# Kuemper Wins West Central Baseball Crown

The Kuemper Knights matched the pelling rain drops with a steady tattoo of base hits and won the West Central baseball championship with a 13-1 victory over Carroll High in five innings here Wednesday night.

In a rain-delayed contest, the Knights ran their league record to 13-1 and the season mark to 15-4 while the hapless Tigers finished their most frustrating season in history with a 1-13 record.

Jim Middendorf's two-hit performance kept the Bengals at bay while the Knights hopped on the offerings of Roger Fuller and Doug Peterson for 10 hits as Dave Daeges set the pace with

three for three.

After the start of the game had been delayed by a sudden shower, the Knights tallied one run in the first, three in the second and seven in the fourth for the 10-run cushion. In the top of the fifth, with the rain coming down harder each moment, Kuemper managed two more runs with some daring base-running and dubious strategy at the plate.

Middendorf led off the fifth with a single past third but was forced at second by Dick Helthoff. A wild pitch by Carroll reliever Doug Peterson sent Helthoff to second.

The rain increased in intensity as Scott Schmitz drew a

pass. Helthoff set sail for third on a delayed steal and was surprised to find he made it. Denny Walden walked and the sacks were jammed.

Joe Foley laid down a bunt in front of the plate, and Helthoff beat the force at home. With the sacks still loaded and only one out, Joe Badding was called out for attempting to bunt while standing on the plate.

The rain kept coming down and the Knights were more concerned about getting through Carroll's at-bat in the bottom of the fifth than they were in scoring more runs. So Don Baldus bunted foul three times to retire the side.

Kuemper prolonged the contest momentarily in the bottom of the fifth when the first Knight miscue put a runner on with one down, but Middendorf fanned Mickey Everett and got Bruce Pettitt on a pop to second to end the game.

The Tigers collected only two hits off Middendorf and neither figured in the scoring. Everett ripped a single to right in the first inning but was thrown out trying to steal second.

Jim Bell led off the bottom of the second with a single to center but was stranded at first. Roger Fuller fouled out to first and Gary Lehtkamp and Ron Anderson fanned to end that threat.

Carroll pushed a run over the plate in the third. Dave Baumhover drew a pass to start the rally and Jim DeBower sacrificed the runner to second.

A passed ball put Baumhover on third. Denny Vetter drew a pass and stole second. Everett was hit by a pitch to load the bases.

Pettitt was safe on a fielder's choice as Baumhover was forced at the plate.

Then Bell coaxed a pass to force in Vetter with the lone Tiger run in the game. Fuller fanned to end the rally.

Kuemper's first run came after Daeges led off with a single and Pat Riddle walked to set the stage. Middendorf's fielder's choice forced Daeges, but Riddle scored when a fly ball off the bat of Scott Schmitz was dropped in center field.

In the second, Foley was nicked by a pitch, Badding was safe on an error and Baldus was hit by a pitch. A passed ball scored Foley.

Daeges walked but Riddle bounced into a double play. Middendorf walked. A wild pitch scored Baldus and the Tigers came unglued when Middendorf went to second and Daeges sped home. Dick Helthoff followed with a single but got caught

in a run-down. The Knights batted around in the fourth. Daeges led off with a single and stole second. Riddle walked. Middendorf's infield single preceded successive passes to Helthoff and Schmitz.

Walden's chopper to third scored another run and kept the sacks jammed. Helthoff was forced on Foley's fielder's choice. Badding singled two runs home, and Baldus walked.

Daeges came up for the second time in the inning and singled two more runs across the plate before Riddle popped to third to end the 7-run uprising.

Kuemper was scheduled to be back in action here Thursday

in a sectional tournament quarter-final against Glidden-Ralston at 8 p.m.

## Northeast Iowa Streams Well-Stocked With Trout

Trout fishing in northeast Iowa is beginning to come into its own as rain-swollen streams are receding, allowing the Iowa Conservation Commission to get its stocking program underway.

Jerry Conley, assistant superintendent of fisheries for the commission, says all of the state's approximately 40 trout streams have now been stocked and fishing reports indicate the trout angling is good.

The state stocks each of the

streams with keeper size trout once a week, usually on Wednesday or Thursday, and the trout are ready for the weekend angler.

A mixture of approximately 60 per cent rainbow trout and 40 per cent brown trout are stocked. Some brook trout are also stocked on an availability basis.

The trout program in Iowa is operated on a "put and take" basis. Each angler must purchase a \$3 annual trout license and all the money, plus some additional state funds, is put back into the stocking pro-

gram to provide good trout fishing.

Conley said the program has developed to a point where there is a good carryover of trout in the streams from year to year through survival of the stock fish and propagation.

There is no closed season on trout in Iowa and the fisherman who wishes can fish the streams the year around, Conley said.

Of the species stocked, the brown trout is the hardest and seems to survive better than other varieties in warmer streams.

Trout will usually be found in the deepest water when the temperature is between 33 and 50 degrees. They favor deep pools, slower currents, and the deep water pockets beneath undercut banks.

Trout digest their food slower and are less active in water below 50 degrees. They seldom take artificial flies in water that cold.

When the water temperature is below 50 degrees the best trout catches are usually taken on a fly rod or spinning rod using natural baits.

Some of the preferred natural trout baits are nymphs or larvae of aquatic insects, small minnows and hellgrammites.

The most important thing in trout fishing is to remember to keep out of sight of the fish. When using a fly rod, the bait should be cast upstream and permitted to drift with the current into spots where trout are likely to be hiding.

A small, almost invisible leader approximately six feet in length should be used. Once the current begins to produce pull on the bait it should be recast.

If you plan to use spin casting gear, a small wobbling spoon is the most effective lure. Trout will take wet flies best in water with temperatures ranging from 50 to 55 degrees. Dry fly water temperatures should range from 55 to 68 degrees.

## Twins Run Wild; Win 2 From Sox

You couldn't blame Chicago pitchers if they saw Minnesota runners stealing bases in their sleep Wednesday night after the twinkietoed Twins ran and batted their way to a 9-8, 6-3 doubleheader sweep.

The chief culprit was Rod Carew, who stole home in the second inning of the opener for the seventh time this season, breaking the AL record of six set by Detroit's Ty Cobb in 1915 and matched by Cleveland's Bobby Roth two years later and equalling the major league mark established by Brooklyn's Pete Reiser in 1946.

Elsewhere, Oakland thumped Seattle 6-1, Baltimore nipped Cleveland 6-5 after losing 6-4, Boston downed the New York Yankees 6-2, Detroit blanked Washington 3-0 and California beat Kansas City 4-2.

The Twins started out by giving the White Sox a dose of power and then switching quickly to finesse. Rich Reese started the fireworks with a three-run homer in the first inning of the opener—and he drove in two later runs with another homer and a single.

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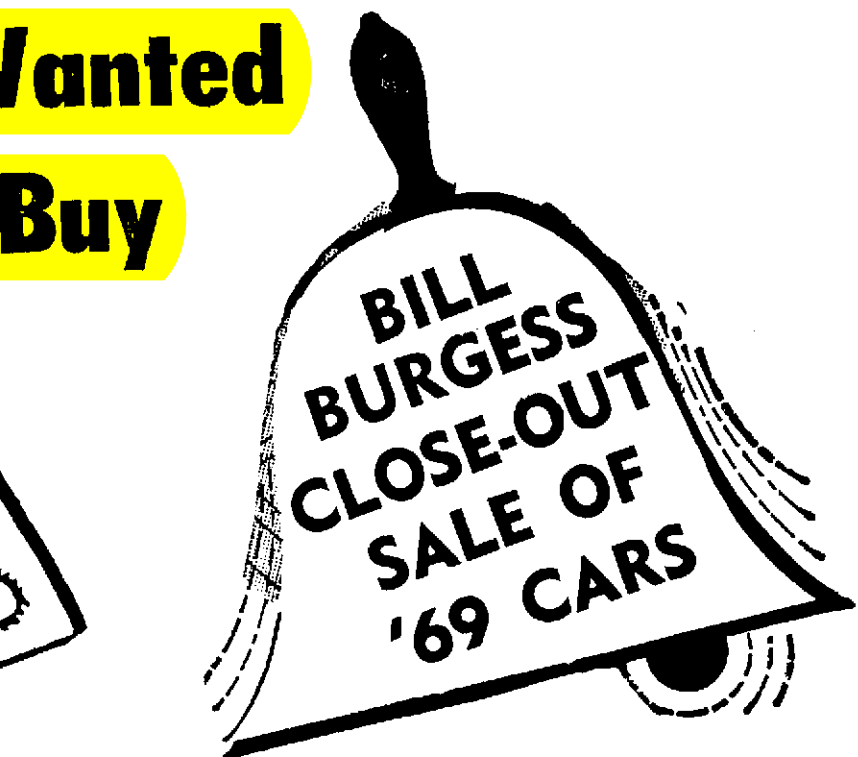
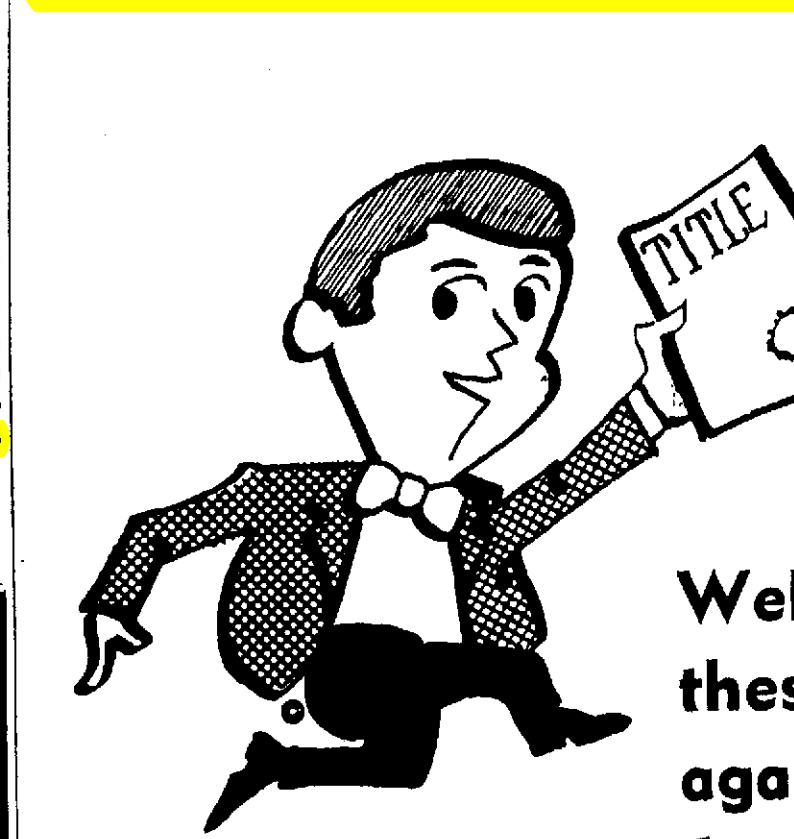
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
