# Knights Whip Perry, 3-0

Back to back doubles by Larry Pirotte and Tom Louis in the fourth inning gave Kuemper's Louie Billmeier all the cushion he needed in a 3-0 victory over Perry in a West Central High School League baseball game here Tuesday night.

Kuemper's fire-balling right-hander scattered three hits over the seven inning route and struck out 12 as the Knights opened the season on a winning note.

The winning run scored in the fourth frame after two outs. Pirotte lofted a sky-high blast into left field and the ball dropped safely for a two-bagger.

Louis was next up and he batted a fly into left field that also dropped safely. Pirotte streaked home from second and

the Knights were in front, 1-0. Louis kept Perry in hot water as he stole third, but Scott Wille went down on strikes to end the rally.

Stan Grout, the Perry hurler, ran into control trouble in the fifth inning and the Knights padded the margin with two more.

Denny Bellinghausen led off the bottom of the fifth with a walk and went to second on an errant pick-off throw. Frankie Golwitzer drew a pass and a passed ball let both runners advance. Then Dave Schmitz walked to load the sacks with none down.

Kent Casey was hit by a pitch and that forced Bellinghausen in with run number two.

Louie Billmeier was out on a high pop to short center field, but Ricky Keat was safe on an infield shot to first as Golwitzer beat the throw to the plate on a force attempt and the Knights had their third run.

Pirotte and Louis were strike-out victims to end the uprising. Kuemper squandered an opportunity to get in front in the first when three walks and an infield single failed to produce

a tally. Golwitzer led with a walk and went to second on a passed ball. Schmitz followed with a walk, but Golwitzer was caught going to third and Casey fanned for the second out. After Billmeier walked, Keat beat out an infield tap to load the sacks. Pirotte then grounded out from third to first for the third out.

Perry went hitless until the third when Earl Bragg singled to right but was forced at second on a sacrifice bunt. Billmeier then fanned the next two batters to quell the threat.

Steve Payton singled to left with one out in the fourth, but Bob Strait grounded to second and Golwitzer turned the grounder into a quick double play.

Larry Bandy bounced a single over a second base with two down in the sixth, but Denny Pennington grounded out to end that rally.

Perry got Payton on via an error in the seventh and he went to second on another error. After Strait fanned, Dan Diddy fled to right and the runner went to third after the catch. Then Grout ended the game when he went down on strikes.

Next action for the Knights will be at Lake City tonight.

## Twins Lose To Red Sox; Tribe Splits

By The Associated Press "Everything is perfect—good defense, good hitting and good pitching."

Sounds like the manager of one of baseball's upper-echelon teams, right? Actually, those are the words of Billy Herman, whose Boston Red Sox are only 1½ games and four days removed from the American League cellar.

But Herman's Red Sox are streaking. They stormed to their sixth straight victory Tuesday night, crushing the Minnesota Twins 11-2 with a 16-hit barrage that included homers by Carl Yastrzemski, Jim Gosger and Tony Conigliaro, plus four doubles.

In addition to the lusty hitting, Boston had the good pitching, by Jose Santiago and Dick Radatz, and the good defense, a zero in the error column.

At the other end of the ladder, front-running Cleveland and second-place Detroit split a doubleheader Tuesday night. The Tigers won the opener 7-6 on Don Wert's eighth-inning single, while the Indians took the second game 2-0 as Luis Tiant pitched his fourth shutout of the year.

Also in the AL—California beat the Yankees 4-2 with a four-run fifth inning, Baltimore downed the Chicago White Sox 6-4 behind the key hitting of Brooks Robinson and Boog Powell, and Don Lock's two-run pinch homer with two out in the bottom of the ninth lifted Washington over the Athletics 2-1.

Tiant, whose four victories have all been shutouts, blanked the Tigers on four hits in the second game at Detroit. Chuck Hinton singled across an unearned run against loser Hank Aguirre in the fifth and Leon Wagner homered for Cleveland's second run in the eighth.

The Tigers, down 5-0 in the opener, came back and eventually settled it in the eighth when Wert singled in Ray Oyler. Norm Cash hit two homers for Detroit and Jim Northrup one. Rocky Colavito, Duke Sims and Fred Whitfield homered for Cleveland.

Joe Adcock's bases-loaded double climaxed the Angels' winning rally against the Yanks. Trailing 2-0 going into the fifth, California got its four runs off rookie reliever Dooley Womack on a walk, Womack's error, Willie Smith's pinch double, a fielder's choice and Adcock's two-run hit.

### Cassius Clay Tours Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Cassius Clay, who made a last minute decision against returning to the United States, began a five-day tour of Egypt today. "Here I feel at home, here among my Moslem brothers," Clay told a huge, wildly enthusiastic crowd that turned out to meet him in the early morning hours at Cairo's Tarmac Airport.

Clay is a convert to the Black Muslims, which adheres to the Islamic religion, and prefers his Black Muslim name of Muhammad Ali. He accepted the invitation from Egypt's United Arab Republic Higher Council for Islamic Affairs.

The invitation and acceptance came only a few hours before Clay was to board an airliner for his return to the United States after the successful defense of his world heavyweight championship against Henry Cooper in London last Saturday.

Clay's immediate plans are for a rest and a visit to several points of interest, including the Aswan High Dam.

## 7 Rookies Win Berths in 500 Race

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — Seven rookie drivers — considered veterans outside Indianapolis — will crack the big time in the 50th 500-mile classic May 30.

"You're nobody until you've run this joint," said Mel Kenyon of Davenport, Iowa. "It really makes you a somebody."

The last time a rookie hit the winner's circle at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway was 1927 when George Souders of Lafayette, Ind., piloted a Duesenberg at 97-plus miles per hour.

Two first-timers this season, Graham Hill of London and Jackie Stewart of Dunbarton, Scotland, are leading drivers on the World Grand Prix circuit.

Besides these and Kenyon, the rookies are Gary Congdon, Garden Grove, Calif.; Cale Yarborough, Charlotte, N.C.; Carl Williams, Kansas City, Mo., and Larry Dickson, Marietta, Ohio.

Stewart, 26, is the hottest driver on the international circuit. Last Sunday he won the season's first Grand Prix race at Monaco and during the first three months of 1966 he won four of eight events to capture the Tasman Championship to Australia and New Zealand.

Stewart, who drives a Lola-Ford, lives 100 miles from Scot Jimmy Clark, who captured the 1965 world road racing crown and is the defending champion at Indianapolis.

Hill, 36, earned the Grand Prix title in 1962 and since has placed second three straight years. The veteran, who started as a mechanic and free lance driver, also will pilot a Lola-Ford in the 500.

Kenyon was burned badly and lost his left hand in a crash at Langhorne, Pa., last June. He missed the rest of the season, but this year his qualification speed of 158.555 m.p.h. put him in the sixth of 11 starting rows.

Kenyon feels the only way his Gerhard-Offenhauser can win at Indianapolis is "to try to outlast the Fords." Next to Kenyon will be Congdon in a Huffaker-Offenhauser.

Williams spun his Garhardt-Ford three times before he finally qualified the car last Saturday. He was unhurt.

Yarborough is better known on the stock car circuit where he was runner-up last February in the Daytona 500.


