

KHS vs. Glidden Here Tonight

The Kuemper Knights and Glidden-Ralston Wildcats will square off here tonight at 8 p.m. in the high school sectional baseball semi-final.

Winner of tonight's game in the Carroll Stadium will meet the Harlan-Elk Horn victor in the tournament final here Wednesday at 8 p.m. with the sectional champion advancing to district play at Fonda on Friday at 8 p.m.

Kuemper, with a record of 17-1 on the season, turned back Carroll High, 5-2, here Saturday after Glidden - Ralston coasted to a 10-0 decision in five innings against Ar-We-Va.

The Knights were hard-pressed in gaining the win over the Tigers as Gary Sundermann limited Kuemper's sluggers to six hits.

Louie Billmeier went the distance for Kuemper and picked up his 12th mound victory on a four-hitter.

The Tigers struck first in the game when they opened the scoring in the third inning. Paul Bruns was hit by a pitch with one down to ignite the rally. Denny Vetter singled to left and Bruns stopped at second but later stole third. Then Jim Schrad drew a pass to load the sacks.

Ar-We-Va got only two hits, a Tuttle doubled to left, and pinch-runner Kevin Eichner raced home on a single to right by Peters.

With only one away, Coach Bill Tryon put the squeeze on and Bruns dashed for the plate as Phil DenAdel laid down a bunt toward the mound. Bruns scored on the sacrifice and Gary Sundermann grounded out to end the threat with Carroll in front by a 1-0 count.

Kuemper came back with two in the bottom of the third without benefit of a hit.

Dave Daeges drew a pass with one down and went to third on wild pitches. Dave Schmitz walked and stole second. Daeges scored on a wild pitch, and Schmitz went to third from where he scored on Billmeier's sacrifice fly to center field. That gave Kuemper a 2-1 lead.

The Tigers had a threat going in the fourth but were cut down on some fine fielding. Denny Wilkins was safe on an error with one-away and Scott Richardson was safe on a fielder's choice when his potential double play ball was booted near second. Mickey Everett lined to first and Larry Pirote caught Richardson off the bag for an unassisted double play.

Carroll threatened again in the fifth when Bruns fanned but reached first on an error on the catcher on the missed third strike. Bruns then stole second and third but was stranded by Vetter's tap to the mound. Schrad's whiff and DenAdel's tap to the pitcher.

Kuemper got the cushion in the fifth when Tom Louis led off with a double to left. After

Mike Neary grounded out, Daeges drew a pass and later stole second. Schmitz fanned but Billmeier was credited with a double when his high fly to center dropped in. That plated two runs and the fifth Kuemper run scored when Pirote lined a smash to center field.

Carroll threatened in the seventh when Everett led off with a single to center and stole second. Bruns lined a smash toward first base and substitute firstbaseman Terry Schroeder made a diving stab for the out. Bruce Hall singled to center and Everett rode home with Carroll's second run.

Schrad was hit by a pitch before DenAdel fanned for the second out, and Sundermann also was hit by a pitch to load the

sacks. Tom Subbert hit a bounder toward short and a quick reaction play by substitute shortstop Jim Middendorf nipped Subbert at first for the final out.

Glidden-Ralston had to go two innings before the Wildcats zeroed in on the offerings of Ar-We-Va's Tom Jahde in the 10-0 conquest.

Dave Tuttle led off in the third and was hit by a pitch to set the stage. Randy Peters lived on a fielder's choice. Tom Squires singled Peters home after the latter had reached third on a stolen base and passed ball.

Steve Thornton tripled to right and scored on a passed ball.

Ed Rensburg doubled to left and scored on Jim Tracy's single to center. A stolen base put Tracy in position and he scored on Dick Tryon's single to right.

Two more Wildcat runs counted in the fourth Bob Kurth was safe on a two-base error, stole third and scored on Squire's hit. A wild pitch put Squires in position and he scored on Thornton's infield bingle.

In the fifth, Ron Breidert lived on an error and Tracy singled past second. With two down, pair of infield singles by Craig Dohse and Gary Bruggeman in the first, as Tom Squires worked the first three frames and Randy Peters worked the last two innings for the Wildcats.

Squeeze Play by Pirates Irks Former Buc Hurler

Veteran pitcher Bob Friend knows about pressure. But that extra squeeze put on by the Pittsburgh Pirates was just too much.

Friend, an ex-Pirate, became angry Sunday when the Pirates, leading by five runs in the eighth inning en route to a 9-4 victory over the New York Mets, tried to squeeze in another run. It backfired, but that didn't pacify Friend.

As he was leaving the field, Friend glared at the Pittsburgh dugout and shouted, "That's bush stuff, trying a squeeze when you're five runs ahead."

Pirates Manager Harry Walker shouted back, and he and Friend started toward each other but were restrained.

After the game, Walker said, "Whenever the club I'm playing gives up and quits, that's when I intend to stop trying to score runs. Baseball is played to win, and that's all I have to say."

The Cincinnati Reds helped Manager Don Hefner pass an acid test by ending an 11-game losing streak with a 2-1 victory over the San Francisco Giants.

Following the victory, the 55-year-old Hefner chewed two tablets which absorb stomach acid and said, "My stomach's been jumping for 55 years. But this (the slump) hasn't helped any."

The Cincinnati victory enabled second-place Pittsburgh to close to within one game of the Giants in the National League.

Atlanta edged Los Angeles 2-0, the Chicago Cubs blasted Philadelphia 10-2 and Houston nipped St. Louis 6-5 in other National League games.

In the American League, California blanked Baltimore 4-0, Minnesota beat Detroit 4-2, Boston took the Chicago White Sox 8-4 and 10-6, Kansas City whipped Cleveland 4-1 and 5-3 and Washington defeated the New York Yankees 3-2 and 9-2. The Pirates broke a 4-4 tie with their five-run eighth, Roberto Clemente's single driving in the go-ahead run. After all the runs had scored, Friend relieved Bob Shaw. With a runner on third and two strikes on the batter, Elroy Face, the Pirates'

pitcher, tried the squeeze, but Face missed the ball for a strike out and the runner was caught off third.

Milt Pappas pitched out of numerous jams in winning for Cincinnati. The Reds built a 2-0 lead on run-scoring singles by Vada Pinson and Tony Perez before the Giants narrowed it on Ozzie Virgil's homer in the ninth.

Denny Lemaster pitched a five-hitter and Frank Bolling and Woody Woodward singled home runs in the fifth inning for Atlanta's victory over the Dodgers.

Ernie Banks was the big man in the Cubs' triumph over Philadelphia, driving in five runs with three hits. Southpaw Dick Ellsworth picked up his fifth victory against 12 defeats, with Jim Bunning taking the loss.

Overcoming a 12-4 edge in the All-Star series once completely dominated by the American League, Willie Mays and Co. have taken the lead 18-17-1. Sam Mele, the Minnesota skipper who will boss the American League, sounded the word before he left home.

"I'll use my eight starters all the way if it will help us win," said Mele. "I'm going to win this one. We'll play to win."
