

# Carroll Bombs Manning; Kuemper Clips Eagles

## Tigers Run Wild In 21-10 Triumph

A fifth inning rally featuring three consecutive doubles hit by Denny Wilkins, Tom Subbert, and Phil Den Adel opened Carroll High's second baseball season on a bright note as they defeated the Manning Bulldogs

The West Central High School League Baseball game was called to a close by the umpires late in the fifth inning as the relentless Tigers built up a ten point lead.

The visiting Manning Bulldogs hopped to an early lead in the first inning racking up six runs. Charles Hill led off with a hard single to left. Dennis Ohde popped up to third baseman, Subbert. Pratt and Hargens hit back to back doubles followed by Nick Dappen who took a free ride to first after being hit by a wild pitch. Darrell Ohde loaded the bases with a walk.

This set the stage for Dave Schroeder who stepped up and slammed a long triple to left center field. Schroeder stole home and Dave Rowedder grounded out to retire the side. The Tigers went scoreless in the first inning but managed to pick up one run in the second as Bruce Hall singled Den Adel in from second base.

The Bulldogs added two more runs to their total in the second but the Tigers roared into action in the third to off-set that with four runs. Gary Sundermann knocked a double to left center to lead the attack. Wilkins and Subbert hit consecutive triples and southpaw Pat Hensel chipped in with another double.

Four errors by the Manning infield granted the Carroll club five more runs while Manning was held to two.

The fifth and final frame took on the air of highway robbery as the spirited Tigers stole ten bases and picked up eleven runs. Jim Schrad led off with a single to left, but was put out on a force at third.

Then Wilkins, Subbert, and Den Adel got into the act with successive doubles. Hall took a base on balls and was advanced by Marc Baudler's short tap to left. Scott Richardson reached first on a fielders choice and was followed by Schrad with a base on balls. Bruns reached first on an error by the shortstop. The next three Carroll batters were walked by Dave Schroeder, the fourth Manning pitcher during the evening and the game was ended in compliance with the ten-run rule.

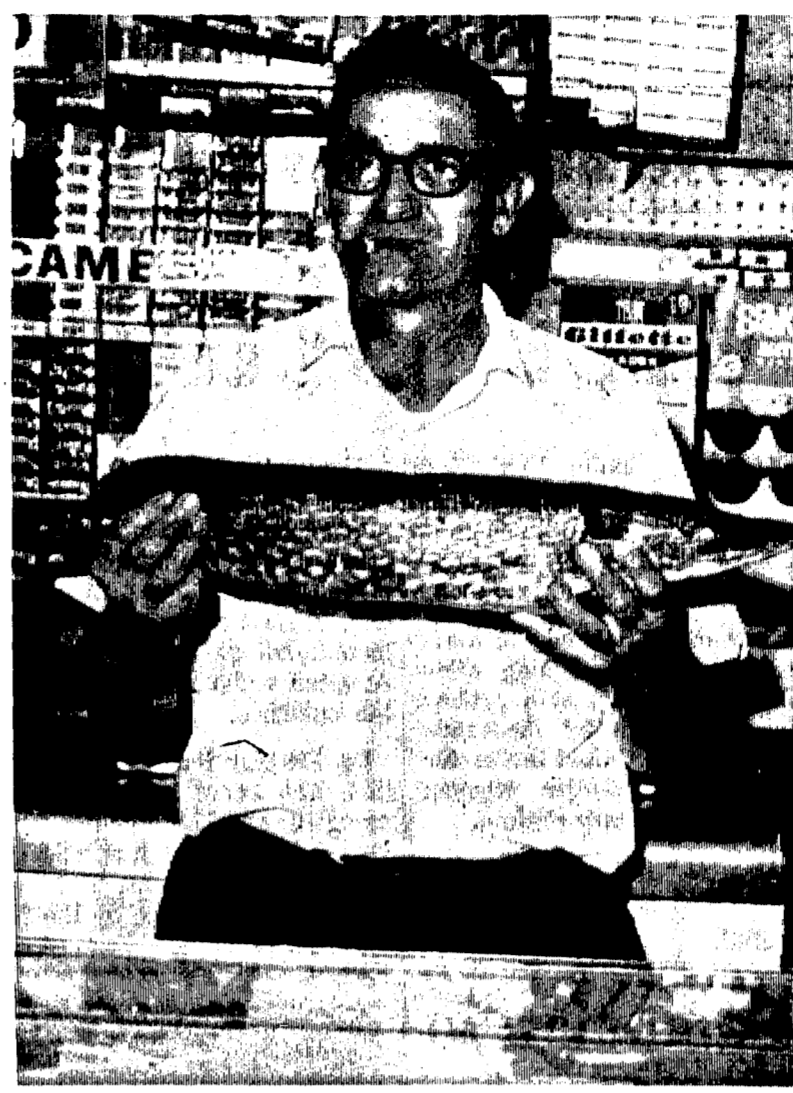

Sam McDowell wasn't able to continue. Tom Kelley wasn't ready to take over. And Cleveland Manager Birdie Tebbetts wasn't about to give in. But Kelley came in, Tebbetts

gave in and the Detroit Tigers caved in.

The Indians crushed the Tigers 13-2 Wednesday night despite the early departure of southpaw ace McDowell and Tebbetts' protest over reliever Kelley's lack of warm-up time.

## Discord on Twins Club, Scribe Says

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP)—A St. Paul Pioneer Press - Dispatch baseball writer who has covered the defending American League champion Twins since they moved to Minnesota in 1961 wrote Wednesday that there is discord on the club and a few fines may be in order.

The umpires called him back, however, and Tebbetts lodged his protest.

"They told me there was a memo put out this winter which said a pitcher could not warm up in the bullpen while he was in the game and his team was batting," the Cleveland manager said afterward. "I never saw it. I can't see any reason for it if there is such a rule."

Arno Goethel, writing a column in Wednesday's St. Paul Dispatch which he labeled "an open letter to Sam Mele, manager of the slipping, skidding, sliding Minnesota Twins," wrote:

The victory increased the Indians' American League lead to 3 1/2 games over the second place Tigers.

At New York, Mickey Mantle hit two homers in one game for the first time since August, 1964, driving in five runs and powering the Yankees to an 11-6 victory over California.

"Why don't you slap a few fines on some of these guys who have been making the same mistakes three or four times?"

"That 11-2 shellacking by the Red Sox Tuesday night was your worst defeat of the season, but that doesn't matter. What really hurts is that your guys gave it away, Sam, and from the way it looks they didn't seem to give a gosh whooper that they were so humiliated.

"It makes me wonder, Sam—are the players getting away from you?"

"There have been some mutterings of late, and they're not pleasant.

Goethel ended by writing: "There's discord on your ball club Sam. I wouldn't say it's dissension because everybody just seems to be waiting for you to snap out of your silence and take charge again."

Elsewhere, Minnesota beat Boston 7-5 on Jimmie Hall's two-run homer in the 10th, snapping the Red Sox' winning streak at six; Chicago edged Baltimore 3-2 and Kansas City trimmed Washington 3-1.

## Billmeier Stops Lake City Rally

LAKE CITY — Louie Billmeier's clutch relief pitching in the sixth inning and booming double in the seventh highlighted Kuemper High's second win of the season in a 7-2 decision over Lake City here Wednesday night.

Ricky Keat started on the mound for the Knights and protected a three-run first inning cushion through five innings.

A base hit by Bob Lee, a walk to Brian Fell and another base hit by Bill Goodyear got Keat in hot water in the sixth. The Kuemper starter got Denny Newland on a pop to first, but Charles Redenius was safe on a fielder's choice.

With the tie run at third and the go-ahead run at first, Coach Dick Tighe waved Billmeier to the mound.

The Kuemper fire-baller threw six pitches and retired Duane Hoover and Tim Willis on strike-outs.

Jim Middendorf took over the mound chores for the Knights in the seventh and held the Eagles hitless.

Elsewhere around the West Central League, Carroll walloped Manning by a 21-1 count, and Breda shaded Perry by a 4-2 score.

The previously scheduled Jefferson at Denison game will be played Thursday night instead of Wednesday as listed on the original schedule.

A full slate of action is on top for Friday with Audubon at Manning for a 6 p.m. encounter and 8 p.m. games set for Lake City at Breda, Carroll at Jefferson and Denison at Kuemper.

The league-leading Knights picked up three runs against Lake City in the first frame. Frankie Golwitzer was safe on an outfield error and Dave Schmitz followed with a single.

After Schmitz stole second, Kent Casey was safe on an error and he went to second on a passed ball. Billmeier singled and the Knights were ahead 3-0 with none down.

Keat fanned for the first out, but Larry Pirotte was hit by a pitch. A passed ball advanced the two base-runners, but they would have moved up in any event as Tom Louis drew a pass. Then Scott Wille grounded to short for an inning-ending double play.

Golwitzer singled in the second but was stranded at second. He ignited the seventh inning explosion with a single and theft of second. An overthrow at second enabled the Lancer speedster to come all the way home.

After Schmitz fanned, Casey singled and stole second. Billmeier's double scored Casey. Keat kept the inning alive with a single and a pair of passed balls emptied the bases.

Mike Neary grounded out for the second out, but Schroeder and Henkenius walked before Larry Schmitz filed to center to end the uprising.

Keat gave up a single to Lee in the first and then retired the next three batters in order.

Lee singled again with two down in the third, but Fell filed to center to end that threat. In

the sixth, Duane Hoover was safe on an error but the next three batters went down in order.

Middendorf faced only three batters in the bottom of the seventh. He got two on fly balls to the outfield and fanned a pinch-hitter.

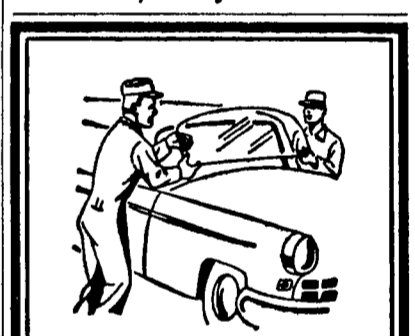
