

# Keat Hits 3-Run Homer— Knights Rap Perry, 10-1

PERRY — Rick Keat's three-run homer in the first inning gave Louie Billmeier all the cushion he needed as the Kuemper Knights racked up their ninth straight win on the season with a 10-1 romp past Perry here Monday night.

Keat picked on a Larry Bandy pitch with two down and two aboard in the first and rapped the ball over the center field fence.

The unnerved Perry hurler promptly issued a pass to Mike Neary, and Scott Willie doubled to left to plate Neary as the Knights jumped out to a 4-0 lead in the top of the first frame.

Kuemper maintained a safe edge thereafter and stayed safely atop the West Central League standings with an 8-0 loop mark.

Bandy had control trouble in the top of the second and was yanked in favor of Stan Grout. The Bluejay starter left the mound after issuing successive passes to Tom Louis, Frankie Golwitzer and Dave Schmitz.

Grout came on strong and whiffed Billmeier for the first out. Larry Pirotte grounded to short and was safe on a fielder's choice as the shortstop made a belated attempt to get Golwitzer going to third as Louis scored.

That left the sacks full, but Keat was victimized on strikes for the second out.

Grout then walked Neary to force in another run but got

out of the inning by fanning Willie.

The Knights broke through for three more in the third frame. Louis singled behind third with one away and went to second on an error.

Golwitzer drilled a double to the left corner and Louis scurried home.

Schmitz coaxed a pass to put runners on first and second with one down, and Billmeier sacrificed to put the base runners in scoring position.

Pirotte came through with a single to left and two more runs crossed the plate. Then Keat flied to right to end the frame.

Grout held the Knights at bay in the fourth and then gave way to Denny Pennington at the start of the fifth. It was three up and three down against the new hurler in that frame.

Kuemper counted one run and squandered another away in the sixth. Keat singled to left with one down and Neary duplicated.

Keat raced to third and Neary steamed into second. Coach Dick Tighe called time and inserted Doug Heithoff as a pinch-runner for Neary. When play was resumed, Pennington toed the rubber and then turned and tossed to second base where Heithoff was standing on the bag. The base umpire signalled the second out and said that Keat, who was perched on third, was out at second for failing to touch that base on his dash from first.

Wille singled to left to score Heithoff, and Kent Casey followed with a single through the infield before Louis grounded out to retire the side.

Perry got a runner on in the first when Steve Payton was hit by a pitch, and had another on the sacks in the second when Dave Coburn lived on an error. In the third, Pennington

walked with two down, moved up when Payton was safe on an error and scored on Bob Strait's single to center.

Billmeier set the Bluejays down in order in the fourth, fifth and sixth.

Perry's second hit came with two down in the seventh when pinch-hitter Earl Bragg singled through the box, but he was picked off at first to end the game.

## Clemente's Bat Shocks Bill McCool

Now that National League pitchers have turned Donn Clendenon's power off, they've turned Roberto Clemente's on.

And it's proved a shocking experience for them.

Billy McCool was the latest victim of the Clemente explosion: as the Pittsburgh star lashed a three-run homer that gave the Pirates a 5-4 victory over Cincinnati Monday night.

The homer was the ninth for the flashy right fielder this season, just one short of his total last year, and the runs batted in gave him 36 for the season, fifth best in the league and more than half as many as the 65 he had in 1965.

Why the sudden power surge for Clemente who has built three batting championships on hits that stay inside the park?

"Clendenon isn't like he was last year," the 31-year-old Puerto Rican explained after helping the Reds to their 14th loss in 18 games. "If he comes back again, I'll start punching the bag again. But I've been taking a good cut and swinging hard."

Clendenon was the Pirates' second leading slugger last year but has gotten off to a slow start with only four homers and 22 runs driven in.

Clemente, meanwhile, is headed for his best slugging year. In 11 major league seasons he's averaged 11 homers and 66 RBI while batting .309.

This season is just slightly more than one-third gone, and he's rapidly approaching those figures as well as hitting .330, the second best average in the league.

His latest effort was a dramatic performance. McCool had just relieved starter Joey Jay in the eighth inning, coming on with two men aboard and the Reds leading 4-2.

McCool worked the count to 1-2 before Clemente, a right-handed batter, drove the ball into the upper right field stands.

Elsewhere in the NL, San Francisco crushed Chicago 8-0, Houston trimmed Los Angeles 9-6 in 11 innings, Philadelphia swept Atlanta 6-2 and 6-4 and New York defeated St. Louis 5-2 before bowing 4-1.

Before Clemente's homer, the Reds had built their 4-2 lead on Vada Pinson's three-run homer in the fourth inning and his run-scoring single in the fifth.

Gaylord Perry, making his first start in 17 days, allowed the Cubs only three hits in seven innings. He was supported by San Francisco's six-run third, three of the runs coming on Ollie Brown's double.

Joe Morgan tripled across two runs and scored on Sonny Jackson's single in the 11th inning for Houston's triumph over Los Angeles. The Astros had exploded for six runs in the eighth inning, three on Felix Mantilla's homer, and a 6-4 lead, but the Dodgers tied it on Tommy Davis' homer and Willie Davis' run-producing single.

Larry Jackson pitched a four-hitter in Philadelphia's opening-game victory over Atlanta. Clay Dalrymple sparked the Phillies' attack with a homer and a single, driving in three runs.

## Audubon's Hits Trip Tigers, 6-3

A cluster of extra base hits in the first two frames gave the Audubon Wheelers an early cushion as they pulled out a 6-3 win over the Carroll Tigers in a West Central League baseball game here Monday.

Francis Madsen and Eddie Hansen unloaded back-to-back doubles off Carroll's Gary Sundermann to lead off the first. After fanning Jim Crouse, Sundermann walked Frank Nelsen and yielded a single to Haskins and the Wheelers were in front by a 3-0 count.

Audubon got the cushion runs in the second when Kirk McLaughlin singled with one down and rode home on Madsen's second double. Hansen fanned, but Crouse lived on an error as Madsen scored.

The Tigers threatened in the

bottom of the second when Denny Wilkins led off with a single. Phil Den Adel went down on strikes, but Paul Bruns walked. Mickey Everett rapped into a fielder's choice and Jim Schrad grounded to short to end the threat.

Carroll broke through against McLaughlin in the third after Sundermann quelled any further Wheeler uprising by striking out the side in the top of the frame.

Scott Richardson ignited the third inning Carroll rally when he led off with a single. Tom Subbert followed suit. Bruce Hall rapped to short and Richardson was out at third. Sundermann singled to plate Subbert, but Hall was caught at third for the second out and Wilkins popped to third for the

third out. The battling Bengals struck back for a nother run in the fourth. Bruns singled with one down and Jim Schrad sent him to third with a two-out safety. Richardson's second hit scored Bruns, but Subbert flied out to end the rally.

Neither team dented the plate again until the seventh. Audubon counted in the top of the last frame when Nelsen tripled with two down and sped home when Haskins was safe on an error. Sundermann then quenched that fire when he made Dave Campbell his 12th strike-out victim.

The Tigers fought back in the bottom of the seventh when Subbert led off with a single and Marc Baudler came through with a single. Sundermann rapped into a fielder's choice as Subbert scored, and Wilkins kept the rally alive with a single. Denny Vetter was out at first, but Bruns walked before Everett's fly to right ended the inning.
