

Tigers Split Twin Bill With Charter Oak-Ute

UTE — Steve Brechler whiffed thirteen batters and the Carroll Tigers notched a pair of unearned runs to edge the Charter Oak-Ute Bobcats, 2-0, in a non-league, two-night doubleheader here Wednesday evening. But the success was short-lived for the invading Bengals as the Bobcats turned the tables in the second half of the two-game feature and riddled the Tiger's defense, 13-7.

Only fifteen hits were scattered through the two five-inning contests. The opening match was a strong pitching duel between two of the outstanding hurlers of the Mid-West and Boyer Valley leagues. Brechler, making his first appearance for the Tigers in two years, held the Charter Oak-Ute crew to one hit, walked only two, and struck out thirteen. The Bob-

cat's lanky southpaw, Mark Gries responded in like fashion with a one-hitter on three walks, and eleven strike-outs over a four-inning stretch on the mound.

Carroll's Bruce Pettitt and the Bobcat's Steve Knutzen picked up the only base hits during the game, however, both batters were stranded on base. The Tigers picked up their lone runs on a pair of third-inning errors, combined with three bases on balls, issued to Pettitt, Brechler, and Roger Fuller.

The Tigers hopped to an early 1-0 lead in the top half of the first inning of the second game. Brechler opened things for the Carroll club with a bumpy grounder between first base and the mound. Fuller, Doug Peterson, and Craig Edwards were issued consecutive passes and Brechler walked across the plate unmolested. The Bobcats struck back

furiouly in the bottom half of the first frame, opening the flood gates with a five-run outburst. Leon Fester led off with a one-bagger over second and Dave Seiroe was dusted by a pitch and sent to first. Carroll's catcher, Dave Baumhover could not find the handle on the ball and a pair of runs crossed the plate on passed balls.

Mark Kuhlmann reached first on a third base error to keep the rally alive and Don Gosch joined him with a base on balls. Ross Schultz took a free pass to first to load the bases and a wild pitch sent Kuhlmann across the plate for the third run. Carroll pitcher, Mark Henning ran into control problems and walked two more runs across the plate to raise the Bobcats tally to five runs.

Pettitt notched another Carroll run in the top of the second with the first of his three hits, but the Charter Oak-Ute crew responded in the bottom half

of that frame with a three-run cushion on another set of passed balls.

The Tigers inched forward with another tally in the top of the third on Ron Anderson's sacrifice fly to right field, but the Bobcats exploded for five more runs in the bottom of the third.

Henning gave up the mound midway in the second frame to Doug Peterson, a husky sophomore, who sports stylish sideburns and a moustache. After the third inning, Peterson probably would have liked to return the mound duties to his predecessor. Peterson sent Mike Phipps back to the bench with strikes, but gave up a pass to Fester. Fester stole second, but Peterson whiffed Seiroe. Another passed ball gave Fester the

green light to third and Don Kuhlmann singled in the first run. Mark Kuhlmann reached first on balls and Gosch kept the steam on with a tap to left.

Don Kiepe drew a pass to first to keep the fire alive and Schultz capped the inning with an arching two-run triple to deep left to give the Bobcats a commanding 13-3 lead. Carroll forced itself into the slug-fest in the fourth frame, combining singles by Pettitt, Fuller, and Peterson for three runs, setting the score at 13-6.

Pettitt was Carroll's third pitcher in the fourth frame and the veteran hurler held the Bobcats to their first scoreless inning of the game. Pettitt added to his cause in the fifth inning with a triple to deep center field that notched the Tigers their seventh run, but the effort was too late and the Bobcats

left the field with a 13-7 victory.

The Tigers will be in action on Friday, May 29, when they play host at the Carroll Stadium to the Denison Monarchs. The contest is slated for 8 p.m.

 The home run is the ultimate achievement for a hitter—something Deron Johnson knows all about. Johnson has hit 133 of them in his career. Homers are old stuff for him. Gil Garrido has hit one. For him, it was a wonderful new experience.

Johnson cracked his 10th homer of the season Wednesday night — a three-run shot in the ninth inning that gave Woody Fryman all the runs in Philadelphia's 3-0 victory over Montreal.

"I knew it was out of the park the moment it left my bat," said Johnson, who's learned to recognize the feeling of a homer.

Garrido connected along with Orlando Cepeda in a six-run second inning that moved Atlanta to an 8-1 victory over Houston. It was the very first in the majors for the 160-pound slugger.

"I didn't know it was going out," said Garrido. "I don't hit them that often. When I got to the dugout, everybody was laughing. They told me they were going to faint."

Elsewhere in the National League Wednesday, New York shut out St. Louis 3-0, San Francisco battered Los Angeles 11-3, Pittsburgh blanked Chicago 4-0 and Cincinnati clipped San Di-

ego 6-4. In the American League, Washington tripped Boston 7-5, Baltimore edged Cleveland 5-4, Kansas City nipped Chicago 4-3, New York trimmed Detroit 4-2 and Oakland topped California 4-2. Milwaukee's game at Minnesota was postponed by rain.

Johnson's homer was the second time in as many nights that the Expos were cut down on a three-run shot in the ninth by a Phillie. On Tuesday, Tony Taylor hit one to win a game.

Sac City Honors Tolan Next Week

SAC CITY — A former resident of Sac City will be "King for a Day" here June 3 at a dedication ceremony honoring the man who has been tabbed the "father" of Little League baseball in the "Home of Good Indians."

The ceremony that day will feature the renaming of Indian Field, home of the Little Leaguers, to Tolan Field in honor of Msgr. J. E. Tolan, now at Humboldt.

Prior to the field festivities, the schedule for the "Day of the JET" will include the noon luncheon by the Youth Baseball Auxiliary at the Sac Country Club; a baseball clinic for boys eight to 12 conducted by leading baseball coaches in the state of Iowa, and a "Ballorama" parade (originated many years ago by Father Tolan) through the city to the ball diamond with the guest of honor as parade marshal.

In reference to baseball, Father Tolan literally started with

nothing and built the Sac City program into a state winner in approximately 15 years.

He arrived in Sac City in 1948 as parish priest of St. Mary's Catholic Church with a religious responsibility and a year to set up a needed plan for boy's recreation.

Starting with a small group of young boys in the spring of 1949, without uniforms, equipment or charter, Father Tolan built up a coordinated and self-sustaining program of eight ball teams involving 150 boys between the ages of 8 and 15 years.

The program is still flourishing today.

After winning numerous league and district championships in Midget, Babe Ruth, and Little League ball, representatives of Msgr. Tolan's last Sac City Little League team were members of the Sac County All-Star team which won the coveted Iowa State Little League Championship in 1963.
