

Kuemper Leads Loop On 10-3 Win Over Perry

The Kuemper Knights moved into sole possession of first place in the eastern division of the Mid-West League with a 10-3 decision over Perry here Wednesday night.

Kuemper will be back in action on Friday at Lake City with Alvie Irlbeck on the mound in the conference game at 8 p.m. Des Moines Dowling will be in Carroll on Saturday for two non-conference games against the Knights. Reserves will play at 6 p.m. and the varsity at 8 p.m. Randy Lengeling and Bill Henkenius will draw the mound assignments for the twin bill.

Henkenius picked up his second win on the season and surrendered his first earned run in

the 10-3 win over Perry. The Kuemper southpaw ace checked the Bluejays on three hits during the first six frames.

"I threw harder in the last inning than at any other time during the game," Henkenius said after he extricated himself from a king-sized jam in the seventh.

The battling Bluejays teed off on Henkenius in the top of the seventh when Stech opened with a single. Bristle was safe on an error and Murphy singled Stech home. Leslie followed with a

single and the bases were jammed with no outs.

Henkenius finished with a flourish by fanning the next three batters. Gary Negley, who had singled and doubled in two previous trips, went down on strikes for the first out. Then Volz and Whiton became strike-out victims to end the fray.

The Kuemper mound ace was charged with three runs of which one was earned. He yielded six hits, walked one and fanned 11 batters.

Kuemper took picks on the right-handed offerings of Monty Main with two runs in the first, four in the second, single tallies in the third and fifth and two more in the sixth before Leslie came on in relief in the sixth.

Jerry Hermesen lived on a fielder's choice in the first and moved up on an errant pick-off attempt.

Henkenius brought Hermesen home with a single to center and took second on an unsuccessful attempt to nail Hermesen at the plate. Pat Riddle drove a single to right and Henkenius scooted home with the second run.

Rich Golwitzer ignited a Charger explosion in the bottom of the second with one down. Golwitzer coaxed a pass to first and Dan Nurse followed with a sharp single to center. Don Baldus singled to left and Golwitzer scored. An error on the Perry left fielder let Nurse go to third and Baldus to second.

Hermesen's single to center plated Nurse and Baldus, and Hermesen scored on a double by Henkenius down the right field line.

Kuemper padded the lead in the third when Dan Schmitz walked to lead off. Steve Auen singled to right. Golwitzer was safe on a bobble by the third baseman as Schmitz made it from second to third.

Auen rounded second and was trapped off, but Perry missed the tag on the runner as Auen got back to second, and then an errant throw by the second baseman failed to get Schmitz speeding to the plate.

Dan Nurse fanned and Baldus popped to first. Then Auen was nailed trying to steal third and end the frame.

Schmitz walked to lead off the fifth for the Knights. Auen dropped a bunt in front of the plate and was safe on an error by the catcher that let Schmitz speed home.

Golwitzer was hit by a pitch and the Knights had two runners aboard with none down but couldn't cash a n o t h e r run in that inning.

In the sixth, Henkenius was safe on an error with one down and took second on a passed

ball. Riddle lived on an error at second and Henkenius raced home.

Riddle went from second to third on a passed ball and Schmitz drew a pass and stole second. Leslie was brought on in relief and promptly walked Auen to load the sacks. Golwitzer lofted a sacrifice fly to right to plate Riddle. Then Dan Nurse fanned to end the sixth.

Perry's first run came in the third when Connors lived on an infield error with one down and Negley followed with a single and an outfield error let Connors ride home.

In the fifth the Bluejays got a two-out rally under way when Connors singled to center and Negley advanced him to third with a double.

Hill Effective In Relief Role—

Jefferson Nips Tigers In 9th, 4-3

JEFFERSON — Lady luck does not seem to visit the Carroll Tiger camp any more. The scrappy Bengals thought they had a 3-2 victory wrapped up here Wednesday evening after one and one-half innings of extra play, but the Jefferson Rams utilized a Carroll error, passed ball, balk, and a wild pitch, in consecutive order, to turn the tide for a 4-3 win over Carroll in a Mid-West League, eastern division contest.

The game extended over a nine-inning stretch as both clubs attempted to fight off a strangling 2-2 tie. The Ti-

gers, recovering from their 11-0 clubbing by Kuemper Monday evening, put on an outstanding defensive display which Coach Jerry Hanson termed "one of the best Carroll games in two years." Carroll was lacking two of its regular starters, Roger Fuller, who is out with an injured foot, and Jim DeBower, who was sidelined with back trouble.

Sophomore Wayne Hill made his first appearance on the mound for the Tigers, relieving Steve Brechler in the second frame. The young right-hander

held the Rams to four hits throughout his seven-inning stretch, and struck out nine batters.

The Rams leaped to an early lead in the second inning with a pair of runs. Dan Lehman led off with a base on balls, while Tom Lynch lined to left for the first out. Al Durbin reached first on a shortstop error and both baserunners advanced on steals. A pick-off throw to second was off target and Lehman scampers in for the first tally. Durbin took third on a steal and a passed ball set the stage for the second Jef-

ferson run.

Craig Edwards got things underway for Carroll in the top of the third with a long drive to left which bounced over the fence for an automatic double. Ron Anderson smacked a line drive up the center to score Edwards for Carroll's only run of the inning.

The Tigers pushed into the scoring column again in the fifth, tying the score at two apiece. Gary Lehrkamp did it all by himself — the running, that is — while the Jefferson defense bobbled the ball three times to send Lehrkamp around the bases unmolessted.

The two clubs entered the final two innings of regulation play at a stalemate, neither team breaking the tie. Carroll threatened in the eighth frame, but a pair of fielder's choices kept the Tigers out of scoring position.

Carroll finally broke the tie in the top of the ninth on a run-scoring sacrifice bunt by Anderson. Doug Peterson led off the inning with a one-bagger to right-center field and a pair of Jefferson errors loaded the bases. Anderson's bunt scored Peterson from third, but Ram hurler, Lynch, bailed himself out of the bind with a pair of strikeouts and a fly-out to right field.

With a 3-2 advantage in the last of the ninth, the game suddenly fell in on the Tigers. An error at second base put Lehman safely on first and a passed ball sent him to second. Durbin's line drive through the key hole scored Lehman and tied the score at 3-3.

Durbin stole second and was motioned to third on a balk charged against Hill. The Tigers set their defense once more, but Hill tossed a pitch into the

dirt and Durbin broke for pay dirt, scoring the fourth Jefferson run.

Carroll will host the Audubon Wheelers tonight at Carroll Stadium in a make-up doubleheader at 7:30 p.m.

Yanks And Birds Post 2-1 Margins

"Hit 'em where they ain't," said a rather ungrammatical Wee Willie Keeler in baseball's long lost past. He would have loved the job the Baltimore Orioles did with that strategy Wednesday night.

The Orioles, perhaps beginning to feel the hot breath of the surprising New York Yankees on their backs, had a couple of hits fall just beyond the reach of California fielders and it added up to the winning run in a 2-1 victory over the Angels.

That triumph kept Baltimore 4½ games ahead of the red-hot Yankees in the suddenly developing American League East race. New York nipped Minnesota 2-1 for its seventh victory in the last eight games. Elsewhere in the AL, Detroit trimmed Milwaukee 7-5, Washington belted Kansas City 8-1, Oakland downed Cleveland 6-4 and Boston nipped Chicago 7-6 in 14 innings.

In National League action, it was Houston (5-3) over New York; Cincinnati 7, Montreal 0; Atlanta 5-1 over Philadelphia; San Francisco 4, Pittsburgh 2; San Diego 11, Chicago 8, and Los Angeles 4, St. Louis 2.

The Orioles scored a run without a hit in the first inning and Jim Palmer made it stand up until the seventh when California's Jay Johnstone homered to tie the score. Then in the bottom of the seventh, things started going Baltimore's way.


