

Middendorf's Two-Hitter Checks Tigers, 6-2

KHS Keeps Pace As Jays Win, 7-0

Jim Middendorf, Kuemper's mound stalwart, checked the Carroll Tigers on a two-hitter as the Knights prevailed in a game of give-away, 6-2, in West Central League baseball here Monday night.

Kuemper failed to gain any ground, however, in the flag chase as the Perry Bluejays clinched a share of first with a 7-0 win over Jefferson behind Dan Diddy's two-hitter.

In remaining games, Kuemper will end the league season against Breda here Thursday night and Perry will wind up against Lake City at Perry on Friday night. All other teams have been eliminated with four or more losses.

The first of two hits off Middendorf was recorded by Scott Richardson with two down in the first. Richardson's hard grounder skipped between Ron Friedman and Don Baldus on the right side of the Kuemper infield, but Middendorf quelled the threat by getting Steve Brechler on a called third strike.

Kuemper's defenses came apart in the second and the Tigers vaulted into a 2-0 lead.

Roger Fuller, Carroll's hustling third baseman, ignited the rally when he was safe at first on an error after Kuemper shortstop Dick Heithoff made a nifty stop in the hole. Tom Jones executed a sacrifice bunt, and Jeff Beneke drew a pass.

The improbable happened with one down and runners on first and second as the Tigers successfully executed a double steal. Denny Vetter faked a bunt and Fuller and Beneke took off. When Joe Badding, Kuemper catcher, looked to third the bag was uncovered.

With two runners in scoring position, Vetter swung away and lofted a sacrifice fly to left. There was no chance to get the speeding Fuller at the plate. So Badding went to third in an attempt to cut down Beneke, but the throw got away and Beneke came home.

The Tigers had 2-0 lead on an error, sacrifice, two stolen bases, sacrifice fly and another error.

Steve Brechler, Carroll's sophomore pitching star, no-hit the Knights through the first three frames.

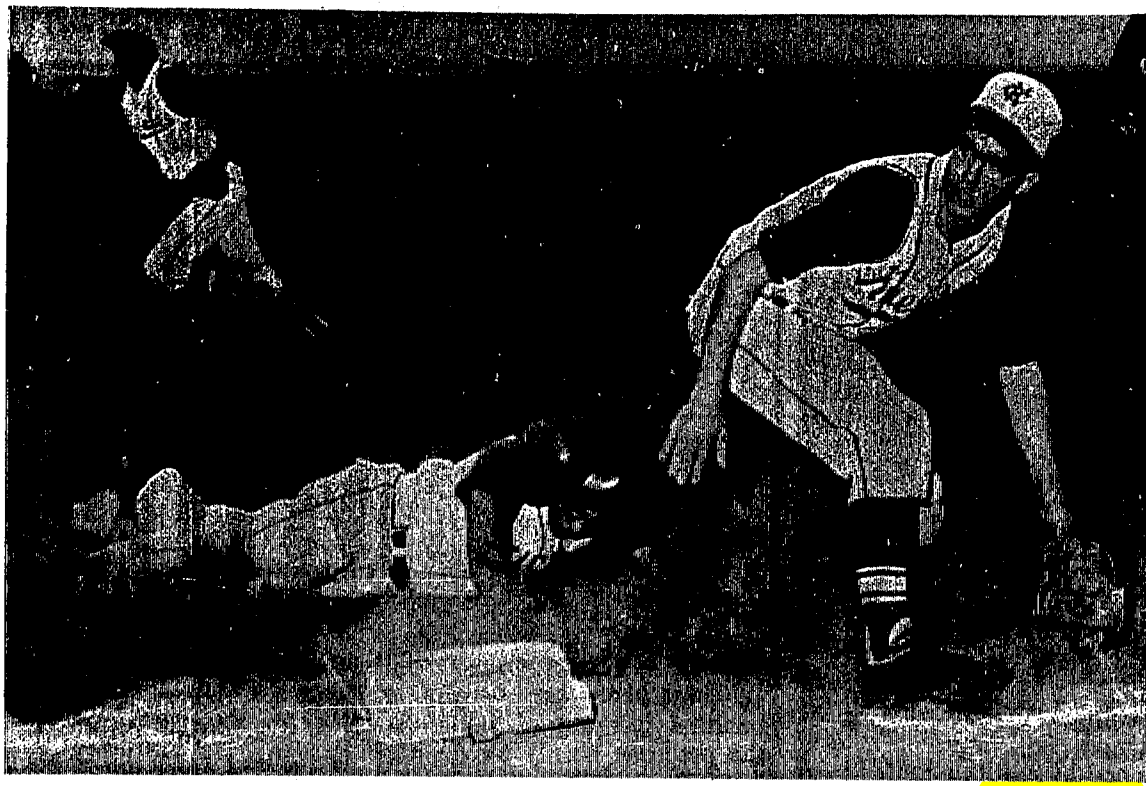
Denny Walden got the Knights on the way when he beat out a grounder to third with one down in the third inning. Brechler nicked Scott Schmitz with a pitch and there were two aboard. Ron Friedman fanned, but Joe Badding lined a single to right. The ball got away from the rightfielder and both Walden and Schmitz scored to tie the count at 2-2.

With Badding perched on first, Heithoff drew a pass and the Tigers sprung a defensive leak that let in the lead run. Heithoff broke for second and delayed en route. The second baseman cut throw and bluffed Badding back toward third and then started to chase Heithoff back to first. The defensive strategy fell apart when a feint was made toward Heithoff that allowed Badding to set sail for the plate and the throw to the plate sailed over the head of the catcher.

Kuemper padded the margin in the fifth. Dave Daeges singled to center and took second on a passed ball. Middendorf followed with a single to center and Daeges sped home.

The Knights counted two more runs in the sixth. Badding walked and went to second on a wild pitch. Heithoff's subsequent sacrifice wasn't needed because little Don Baldus startled the on-

GUTHRIE CENTER — The Glidden swim team rallied in the relay events and defeated Guthrie Center, 209 to 191, in an Iowa West conference meet here Monday.

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lookers with a double over the head of the rightfielder.

Pat Riddle lived on an error at first as Baldus took third. An overthrow of second on a steal let Baldus scoot home with the third run.

Carroll's second hit off Middendorf was a lead-off single to left by Everett in the sixth. Everett stole second and went to third on an error on the throw.

With none down, Richardson tapped to the mound and Everett had to hold at third. Brechler became a strike out victim for the third time. Fuller tapped back to the mound and Everett was stranded.

The Tigers turned in a double play to cut a Knight threat short in the seventh, and Middendorf set the Carroll club down in order in the bottom of the seventh.

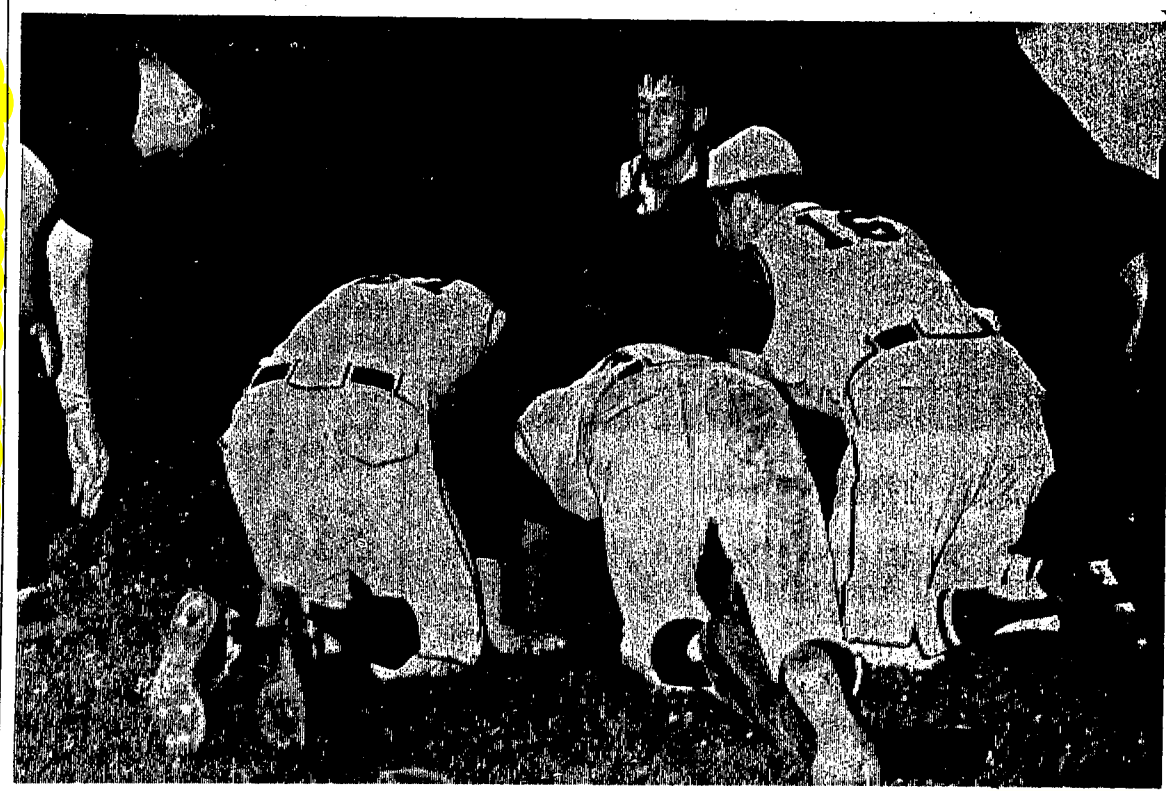

Owners Alarmed By Strike Threat

CHICAGO (AP) — National Football League owners sound the alarm button Monday night.

Art Medell, owner of the Cleveland Browns and president of the NFL, announced that "pro football faces a long and disastrous strike" and then called for a full meeting of owners in Chicago today.

Medell's statement came after the NFL's Players Association said it had failed to resolve its disagreement with the owners over player pensions.

The players are seeking additional pension funds before the 1970 deadline desired by the owners.

Both groups met on the outskirts of Chicago Monday but reached no conclusion.

While the owners refused to give in to the players, the question of the All-Star Game arrived.

Vince Lombardi, general manager of the Green Bay Packers, who as the champions of pro football, must meet the College All-Stars in Chicago Aug. 2, said "the game will have to be delayed or canceled" unless the Packers have at least three weeks to get ready.

This resulted from an ultimatum by Medell to hold off the opening of all pro football camps until the present matter is settled.

The San Francisco 49ers were to open their rookie camp Sunday and the Packers were among those scheduled to start workouts Wednesday.

George Strickler, sports editor of the Chicago Tribune whose Chicago Tribune charities sponsors the All-Star Game, said, "Our contract is with professional football including the National Football and the American Football League.

"Our coaches are here and our squad will assemble Thursday and begin workouts Friday. We'll fulfill our end of our contract and we hope professional football will fill its end."

Meanwhile, Medell issued a statement that said, "Despite having granted 21 demands of the players' union, pro football
