

Tigers Trim Audubon On Peterson's 3-Hitter

Sophomore fireballer, Doug Peterson, hurled a three-hitter and the Carroll Tigers converted four sixth inning errors and a wild pitch into four runs, to topple the Audubon Wheelers, 6-2, in a Mid-West League baseball contest here Thursday evening.

Peterson, making his first starting appearance on the mound for the Tigers, held the Audubon club to three singles through the seven-inning stretch, while the Carroll defense clamped down and limited itself to only two errors. Warren Campbell turned in a creditable performance on the mound for Audubon, holding the Tigers to two hits

during his five and one-third inning stint, but the Wheeler defense slackened for six errors.

The final score is not indicative of the initial two innings. The Audubon crew leaped to an early first inning lead, 2-0. Jeff Hansen was the first Wheeler batter to face Peterson and he responded with a sharp single over third base. A pair of passed balls sent Hansen scampering around to third and a wild pitch gave Audubon first blood.

Warren Campbell rapped an infield bouncer, but the throw to first was fumbled. Campbell charged to second on a steal and took third on a passed ball.

John Sklenar sacrificed to deep right field to score the second Audubon tally.

Steve Brechler reached second base on an error in the bottom of the first, but the Carroll Club could not mount the steam to push him across the plate.

Both teams went down in order in the second frame, but the Tigers got into the scoring act in the bottom of the third inning. Ron Anderson led off with an infield single and Roy Van Scoy smacked a line drive into right field to send Anderson around to third base. Wayne Hill's tap to shortstop was bobbled and Anderson scored the first Carroll run. Randy Plotz lived on a fielder's choice

and Van Scoy raced across the plate to tie the score at two apiece.

Neither team could break the deadlock through the fourth and fifth frames. The bottom half of the sixth inning turned out to be the beginning of the end for the Audubon cause. The Bengals only needed two hits in that inning for their four-run outburst, while the Wheelers provided four costly errors and a wild pitch.

Steve Brechler took a called strike three, but Audubon catcher, Sklenar, lost the last pitch and Brechler raced for first safely. Brechler grabbed second on a steal and Bruce Pettitt hit into an error to

advance Brechler into scoring position. Martin Sprock took over the pitching duties as Peterson advanced to the batter's box. Peterson nudged a squeeze bunt toward first base, and the throw to the plate went awry, scoring Brechler from third and saving Peterson at first.

Gary Lehrkamp kept the fire alive with a two-run single to right and advanced to third on an errant throw. Lehrkamp scored the sixth Carroll run on a wild pitch, just before Roger

Fuller smashed a pinch hit double to deep left.

The Audubon crew fought back in the top of the last frame, putting Wesson on the base paths with an error. Peterson fanned pinch hitter, Ron Rustvoldt, while Rick Peterson hit into a fielder's choice that nailed Wesson at second base. Pinch hitter, Craig Young was Peterson's tenth strike-out victim to retire the side, and end the game with Carroll on the top end of a 6-2 margin.

The Tigers will be in action again on Monday, June 15, hosting the Perry Bluejays in an eastern division league game. The two teams will square off at the Carroll Stadium at 8 p.m.

Unity Key By Elliott For Hawks

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — Chalmers B. "Bump" Elliott, named athletic director at the University of Iowa Thursday, has a good head start toward winning the devotion of Hawkeye football fans—who are both legion and vociferous.

Elliott, 45, became popular with many fans during five years (1952-56) as an assistant Iowa football coach under Forest Evashevski, the man he will replace as athletic director

and who recommended him for the job. "My wife and I have reflected many times on our fine years at Iowa City," Elliott told a news conference after his appointment was approved by the State Board of Regents Thursday. "I'm deeply honored to return to Iowa as athletic director."

Elliott left Iowa in 1958 to return to his alma mater, the University of Michigan, as a backfield coach. He was promoted to head coach in 1958 with the retirement of Bennie Oesterban.

He coached the Wolverines to a nine-year record of 51-42-3, including Big Ten and Rose Bowl championships in 1964, before taking over as Michigan associate athletic director in 1968.

Elliott steps into a tight situation at Iowa. Evashevski's resignation last month was the culmination of a feud with head football coach Ray Nagel, who was relieved of his duties the day Evashevski resigned only to be reinstated four days later. But Elliott expressed optimism about the future Thursday.

"If we are all trying to win at Iowa then we have to work together," said the man Evashevski had recommended as being the one to unify the athletic program again. "I think this can be done and will be done."

Elliott said his main objective will be "pulling together of not only the staff but the administration in one set effort to have an outstanding athletic program at Iowa."

On the program, he said, "I'm impressed with the facilities at Iowa. The athletic plans look very good to me."

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Double Play Saves Hands As Cubs Whip Padres, 7-1

If runs and double plays are a pitcher's best friends, Bill Hands of the Chicago Cubs isn't lacking for companionship this season.

The right-hander, who won 20 games and was one of the few bright spots in the Cubs' stretch collapse last year, got some of each Thursday night in turning back the San Diego Padres 7-1 and boosting his record to 8-4.

The double plays cropped up when Hands needed them most. The Padres had tied the score 1-1 in the last of the first and had the bases loaded, but Hands induced Ivan Murrell to bounce into an inning-ending double play.

A single and a walk had Hands in trouble to start the second, but Jim Hickman started a snappy first-to-third-to-second twin killing on Mike Corkins' bunt and Hands fanned Dave Campbell. Then he settled down.

Hands scattered six hits, struck out one batter in each of the first eight innings and snapped a personal two-game losing streak.

The difference between this year and last, when Hands got off to a 5-5 start, is the runs the Cubs are scoring for him.

"All these runs being scored for me this year should be a good omen. I've always been a notoriously slow starter. And I have had a few mediocre performances that have turned out

well because of the strong support."

Maury Wills opened the Dodgers' 12th with a single, took second on Frank Linzy's wild pitch and scored the winning run on a double by Willie Davis to topple the Cardinals.

Starters Don Sutton of Los Angeles and Steve Carlton of St. Louis battled through 10 innings locked in a 1-1 tie. The Cards scored in the fourth on singles by Richie Allen and Joe Torre and Joe Hague's sacrifice fly and the Dodgers tied it up in their half of the inning on Manny Mota's second homer of the season.

Hands hit a sacrifice fly in the third and Jim Hickman hampered his 14th homer in the sixth following a Williams single. The Cubs got their final run in the seventh on doubles by James and Paul Popovich.

Next action for the Carroll Women's team will be against the Carroll Girls' team next Thursday.




