

Tigers Oust Audubon; Glidden Bombs Manning

Sundermann Halts Wheelers in Relief

Gary Sundermann's one-hit, shut-out relief pitching over a five-inning route and some sterling defensive play highlighted Carroll High's 5-4 decision over Audubon in first round sectional tournament play here Wednesday night.

Carroll's come-from-behind victory vaulted the Tigers into a cross-town showdown with tournament favorite Kuemper in second round action here Friday night at 8 p.m.

Denny Wilkins started on the mound for Carroll and was charged with four runs in a big second-inning explosion by the Wheelers.

When Sundermann came on in the third, his curve baffled the visitors as he faced only two over the minimum of batters for five frames. The lone safety yielded by the Tiger ace was a two-out infield single by

At that juncture, Audubon changed pitchers again as McLaughlin came back to the hill.

Audubon changed hurlers in the third when Kirk McLaughlin, starter, shifted to short and Francis Madsen took over on the mound.

Scott Richardson greeted Madsen with the first of three hits the Tiger receiver collected, and Dave Henning drew a pass before Jim Schrad whiffed.

Phil DenAdel tripped to left to plate Richardson and Henning and was thrown out at the plate when Wilkins hit into a fielder's choice. But the collision between DenAdel and Audubon's Mike Garber sidelined the Wheeler receiver with a facial injury.

The Tigers took the lead in the fifth frame through errors on the Audubon infield and pitcher Kirk McLaughlin. Schrad led off for Carroll with

a walk. Den Adel lived on an error by the shortstop and both runners advanced on a pass ball. McLaughlin hurled a wild pitch over his catcher's head letting Schrad in safe and putting Den Adel in scoring position. With no outs against the Tigers, Wilkins grounded to short and DenAdel raced home with the winning run.

The Tigers threatened again in the sixth with three hits but couldn't manage to push a score over the plate. Richardson was thrown out at the plate while trying to score from second when a grounder by Tom Jones squirted past the third baseman into left field. After Schrad singled to right, Jones got caught in a hot box from home to third to second to end the threat.

Carroll will put a 6-11 season record on the line here Friday against Kuemper's 16-1 crew.

Birds Split, Boog Powell Ties Record

Boog Powell had his fancy hitting clothes on, but the Cinderella guy turned out to be Larry Stahl, who brought the Kansas City A's home just before the clock struck midnight.

Powell, Baltimore's slugging first baseman who has been on a hitting tear since the beginning of May, tied the American League record by driving in 11 runs in the Orioles' twilight doubleheader against the A's Wednesday night.

But the best the Orioles could do was gain a split, winning the opener 11-0 before Kansas City took the nightcap 9-8 when Stahl slipped into the glass slipper and doubled home the winning run in the 11th inning — just before a midnight curfew would have halted play.

However, neither Stahl's key hit nor the A's sudden role as spoilers — they've won nine of their last 15 against front-running Baltimore, Detroit and Cleveland — could overshadow the one-man show put on by Powell.

The 24-year-old left-handed swinger drove in four runs in the opener with a three-run double and a sacrifice fly, then pushed into high gear in the nightcap and added seven runs batted in with a grand slam homer, a two-run homer and a run-producing double.

That tied the AL record for RBIs in a twinbill, accomplished previously only by Earl Averill of Cleveland in 1930 and Jim Tabor of Boston in 1939. It also lifted Powell's average to .301 and raised his RBI total to 66 — one short of the major league leader, teammate Brooks Robinson.

Elsewhere, California edged Detroit 1-0 in 10 innings, Minnesota nipped Cleveland 4-3, Washington swept the Chicago White Sox 4-3 and 3-2 and Boston took two from the New York Yankees 5-3 and 5-4.

Powell's efforts in the first game backed Steve Barber's five-hit pitching, but he couldn't do it alone in the nightcap. The A's trailed 6-2, then moved ahead with a six-run rally in the eighth.

Powell pulled Baltimore back into a tie with a two-run homer with two out in the ninth before the A's finally won it in the 11th when Roger Repoz and Stahl doubled. It was Stahl's fourth RBI of the game.

Angels starter George Brunet allowed only two hits and Boston's Earl Wilson just four through nine innings. California finally broke through against reliever Larry Sherry in the 10th on singles by Tom Satriano and Bob Rodgers around a sacrifice.

Glidden-Ralston bombed Manning, 12-2, in a six-inning first round victory in the sectional baseball tournament here Wednesday.

The Wildcats, with a current 4-3 record on the season will clash with Ar-We-Va here Friday at 6:30 p.m. in second round tournament action.

Manning's luckless Bulldogs went down to their 17th consecutive setback without a win as Glidden-Ralston combined 10 hits, seven Manning errors and nine stolen bases for the 10-run margin in six frames.

Tom Squires worked the first three frames for the Wildcats and surrendered one of the three hits the Bulldogs collected. Dick Tryon took over the mound and chokes in the fourth and held Manning at bay the rest of the way.

After Squires walked Dave Kuhn to start the game, Dale Moeller singled to left and Kuhn was cut down trying to get to third. Kelly Pratt fled to center, and Moeller was caught off the bag at second to end the initial threat.

The Wildcats got a pair in the first when Squires led off with a walk and stole second. Steve Thornton singled to right and Squires went to third. Thornton stole second while Ed Remsburg was fanning.

Ron Breidert singled past short and the Wildcats had a 2-0 lead.

Glidden-Ralston's winning margin came in the second when Dave Tuttle ignited a one-out rally with a single past third. A stolen base put Tuttle in position to score and a single to center by Squires plated the winning run.

After Thornton lined out to left, Remsburg singled to left and Breidert tripled to center. A wild pitch let Breidert in and the Wildcats had a 6-0 lead after two frames.

Osteen's Hit Nets Hurler 1-0 Victory

Take a strong arm, add lots of pressure and a portion of self-help and you have a Los Angeles Dodger pitcher. Claude Osteen fits the formula perfectly.

Osteen won his sixth game by a one-run margin this season Wednesday night — 1-0 against Cincinnati — and he drove in the run.

In bringing his record to 11-6, Osteen allowed the Reds just three hits and went 2-for-2 to raise his average to .261 with 12 hits in 46 at bats. One of his two singles drove home John Kennedy in the eighth inning. In two of his other one-run decisions, Osteen who now has three RBI, scored the winning run.

"This is the best first half I've ever had," Osteen said after gaining his second shutout of the year. "I've always pitched a lot better the second half of the season than I did the first."

Last year at this time Osteen was only 6-10, but he closed with a rush to finish at 15-15.

Coming through with key hits is nothing new for Los Angeles pitchers. Don Drysdale has done it many times in his career, so has Sandy Koufax, a notoriously poor hitter, and rookie Don Sutton is catching on fast. Sutton is hitting .271.

Willie Mays smashed a three-run homer to give San Francisco a 3-2 victory over St. Louis and kept the Giants 1½ games ahead of second place Pittsburgh, which trounced Chicago 10-5 for its 10th victory in the last 13 games.

The New York Mets beat Philadelphia 7-5 and Atlanta walloped Houston 8-1 in other National League games.

Mays' 524th career homer and 19th this season, came off relief pitcher Don Dennis with two men out in the eighth. It left him 10 behind Jimmy Foxx who hit 534 homers, second only to Babe Ruth's 714.

Roberto Clemente doubled home two runs and drove in three more with his 13th homer in the Pirates' victory. Donn Clendenon also got his 13th homer and fourth in as many games for the Pirates, a two-run shot.

Jack Hamilton picked up his eighth save in his last 11 appearances for New York. Ed Kranepool, knocked in three runs with a pair of doubles for the Mets, who exploded for four runs in the seventh inning. Philie pitcher Jim Bunning was forced to leave the game in the sixth with a pulled groin muscle. He has an 11-1 record against the Mets.

Joe Torre hit his 21st homer and an RBI single and Mack Jones homered and tripled for the Braves. Don Schwall, making his first start since being traded to Atlanta by Pittsburgh, worked 6 1-3 innings for the victory.
