

# Twins Decision Brewers in 4-3 Give-Away

 "They've been making errors for 100 years, since the game was invented," Dave Bristol said Monday night. Surprisingly, he wasn't referring to his Milwaukee Brewers.  
 Bristol had just seen his team commit four errors and botch up a wind-blown fly ball to help the Minnesota Twins to a 6-5 victory.  
 "Errors," Bristol sighed. "You can't do anything about them. Ours just came at an inopportune time."  
 Trailing 4-3 in the seventh inning, the Twins made the most of three Milwaukee errors, a

walk and Rich Reese's infield single — the only hit of the inning — for three runs.  
 Elsewhere in the American League, Baltimore whipped Cleveland 6-2, Detroit edged the New York Yankees 4-3, Boston downed Washington 5-3 and Kansas City trounced the Chicago White Sox 7-1. California and Oakland were not scheduled.  
 Cincinnati nipped San Diego 2-1 in the only National League action.  
 Aided by gusty winds, the baseballs started acting up in the very first inning of the Minnesota-Milwaukee game when Twins left fielder Jim Holt misjudged a fly ball and it fell

for a double.  
 Right fielder Tony Oliva bobbed. Russ Snyder's run-scoring single in the third for one of Minnesota's two miscues and the Brewers started their give-away program in the fourth.  
 First, right fielder Steve Hovley dropped Oliva's liner for a two-base error and then Harmon Killebrew's fly ball got caught in the breeze and fell behind Hovley and center fielder Snyder for a triple.

But the Brewers reached the heights of generosity in the seventh. For openers, shortstop Ted Kubiak booted George Mitterwald's grounder. With one out, Cesar Tovar's grounder went through third baseman Tommy Harper and there were runners at first and third.  
 Pitcher Skip Lockwood retired Rod Carew on a short fly for the second out, but made the mistake of letting Oliva hit the ball on the ground. Kubiak booted

this one, too, as the tying run scored. Killebrew walked, loading the bases, and Tovar and Oliva both raced home as Reese outlegged an infield hit and Lockwood couldn't handle first baseman Mike Hegan's throw.  
 The Twins tried to hand it back in the ninth. With two down, Harper doubled, Snyder singled him home and third baseman Frank Quiñi, just put in for defense, kicked Roberto Pena's grounder. But Oliva

made a fine catch of Danny Walton's high wind-blown pop fly to end the contest.  
 The Orioles scored three runs in each of the first two innings and rolled past the Indians on Dave McNally's six-hitter. Paul Blair started Baltimore off with a two-run double in the first. McNally, 8-2, lost his shutout in the ninth when Roy Foster hit a two-run homer.  
 Willie Horton hit a three-run

homer for the Tigers, but they needed Bill Freehan's leadoff round-tripper in the last of the ninth to edge the Yankees. Bobby Murcer homered for the Yanks, who tied the score in the top of the ninth on Horace Clarke's sacrifice fly.  
 Tony Conigliaro walloped two solo homers, Carl Yastrzemski hit one and Gerry Moses drove in two runs with a pair of doubles as the Red Sox turned back Washington.

Chicago batters singled, Morehead retired 19 in a row.  
 Morehead also drove in the first KC run with a second-inning double and the Royals went ahead in the fifth on a double by Ellie Rodriguez and Pat Kelly's single. They added five more in the eighth.  
 Pitcher Jim McGlothlin singled in the eighth inning and scored the winning run on Bobby Tolan's sacrifice fly in Cincinnati's win over San Diego. McGlothlin bruised a knee sliding home and Wayne Granger worked the last two innings.  
 The teams had been tied 1-1 on homers by Lee May of the Reds and Clarence Gaston of the Padres.

## \$4 Million In Player Benefits

NEW YORK (AP) — The major league baseball season will remain at 162 games but the players will be enriched shortly by nearly \$4 million in benefits when a new three-year contract is signed.  
 The agreement between the Major League Baseball Players Association and clubowners will give the players \$800,000 immediately, Marvin Miller, executive director of the association, said Monday.  
 He estimated that the players would benefit to the tune of \$4 million over the three years.  
 Miller, recommending acceptance of the pact, said all 24 player representatives had been

contacted and a final vote is due within a week. It is expected that the owners will ratify the package at the same time.  
 The players had rejected an earlier owners' proposal by a 505-89 vote, based on three major points of disagreement: the length of the season, playoff compensation and termination pay.  
 The clubowners won out on the issue of the 162-game regular season, citing long term radio and television contracts as factors.  
 However, on the playoff kitty, owners offered to increase the players' share from 50 per cent to 60 per cent, with all expenses coming out of the owners' share.
