

Everett Sets Hit Pace—

Tigers Defeat Denison, 11-9

DENISON — Mick Everett smacked four singles and Steve Brechler cracked a two-run homer to give the Carroll Tigers the needed scoring punch to top the Denison Monarchs, 11-9, in a West Central League contest here Wednesday.

The Tiger hitting department offered an optimistic insight into Carroll's future title hopes in league play, but Steve Brechler's lethargic let-down on the mound frayed some of these hopes. The usually aggressive and accurate Brechler walked twelve batters and was charged with two costly throwing errors which brought four runners across the plate.

The Bengals hopped to an early lead with three runs in the top of the first. Mark Baudler got things started with a lead-off single. Tom Jons took a base on balls, while Everett and Brechler chipped in with

consecutive singles to bring two runs across. Roger Fuller hit into a fielder's choice and the first three runs were tallied.

Denison charged back in the bottom of the first with a two-run burst. Brechler surrendered walks to the opening batters, Dick Neumann and Craig Johnson, but got Steve McGinn down on strikes. A passed ball advanced the runners, but Mark Wahrman hit into a fielder's choice that checked Neumann at third. Randy Hillman took a base on balls to load the sacks. Bob Morgan tapped a little grounder to the mound, but Brechler's throw to first went wild sending two runners across the plate.

The Carroll club added two cushion runs to their total in the second and third frames, and both teams swung into action in the fifth frame with two runs apiece. Fuller started things off for Carroll with a walk. Ken Kieck hit into a fielder's choice, but the throw to

Brechler retaliated for the pitching let-down in the top of the sixth with a two-run homer deep into left-center field, which brought the score to 9-5 in favor of the Tigers.

The Tigers added two cushion runs in the top of the seventh on hits by Stu Berns and Ever-

At this point, Coach Bill Tryon signalled relief hurler Dave Henning to the mound to replace Brechler. Henning sent Neumann down on strikes, but walked the next two batters to add another run to the Denison total. Wahrman cracked a single to bring in the ninth Denison run, but Henning whiffed the last two batters.

The Tigers will test the Monarchs once again at 8 p.m. Friday at the Carroll Stadium.

Bucs Hike Streak To 8th In Row

The strong young arms were at it again in the National League Wednesday night. A couple of strong old ones did pretty well, too.

Juan Marichal, who's pushing 30 . . . years and maybe victories as well . . . won his 13th game and ninth straight, pitching San Francisco to a 5-1 victory over Philadelphia. Elderly Bob Veale, all of 32, hurled a six-hitter and Pittsburgh won its eighth straight, 2-1 over Los Angeles.

So much for the senior citizens.

Steve Carlton, 23, headed the kiddie corps' show with a one-hitter, hurling St. Louis to a 4-0 victory over Chicago. Jerry Koosman, 24, won his 11th game for the New York Mets, pitching a five-hitter to beat Houston 8-2. And Ron Reed, 25, fired a four-hitter for Atlanta's 3-1 victory over Cincinnati.

Marichal, 13-2, leads the majors in victories, and has achieved his total with just over one-third of the season over. It's a timetable that could lead to 30—a plateau that hasn't been reached since Dizzy Dean did it in 1934.

The Giants' ace had help against Philadelphia from another elderly operative—Willie Mays. The Amazing One slashed consecutive triples in the seventh and eighth innings, scoring two runs and knocking in one, as the Giants snapped a 1-1 tie. The two triples tied Mays with Ty Cobb for fourth place on the alltime extra base hit list with 1,139.
