

# Knights Beat Tigers, 6-2

A two-run triple by Dave Schmitz highlighted a three-run explosion in the third inning as the Kuemper Knights overtook the Carroll Tigers en route to a 6-2 win in West Central League baseball here Saturday night.

It was the 16th win for the Knights on the season and the 15th in loop play as they tuned up for sectional tournament play this week. Kuemper will put a 16-1 record on the line here Friday against the winner of Wednesday's Carroll - Audubon clash.

The league champion Knights had to come from behind to subdue the troublesome Tigers here Saturday in the season's last regularly scheduled league game.

Carroll jumped off to a 2-0 lead in the first inning without benefit of a hit.

Phil Den Adel was safe on an infield error with one down to start the uprising and Kuemper starter Denny Bellinghausen hit Denny Wilkins with a pitch. After Tom Subbert flied to right, Gary Sundermann drew a pass to load the bases.

Mickey Everett tapped a slow roller toward the mound and the throw was dropped at first base as two runs pounded across the plate.

The Tigers kept the Knights in hot water as Bruce Hall lived on an infield error to again load the sacks, but Jay Corbett grounded out to retire the side.

Wilkins started on the mound for Carroll and kept Kuemper under control for the first two frames. In the first inning, Scott Wille singled with one down and

got to second on a pick-off over-throw at first. But Dave Schmitz fanned and Larry Pirotte grounded out.

In the second, Rick Keat walked and was forced by Louie Billmeier who later stole second and went to third on a wild pitch. Tom Louis fanned for the second out, but Kent Casey walked and stole second. Then Bellinghausen went down on a strike to end the threat.

The Tigers had another threat going in the bottom of the second when Jim Schrad was safe on an infield hit and Phil Den Adel singled to left. But Wilkins forced Schrad at third and Subbert forced Den Adel at third to retire the side.

The Knights got their margin in the third when Dave Daeges led off with a walk and Wille beat out an infield blow to set the stage. A wild pitch advanced the runners to second and third, and Gary Sundermann was waved to the mound to relieve Wilkins.

Schmitz greeted Sundermann with a triple to deep center and Daeges and Wille scored to tie the game at 2-2. Then a wild pitch let Schmitz in before Pirotte singled to left.

Keat flied to right before Billmeier was safe on an error, but Louis lined to left and Casey popped to third to end the rally.

Mickey Everett got a one-out single off Bellinghausen in the third, but Hall and Corbett each fanned to quench that threatened outburst.

Sundermann had the Knights in his pocket in the fourth as he struck out Bellinghausen, got Daeges on a grounder to third and fanned Wille.

The Tigers threatened with two down in the fourth when

Den Adel singled past short, stole second and went to third on a single to left. Wilkins walked, and Bellinghausen was lifted in favor of Billmeier.

The lanky Kuemper ace fanned Subbert to stifle the budding Tiger rally.

Kuemper added a cushion run in the fifth when Pirotte was hit by a pitch with one down and stole second. After Keat fanned, Billmeier singled to left to plate Pirotte. A miscue in the outfield and a passed ball put Billmeier on third, but Louis whiffed to end the frame.

The Knights added two more in the sixth with a one-out uprising. Mike Neary was safe on an error and rode home on a double by Dave Daeges. An unsuccessful attempt to get Neary at the plate let Daeges take third and a ground-out by Wille let Daeges score before Schmitz popped to first to end the frame.

Billmeier put the Tigers down in order in the fifth and sixth frames and had two on the rack in the bottom of the seventh when Subbert broke the spell

with a single to right and Sundermann followed suit with a single to left. Everett tapped back to the mound and it was all over.

## Santo's 4 Hits Spark Cubs' Split

A plastic shield covers Ron Santo's left cheek, but National League pitchers could use a cover to shield them from Santo.

The All-Star third baseman returned to the Chicago line-up Monday for the first time since June 26 and rapped four hits in six at-bats as the last-place Cubs split a doubleheader with second-place Pittsburgh.

Santo collected two singles and a homer in the Cubs' 7-5 first-game loss, then came back with a run-scoring single that snapped a tie and sent the Cubs to a 6-4 victory in the second game called because of darkness after 7½ innings.

The hits extended Santo's consecutive game streak to 27, which is the longest in the majors this season and which ties the Cub record set by Hack Wilson in 1929.

The 26-year-old slugger accomplished all that in his first appearance since a pitch from New York's Jack Fisher fractured his left cheek bone June 26.

"The doctor said if I could see I could play," said Santo, whose cheek was protected by a special plastic shield. "My left eye looks pretty bad, but I could see. Some of the Pirates kept asking, 'Boy, that eye looks bad. Can you see out of it?'"

"I guess I proved I could," Santo especially proved it in the seventh inning of the nightcap with two Cubs on base, the game tied 4-4 and darkness moving in on light-less Wrigley Field.

"I set myself to hit Don Cardwell's first pitch if it were anywhere near the plate," Santo related. "It was getting dark and I knew in my own mind that the umpires were going to call the game. His first pitch was a fast ball, and I let go at it. It was a great thrill."

The single increased Santo's average to .319, fifth best in the league, and gave him an average of .388 during his streak, which started June 1.

In other NL games, St. Louis defeated San Francisco 6-2 before losing 3-2, Los Angeles nipped Cincinnati 2-1, Atlanta edged Houston 3-2 and New York swept Philadelphia 9-6 and 8-1.

The Pirates won the opener, despite Santo's two singles and a homer, on the three-run homer of Willie Stargell and the two-run blast of Gene Alley.

Home runs by Phil Gagliano, Lou Brock and Mike Shannon sent San Francisco's Juan Marichal to his fourth defeat against 13 victories. Curt Flood added a two-run single for the Cardinals.

## Catfish Beats Heat, A's Cool Birds, 9-6

Catfish Hunter beat the heat in the seventh inning but Fritz Peterson didn't cool off until the eighth.

Kansas City's Hunter, working with only two days rest in 95-degree weather at Baltimore Monday, pitched six strong innings at the Athletics snapped the American League-leading Orioles' winning streak at seven with a 9-6 victory.

New York's Peterson, meanwhile, rivaled the 95-degree temperature at Yankee Stadium by pitching 7 1-3 perfect innings in a 5-2 victory over Chicago that gained the Yanks a split of their holiday doubleheader.

Hunter, 20 years old and Kansas City's biggest winner with eight victories, yielded four hits and three runs — two of them unearned — before going out for a pinch hitter in the seventh, when Dick Green's three-run homer gave the A's their winning margin.

Manager Alvin Dark said he hadn't planned on Hunter going all the way because of the heat and the young right-hander's lack of rest. Hunter beat Detroit 6-4 in his previous start last Friday.

Peterson, a 24-year-old rookie, retired the first 22 batters he faced before his own error ended the string and John Romano's single broke up the no-hit bid. He finished with a two-hitter and his seventh victory in 13 decisions.

The young left-hander, a fast worker who has said, "I like to

get a game over with so I can find out who won," dispatched the White Sox on 87 pitches. Only 20 were called balls.

The White Sox took the first game 5-0 behind the six-hit pitching of left-hander Gary Peters.

Elsewhere, the California Angels whipped Detroit 11-6, Minnesota edged Cleveland 5-4 and Washington divided a twin bill with Boston, winning the first game 6-4 and losing the nightcap 1-0.

The Athletics, who have won four of their last five, jumped to a 9-3 lead over the Orioles, Green leading the way with five RBI.
