The Detroit Tigers may be the first third-place team in baseball history with a magic number.

"I said we had to win six of eight games from Baltimore this weekend and next to gain significant ground," said Mayo Smith, manager of the beleaguered world champions, after the Orioles made off with a 4-1 victory Friday night. "Now it's six out of seven."

West Plans To Run In Grid Game

ATLANTA (AP) — Eugene "Mercury" Morris, powerful Paul Gipson and Bill "Earthquake" Enyart—overshadowed as running backs by O. J. Simpson last fall—get their shot at glory tonight.

Simpson, Heisman Trophy winner from Southern California, is skipping the ninth annual Coaches All-America Game because he has not signed a pro contract, so the trio of hard-running football players will be spotlighted.

Morris, West Texas State standout who is the NCAA's all-time rushing leader with 3,388 yards, gained 1,598 yards running last season. Gipson picked up 1,550 yards for Houston, and Enyart rushed for 1,304 yards for Oregon State.

All three will be running for the West in the all-star battle in hot, muggy Atlanta Stadium.

Kickoff for the game, which will be nationally televised by ABC-TV, will be at 7:30 p.m., CDT.

The West's running attack has been singled out as the probable difference in the teams, with both the East and West boasting sturdy defenses.

West Coach Pepper Rodgers of Kansas thinks his running attack is as strong as he has ever seen, with Morris, Gipson and Enyart all impressive in workouts.

The East—coached by Joe Paterno of Penn State—is counting on passers Marty Domres of Columbia and Buster O'Brien of Richmond to offset the West's running power.

The Cardinals ruined Ken Holtzman's perfect game bid and beat the Chicago southpaw ace in the seventh inning on Vada Pinson's single, a wild pitch, a run-scoring single by Joe Torre and a triple by Mike Shannon.

Steve Carlton shut out the Cubs after the third inning and struck out 12 while boosting his record to 8-5.

Larry Bisle poked a three-run homer and then sent home the deciding run with a fourth inning single, leading the Phillies past Montreal for their third straight victory. The Expos wanted a pair of two-run homers by Mack Jones.

Schuchat's 2 Under 70 Paces Field

SIoux CITY (AP) — Some wise old heads took their whacks off the tees of sprawling Green Valley in Iowa Men's Amateur golf Friday, but none owned a steadier driver than Brad Schuchat.

Schuchat, a youngster in a crowd of veterans, defied high winds that raked the municipal course and pumped in a two-under-par 70 that stood up for the lead.

His score on nines of 34 and 36 was 1 up on Gary Ritter of Waterloo, who at age 30 is 10 years the University of Iowa sophomore's senior.

Two strokes back after matching par were Bob Davis, Waterloo, veteran J. D. Turner of Iowa City and Jim Aossy of Cedar Rapids.

Astros Orbit To 4th On 5-4 Win

Harry Walker won't admit it, but he's trying to hatch a home-made moon-shot in the Houston Astrodome.

Walker's astounding Astros nipped Atlanta 5-4 in the ninth inning Friday night for their 10th consecutive victory and a space walk in fourth place in the National League's tight West Division race.

The Astros' second 10-game orbit of the season shot them within 4½ lengths of pace-setting Los Angeles and brought on the first symptoms of that dizzying high-altitude phenomenon—pennant fever.

"This club is great, isn't it?" Jim Wynn beamed after ex-Brave Marty Martinez poked the game-winning single in the ninth, lifting Houston to its 26th triumph in 31 home games.

While the Astros, mired in the division cellar two months ago after losing 20 of their first 24 starts, vaulted into contention, San Diego ended an 11-game tailspin by blanking Los Angeles 5-0 behind right-hander Joe Niekro.

Despite the loss, the Dodgers remained one-half game in front of the Braves. Third place Cincinnati moved 2½ games off the pace with a 4-3, 9-1 doublehead-

er sweep over San Francisco that dropped the Giants to fifth—five games out.

Elsewhere, Pittsburgh trimmed the New York Mets 3-1. St. Louis beat the Chicago Cubs 3-1 and Philadelphia shaded Montreal 8-7.

The Astros broke a 4-4 deadlock in the ninth when Curt Blefary singled, took second on a sacrifice, third on an infield out and then scored on Martinez' two-out single off reliever Cecil Upshaw.

Wynn drove in three Houston runs with a double and single. Hank Aaron slammed his 20th homer for the Braves.
