Ever since Juan Marichal began pitching for the San Francisco Giants 10 years ago, the chances were that he would win any game he pitched. But never have the percentages been so great in his favor as they are now.

After pitching the Giants to a 4-2 victory over the Montreal Expos Friday night, no pitcher in baseball history can top the right-hander when it comes to winning percentage.

Marichal's six-hitter raised his record this season to 7-2 and his career mark to 177-79, a .691 percentage. He had entered the contest tied with former New York Yankees ace Whitey Ford, who was 236-106 for .690.

Although a loss in his next start would drop him back again, the way the 31-year-old mound master wins games with monotonous regularity, he could quite possibly keep his all-time high percentage by the time he finally leaves the game.

Ordinarily, the 7-10-year-old home boasts an established lawn, basic shrub plantings and even trees large enough to be worthy of the name.

It also comes complete with many of those items that put such a strain on the budget of the new-home buyer; things like screens and storm win-

downs, drapes, carpeting, plumbing and venting connections in the laundry, yard lighting and dozens of others.

Of course, the buyer of the older house gains most of these same advantages but often at a high cost. An old house, say in the 20-to-30-year range, is almost a dead cinch for any number of repairs and replacements. These can range from a new set of shingles on the roof to a new boiler in the basement.

So the next time you're tempted to participate in an old house-new house debate, better define your terms. It could be that the adolescent house encompasses most of the best of both worlds.
