

Billmeier Fans 16 Monarchs—

Kuemper 4, Denison 0

Pitching is the name of the game, and Kuemper's Louie Billmeier proved the point as he shut out Denison, 4-0, on a two-hitter here Friday night.

It was the third straight win without a setback for the league leading Kuemper Knights in the West Central prep loop.

Billmeier baffled Denison with a dazzling mixture of fast balls and sharp breaking

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curves. The only batters who solved his delivery were Jim Lindstrom with a sharp single to center in the sixth and Dick Neumann with a perfect bunt down the third base line in the seventh.

The Knights hopped on lanky Bob Lingle for a pair of

runs in the first frame when Larry Pirotte unloaded a two-out double to left-center.

Frankie Golwitzer ignited the first inning rally with a single to center and stole second. Dave Schmitz fanned, but Kent Casey drew a pass and the two runners moved up on a wild pitch.

Ricky Keat fled to short center and Golwitzer was forced to hold at third. Pirotte drilled a pitch between left and center to plate both Golwitzer and Casey. Pirotte was stranded at second when Scott Wille grounded out.

Denison loaded the bases in the second with two down but couldn't score. Neumann was safe on an error to start the rally, and he stole second. Then Don Simon drew a pass. A passed ball advanced those two runners and then Dennis Rowedder walked to load the bases.

With Bob Lingle at the plate, another pitch eluded catcher Tom Louis, but he quickly retrieved and tossed to Billmeier covering at the plate to get Neumann trying to score.

Billmeier got his strike-out pitch working again from the third inning on and actually struck out the side in the fourth, fifth and seventh frames as he finished with 16 whiffs.

The Monarchs got a runner to third in the fifth when Simon walked, went to second on a passed ball and to third on a wild pitch. But Rowedder, Lingle and Howie Henningsen each went down on strikes.

The Knights padded the margin in the fifth with two down when Golwitzer singled to center and continued to second on an error by the center-fielder. Golwitzer stole third while Dave Schmitz was in the process of getting a base on balls. Then Schmitz stole second.

Kent Casey lofted a high fly to short right, and Craig Johnson, the Monarch right fielder, lost the ball in the sky. The fly

dropped in for a double to plate Golwitzer and Schmitz.

In the previous inning, Johnson robbed Pirotte of an extra base blow when he sped to deep right center and speared Pirotte's long blast in the vines covering the fence.

Denison threatened in the sixth when Lindstrom singled with one away and stole second. After John Curnyn fanned, Mike Miller drew a walk. On the fourth ball, Lindstrom broke for third and Louis threw the runner out for the third out.

In the top of the seventh, Neumann led off with the bunt hit and got to second when a pick-off throw got away from the first baseman. He went to third on a passed ball but was stranded as Billmeier fanned Simon, Rowedder and Lingle in order.

Phils Club Sadecki as Giants Skid

When the San Francisco Giants acquired pitcher Ray Sadecki three weeks ago, Vice President Chub Feney said:

"He should help us for a long time."
Someone, however, better start helping Sadecki.

The 25-year-old left-hander was battered from the mound for the fourth straight time since coming to the Giants as the Philadelphia Phillies crushed the Giants 9-2 Friday night.

In four starts with the Giants he has lasted only 13 1/3 innings while allowing 11 runs for an astronomical 7.62 earned run average.

His latest effort ended before he could get anyone out in the fifth inning. The Phillies already had scored three runs in the first four innings, and when John Callison and Dick Groat singled in the fifth, Manager Herman Franks decided Sadecki needed help.

The Giants may need some, too. They've won only five of their last 13 games, and they must do without their No. 2 pitcher, Gaylord Perry, for the next 15 days. Perry, suffering from a sore ankle, was placed on the disabled list Friday night.

In other National League games, Los Angeles blanked New York 4-0, Pittsburgh whipped Houston 6-0, Cincinnati edged St. Louis 6-5 and Atlanta defeated Chicago 5-3.

Claude Osteen broke a personal four-game losing streak, gaining his first victory in a month with a three-hitter over the Mets. Los Angeles scored all four of its runs in the sixth inning with the help of errors by Bill Murphy, Ken Boyer and Dick Stuart.

Bob Veale and Pete Mikkelsen combined for a five-hitter against Houston. Bill Mazerowski and Willie Stargell led the Pittsburgh attack, each hitting a homer and driving in two runs.

Cincinnati's first three hits off St. Louis' Art Mahaffey were homers — two by Vada Pinson and one by Tommy Helms. Jim Maloney needed help from Billy McCool in the seventh but still gained his fifth victory without a defeat.

Atlanta outthrewed the Cubs as Hank Aaron, Joe Torre and Mack Jones connected in support of Wade Blasingame. Aaron's homer was his 16th. Billy Williams and Ron Santo homered for Chicago.

Carroll Leads Southwest Loop

Carroll's softball team took over last place in the Southwest Iowa League with a 9-6 win over Elk Horn on Friday. Halbur was edged by Atlantic, 1-0, in Friday action and dropped into second place.

The Carroll club is undefeated in loop action with three straight wins. Bill Schaefer hit a two-run homer in the seventh frame to highlight the Carroll attack.

The Tigers matched the Rams in hits at five apiece but couldn't manage to send a run across the plate. Jefferson played an errorless game while the Tigers picked up four errors.

It was three up, three down for the Tigers in the top of the first as lead-off man, Jim Schrad went down swinging, Paul Bruns grounded to the pitcher, and Gary Sundermann popped to the shortstop.

John Raaz led off for the Rams with a line drive through the keyhole for a single. Raaz stole second and Dave Rooker grounded out to the shortstop, Gary Sundermann. Raaz made it home as Roger Carlson slammed a liner to center field. Carlson was thrown out attempting to reach second and Bob Beyer grounded out to second to retire the side.

Nearly 300,000 to See 500 Mile Race

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — One of sports' biggest crowds began filling Indianapolis hostilities and side streets today, chattering about what makes Mario Andretti move so fast and whether he can do it for 500 miles Monday.

A poll of 68 auto race writers established the little Italian-born driver as the favorite, a status he already enjoyed on the basis of a record-breaking qualification at 165.899 miles an hour for the Golden Anniversary 500-mile auto race.

There were plenty of skeptics, however. Against Andretti's 20 votes, defending champion Jimmy Clark of Scotland received 16; Dan Gurney, Californian who races on the Grand Prix circuit, 11; two-time winner A. J. Foyt of Houston, 7; and former winner Parnelli Jones, 7.

Lloyd Ruby, Wichita Falls, Tex., and Gordon Johncock, Hastings, Mich., received two votes each, and Cale Yarborough, Charlotte, N.C., one.

Fans, possibly 300,000 on hand or en route, hoped for a better contest than the 1965 race. Clark and Foyt were the only leaders, and Clark had no opposition after the former American champion's engine failed.

But it could be another runaway if Andretti's rebuilt Brabham-Ford, third last year, holds together. The odds were heavy against the rookies, who included England's Graham Hill, a former world road racing champion; Jackie Stewart of Scotland, the Monaco Grand Prix winner last Sunday; and Americans Yarborough, Gary Congdon, Garden Grove, Calif.; Mel Kenyon, Davenport, Iowa; and Larry Dickson, Marietta, Ohio.

No first-time starter has won the race since George Souders of Lafayette, Ind., in 1927. Roger Ward, Indianapolis, is the only former winner in the field besides Clark, Foyt and Jones. He and Jones will be driving cars with supercharged Offenhauser engines, new power plants which haven't been as effective in practice as the special Fords pushing Andretti, Clark, Gurney and most of the other high ranking drivers.

The switch to rear-engine cars, started three years ago, lacked reaching 100 per cent by a single vehicle. Veteran Bobby Grim of Indianapolis made the lineup with a front engine car, but it has a new turbocharged Offenhauser which performed beautifully in the trials.

Speedway veterans expect the winner to ride behind one of the bigger, unsupercharged Ford racing engines like the one that powered Clark's lotus last year. The field, with 22 Fords and 11 Offys, averaged a record 160.251 m.p.h. in the trials against 153.774 last year. Clark's 1965 record for the full race was 150.686.

Driver Chuck Rodee of Indianapolis was killed in a qualifying run May 14, bringing to 57 the number of persons who have been killed at the speedway since it opened in 1909 with a series of short races. The 500 was inaugurated in 1911, with Ray Harroun, still an interested spectator at the age of 87, winning at 74.59 m.p.h.

Yankees Rap Sox; Twins Slump, 5-4

Remember how sad the New York Yankees looked about a month ago?

They weren't hitting, they weren't fielding and they weren't winning. Then along came new Manager Ralph Houk and presto, the Yankees were winners again.

Well, a replica of the old edition showed up at Yankee Stadium Friday night. Happily for Houk, they were wearing Chicago White Sox uniforms.

The sagging Sox sank past the surging Yankees into eighth place in the American League as Mel Stottlemyre pitched a three-hitter for a 4-1 New York triumph.

It was the 10th loss in the last 12 games for Chicago, and they made it easy for New York with three errors helping the Yankees to two unearned runs.

That was all Stottlemyre needed. He set the Sox down on just three singles and retired 19 in a row at one stretch. He lost his shutout with two out in the ninth when Roy White dropped a fly ball for a two-base error. Elsewhere in the American

League Friday night, Cleveland edged slumping Minnesota 5-4, Baltimore downed Kansas City 4-2, Washington nipped Boston 5-4 and California shaded Detroit 3-2.

Rocky Colavito's ninth-inning single drove in Cleveland's winning run as the Twins dropped their seventh in the last eight.

Minnesota had tied the score at 4-4 on two runs in the eighth, with singles by Don Mincher and Zoilo Versalles the key hits. But Max Alvis opened the ninth with a single, moved up on a sacrifice and scored on Colavito's hit as Cleveland won its fourth straight.

Andy Etchebarren drove in two runs and scored another as Baltimore downed Kansas City. Stu Miller saved the victory for Wally Bunker, who won his fourth.

Etchebarren's seventh inning single broke a 2-2 tie and put the Orioles ahead to stay. Baltimore added another run in the eighth on a passed ball with the bases loaded.

Washington rallied for two runs in the bottom of the ninth to beat the Red Sox
