# Carroll Rolls Past Audubon, 4-1

## Former AD At Iowa In Tough Post

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Paul W. Brechler, athletic director at the University of Iowa when it was a football powerhouse, Friday was named to the same position at the University of California.

Brechler, 55, assumes the position Aug. 15, said Chancellor Roger W. Heyns, and he will inherit the racial problems that led to the resignation of Pete Newell as athletic director.

Brechler was athletic director at Iowa from 1947 to 1960, the days when Forest Evashevski was building Rose Bowl football teams and Big Ten champions, and then he moved on to become commissioner of the Mountain States Conference in 1960.

Two years later, the conference changed its name to the Western Athletic Conference and such teams as Wyoming, Brigham Young and Utah played national schedules and built up impressive records.

At California, Brechler will find a football team that hasn't been to the Rose Bowl since 1959 and hasn't had a winning season since. Last year the Golden Bears posted a 5-5 mark.

But the biggest problem Brechler will have is one of racial antagonism that began last winter when 40 Negro athletes made a series of demands and threatened to boycott sports unless they were met.

This led to the resignation of Newell and Basketball Coach Rene Herrera. A university committee, looking into the athletes' complaints recommended "a determined effort to recruit minority group personnel to its coaching and administrative and training staffs."

Soon afterwards, Jim Padgett was named basketball coach and Earl Robinson, the first Negro to coach at Cal since the 1930s, was named as his assistant.

In the spring, the problem flared up again when some Negro football players boycotted practice with another series of demands.

## Lenny Funk To Run New Engine In July 7 Race

DES MOINES — Lenny Funk of Otis, Kansas is running a race with time before the Iowa "300" gets underway at the state fairgrounds on Sunday afternoon, July 7.

Lenny blew an engine in his 1968 Ford recently and he is feverishly trying to prepare a new engine in time for the "300".

The Kansas wheat farmer, who generally takes the month off to finish his harvesting chores, notified officials that he'll be ready for Iowa's longest race.

Waiting on parts has cost the hard charging Funk some valuable time. But, he expects to have the 427 cubic inch engine assembled and installed by race day.

The "300" will get underway with time trials at 10 a.m. on July 7. The race itself will roll away at 1 p.m. Thirty three cars will start the 150 mile speed and endurance grind.

AMES (AP)—The Black Students Organization at Iowa State University said Friday it cannot accept a compromise offered on grievances by the university's athletic council.

Spokesmen for the organization said 23 of 25 Negro athletes at the university will withdraw before Aug. 1.

The athletic council had said earlier Friday it would compromise a bit. However, it refused to back down on its stand to retain Baseball Coach Cap Timm, Basketball Coach Glen Anderson and Trainer Robert Billings.

The Black Students had sought to have Timm fired and to sack Anderson and Billings "if they

## Creighton Lists 26 Game Schedule

OMAHA, Nebr. — It shouldn't take long to find out just how good the 1968-69 Creighton Bluejays basketball team is. Preseason hopes are skyrocketing but they could be brought to earth by an opening slate of games against some of the toughest opposition Midlands' basketball has to offer.

In a 26-game schedule announced today by Coach John J. (Red) McManus the Bluejays open at home against Wichita State on November 30, play at St. Louis on December 3, at the Civic Auditorium against Illinois U. on December 6, and follow with games against Kansas U. and Kansas State in the Sunflower Classic on Dec. 13-14.

Prognosticators, optimists, and just about everyone else figures McManus has the material to make a fine showing against another coast-to-coast schedule which has 11 home dates and 15 on the road. Creighton will face such other traditional powers as Iowa U., La Salle, Providence, Oklahoma City, Seattle, Loyola (Chicago), Marquette, Notre Dame, and St. Bonaventure.

All-American Bob Portman (28.5 ppg., 15.4 rpg.) heads a list of six returning lettermen from last year's 8-17 Bluejays squad. That won-loss record is deceptive as a guide to this season. Wally Anderson, 6-8 senior who did not play a year ago but will in 1968 after passing up pro offers from both leagues, is another two-time letterman who will team with Portman to give

## Brechler Checks Foe On 4-Hitter

AUDUBON — Four-hit pitching by sophomore pitching ace Steve Brechler and a timely first inning single by Denny Vetter gave Carroll the needed boost after a week's lay-off, to top the Audubon Wheelers, 4-1, in a West Central League contest here Friday.

Brechler turned in an outstanding job on the mound for the Tigers holding the Wheelers to four hits, while striking out 12 batters and walking only two. His counterpart on the Audubon Club, Kirk McLaughlin, also turned in a creditable performance, scattering only six hits, while striking out ten, and walking two. McLaughlin was not as fortunate as Brechler in having a strong defensive line-up backing him up — the Wheeler infield was charged with six errors, four of these allowing men to reach first.

The Tigers went on the attack early in the first inning. Errors on the Audubon shortstop and second baseman allowed Tom Jons and Mick Everett to climb aboard the sacks. Steve Brechler took a base on balls to load the bases. Roger Fuller popped up to the pitcher, and Denny Vetter slapped a single to center which brought two runners across safely. Dave Henning struck out to retire the side.

It was three up, three down for Audubon in the bottom of the first frame. Tom Rasmussen went down on strikes, Paul Lykke bounced out to the mound, and McLaughlin grounded to the first baseman for the third out.

Neither team mounted a threat in the second inning, but Carroll stole back into contention in the third inning. Jons led off reaching first on an error. He stole second, but Everett flew out to center for the first out. Brechler took another free pass to first, and a passed ball sent both runners into scoring position at second and third. Fuller went down via strikes and Vetter popped to short to end the threat.

The Tigers added two cushion runs in the fourth frame, while Paul Lykke broke a three-inning dry spell for the Wheelers with his team's first hit of the game. Henning led off for the Bengals with a single to left. Ken Kleck hit into a fielder's choice that erased Henning at second. Gary Lehrkamp smashed a double into deep left-center, bringing Kleck across for the third run. Baudler tapped a one-bagger down third base line and beat out the throw to first. A passed ball sent Lehrkamp across for the fourth Carroll run.

The Wheelers threatened in

the fifth and tallied their lone run in the sixth inning. A third-base error put Mark Vaughn on first to open things for Audubon in the fifth. Larry Peterson hit into a fielder's choice that stopped Vaughn at second. A wild pitch sent Peterson scampering to second, and a passed ball put him in scoring position at third. Carroll hurler, Brechler, got himself out of that jam striking out Mike Garber and Al Campbell.

The Audubon club broke into the scoring column in the bottom of the sixth frame. Back-to-back singles by Lykke and McLaughlin set things up for the Wheelers. Warren Campbell took a base on balls, and a passed ball to Vaughn sent Lykke charging for the plate. But Carroll catcher Fuller alerted pounced on the loose ball and flipped it to Brechler who tagged Lykke at the plate. A few moments later, though, another passed ball brought McLaughlin down the home stretch and a safe slide tallied the first, and only, Audubon run.

It looked as though the Tigers were planning to avenge the lone Audubon run in the top of the seventh. Mick Everett led off for the Carroll club, aiming a deadly smash to the mound that knocked pitcher McLaughlin flat on his back. Everett didn't let up the steam there — he proceeded to steal second and third off the Audubon battery, but his teammates couldn't mount an attack to bring him across.
