

# Knights Whip Audubon; Breda Raps Tigers

## 6 Hit Mound Job By Bellinghausen

AUDUBON — The Kuemper Knights fattened their batting averages and retained a firm hold on the top rung of the West Central League with a 7-2 victory over Audubon here Wednesday night.

It was the second straight triumph for Coach Lou Galelich's club, and it was fashioned with a 12-hit assault and clutch pitching by Denny Bellinghausen who limited the Wheelers to six hits.

Lynn Wiese, Joe Badding and Ron Friedman paced the Lancer attack with two safeties each, and Rick Goins joined the extra base parade with a ringing double.

With two wins under their belts on masterful hurling by front-liners Jim Middendorf and Bellinghausen, the Knights will travel to Lake City on Friday night and sophomore Randy

Langeling will get the mound call. Kuemper will return home Saturday night and Middendorf will face Jefferson in that game.

The Knights broke in front in the first frame here Wednesday as Goins ignited the rally when he laced a two-out double down the left field line. Badding drilled a line drive single to center and Kuemper had the lead run.

Paul Lykke, Audubon hurler, got an early taste of pressure but extricated himself in the first after passing Denny Walden. Friedman lifted a high pop to first and the threat was curbed.

Kuemper's defense rose to the occasion in the first when Lykke walked but was erased in a lightning double play when Warren Campbell lined to short. Kirk McLaughlin followed with his first of three hits, but Mike

Garber tapped to the mound to end the inning.

The Knights scored again in the second with two down. Bellinghausen drew a pass and Dave Daeges walked. Wiese followed with a single to right to plate Bellinghausen, but Goins whiffed to cut the outburst short.

Audubon loaded the sacks in the third but couldn't score. Dan Gilbert banged a shot past third, but Lykke fanned for the first out. Warren Campbell singled to center for the second. Then McLaughlin singled to center and Garber walked, but Pat Monahan went down on strikes for the third out.

Kuemper picked up a pair of hits in the fourth when Bellinghausen and Daeges singled back to back and moved up on an erratic pick-off, but Wiese struck out to end that threat.

In the bottom of the fourth, Dave Campbell led off for Audubon with a mis-judged triple to right, but Larry Petersen grounded to third and Campbell was a dead duck at the plate.

The Knights got the ultimate winning run in the sixth when Friedman opened with a single to left and Doug Staiert, batting for Don Baldus, followed with a single to center. Another erratic pick-off moved the runners around and Mark Wiedenfeld walked to load the sacks with none down. Bellinghausen fanned. Daeges hit a sacrifice fly to center to score one. Wiese drew a pass, but Goins whiffed to end the rally.

Kuemper batted around in the seventh. Badding led off with a single past short. After Walden fanned, Friedman

## Trick Futile As Cards Roll, 3-1

The Houston Astros pulled a sneaky trick on the red-faced St. Louis Cardinals and wound up with as much to show for it as the Pittsburgh Pirates, who caused their own embarrassment.

The Astros and Cardinals were locked in a 1-1 deadlock in the seventh inning Wednesday night when Julian Javier of St. Louis was tagged out at second base on the old hidden ball trick.

But the Cardinals wiped the egg off their faces and unloaded consecutive hits by Curt Flood, Roger Maris and Orlando Cepeda in the eighth for a run that sent them to a 3-1 victory, their eighth straight.

Pittsburgh never had that chance to make amends as Los Angeles scored in the last of the 10th inning for a 2-1 victory when Maury Wills and Jerry May let in the winning run with errors on the same play.

Gary Nolin, troubled by a sore arm most of the season, left hard-hitting Atlanta a bit chagrined by stopping the Braves on three hits in pitching Cincinnati to a 10-0 rout.

In afternoon games in the Na-

tional League, Tom Seaver and the New York Mets halted the Chicago Cubs 4-2, and Woody Fryman hurled Philadelphia by San Francisco 2-1 with a six-hitter.

Houston's moment for joy came after Javier singled and reached second base with two out as St. Louis pitcher Larry Jaster bunted and was thrown out by losing hurler Larry Dierker with second baseman Julio Gotay covering first base.

Gotay, a former Cardinal who failed to win the second base job from Javier in the early 1960s, kept the ball and walked back to second base and first baseman Rusty Staub went in to chat with Dierker. Javier stepped off the bag and, surprise, Gotay finally got him off second.

But the first-place Cardinals wasted little time erasing the glee of the Astros and saddled them with a fifth consecutive loss on Cepeda's hit and a run-scoring double by Lou Brock in the ninth.

Jaster, 4-2, allowed only six hits and the run off him was only the second earned marker he has given in 33 1-3 innings this season. He left after walking the first hitter in the ninth and rookie Wayne Granger retired the next three batters.

Bill Singer, 5-5, of the Dodgers and Al McBean, also 5-5, of Pittsburgh were locked in a 1-1 duel when embarrassment set in on the Pirates. Paul Popovich opened the 10th with a single and Versailles forced him at second. After Ron Fairly batted for Singer and popped out, the fun began when Wes Parker singled to center.

The throw from the outfield to third base got by Wills, extra embarrassing for a former Dodger who had his greatest days in Dodger Stadium. Versailles tried to score on the error and did when catcher May dropped the throw home.

## CHS Stymied By Koster's 4-Hitter

Strong hitting was the key factor for the Breda Bobcats of St. Bernard's here Wednesday night as they romped past the Carroll Tigers, 14-3, in a West Central League clash.

The husky Breda club, now sporting a 9-8 record on the season, took advantage of the 10-run ruling after five innings of play in walking over the Bengals, who opened their baseball season Monday with a victory over the Jefferson Rams, 7-1.

Glen Koster was the man of the night for the Bobcats. Koster allowed only four hits while pitching the five inning route and was the big stick for the Breda club with a double and a triple.

Dave Henning, making his debut on the mound for the Tigers this season, met with ill-fated success. Neil Reising led off for the Bobcats with a single to left-center. Tim Gaffney followed with a short tap which

nalled Reising at second base. Dean Timmerman cracked a single over second base and this set the stage for Glen Koster's long arching triple to deep left, bringing two runners scampering to the plate safely. Tom Nieland kept things alive with a liner over third base bringing Koster in for the fourth run.

At this point, Coach Bill Tryon decided to give Roger Fuller a crack at the mound duties. Fuller immediately responded by getting Randy Nieland out on a pop-up to third. Gerry Koster reached first on an error, but Ron Woerdehoff flew out to center to retire the side with a four-run advantage for Breda.

Carroll slipped into the scoring column in the bottom half of the first frame. Mick Everett led off with a short single to left. The Carroll speedster then whipped to second with a stolen base and rode to third on a passed ball. Marc Baudler responded with a single to bring the first Carroll run across the plate. An error on a throw to

first sent Baudler dashing around the bases, but the Tiger center fielder couldn't quite make it and was nailed at the plate.

Breda came roaring back in the top of the second inning with a three run outburst. John Koster led off for the Bobcats with a single to left. Reising flew out to center and Gaffney drew a base on balls. Timmerman and Glen Koster combined for back-to-back doubles to bring the three runners across safely.

The Tigers came back in the bottom of the third with another run in the scoring column. Bruce Pettitt led off with a base on balls and proceeded to steal second. Everett's sacrifice fly to right put Pettitt in scoring position and Steve Brechler came through with an arching two-bagger to deep left field. Richardson grounded to third to end the rally.

A pair of Carroll errors, scattered hits, and a controversial balk call highlighted a seven run outburst for the Breda club in the top of the fifth. Glen Koster was waved to first after being hit by a pitch to open things for the Bobcats. Tom Nieland followed reaching first on a third base error. Randy Nieland kept things alive with a single to center, but an error sent him dashing to second and another run across the plate. Gerry Koster slammed a double to deep left-center for two more runs. Woerdehoff drew a free pass to first. fol-

## ISU Warns Non-Whites On Boycott

AMES, Iowa (AP) — Iowa State University's athletic council said Wednesday night an investigation shows there is no basis for a charge that Negro athletes have been discriminated against by coaches at the school.

And, it warned the Negroes in

a strongly worded statement that if they follow through with a threatened boycott of athletic teams, they will be dropped from the squad, be barred from further participation and automatically forfeit their scholarships.

The Negro athletes, members of a group called the ISU Black Students Organization, had presented a list of demands to an athletic council committee May 20.

Iowa State has about 25 Negro athletes receiving scholarships now.
