

Tigers Drop 5-3 Decision To Breda Bobcats

A pair of unearned runs spelled defeat for the Carroll Tigers here Wednesday evening as they dropped their second loss of the 1970 season to the Breda Bobcats of St. Bernard's High School, 5-3.

It was a tooth and nail struggle for Coach Jerry Hanson's crew who fought their way out of a 3-0 deficit in the opening three frames. But the Bobcats managed to push a pair of runs over the plate in the fourth and sixth innings on Carroll errors.

Breda pushed itself into an early lead in the top of the first,

combining three hits for a pair of runs. Gerald and Glen Koster and Mike Steinkamp had consecutive singles, but a balk charged against Carroll pitcher, Bruce Pettitt, provided the green light for the two runs.

Ken Steinkamp added another run to Breda's tally in the top of the third with a one-bagger and three stolen bases.

The Bengals stormed back in the bottom half of that inning with a three-run burst to tie the score. Jim DeBower led off with a tap over shortstop. Ron Anderson's shot to right was fumbled, sending DeBower across the plate safely with Anderson

perched in scoring position at third base Gary Lehrkamp and Pettitt were fly-out victims, but Steve Brechler rapped one to left field to score Anderson. Roger Fuller followed with another single, but Doug Peterson went down on strikes to end the rally.

A pair of errors at second base gave Breda the go-ahead for a tie-breaking run in the top of the fourth inning. Joe Schwabe's grounder to second was bobbled to save him at first. Jim Kennebeck sacrificed Schwabe to second, while Bob Polking's rap to second was again fouled up, sending

Schwabe around for Breda's fourth run.

The Carroll club traveled a three up, three down route in the next two frames, but the Bobcats were not content with their narrow margin. Steve Brechler had relieved Pettitt on the mound in the fifth inning and responded with three strike-outs. He opened the sixth frame with another pair of strike-outs, however Carroll's catcher, Fuller, lost the third strike on Kennebeck and

Kennebeck romped to first base safely.

Lee Buelt pushed Kennebeck to second with a base on balls and Russ Polking's fielder's choice failed to stop Kennebeck at third. Fuller was victimized by another passed ball and Kennebeck slid into the plate for the sixth tally.

The Bobcats threatened again in the seventh frame, but Brechler posted his seventh, eighth, and ninth strike-outs to end the Breda hopes.

The Tigers could not mount sufficient steam in the last of the seventh and the Breda team

left the stadium with a 5-3 victory.

The Tigers trek to Lake City Friday evening for their first eastern division encounter in the Midwest League. Game time is slated for 8 p.m.

Casanova Paces Senators Past Chisox

Paul Casanova just loves those Chicago White Sox pitchers—Tommy John in particular—while Duke Sims is taking his anger out on the Milwaukee Brewers and the Fourth Estate.

Casanova rendered John speechless Wednesday night with his third straight 3-for-3 game against the White Sox lefty as Washington rallied for a 5-4 victory.

Sims, Cleveland's catcher-turned-outfielder, belted two homers for the second game in a row in a 7-6 triumph over the Brewers and then tried to disprove Leo Durocher's theory that nice guys finish last by refusing to talk to the press.

New York Yankees topped Kansas City 5-3. Minnesota at Boston was rained out.

Casanova, whose streak against John dates back to last season, singled in the third inning, doubled home the final two runs of a four-run fourth and singled in the sixth. Besides going 9-for-9 against John in their last three meetings, Casanova has driven in 10 runs over that stretch.

Sims, reportedly irked because a newsman allegedly misquoted him, got the Indians started with a three-run homer in the first inning and connected again in the third to snap a 4-4 tie. That gave him three consecutive homers, including his last time at bat Tuesday night, but he grounded into a double play on his next trip.

The Brewers scored twice in the eighth to trim a 7-4 deficit and loaded the bases with one out in the ninth. But Dennis Higgins fanned Steve Hovley and Dick Ellsworth came on with a

3-0 count on Tommy Harper, who had homered earlier, and got him to bounce into a force play on the 3-1 pitch.

Sal Bando walloped a three-run tie-breaking homer off Baltimore's Mike Cuellar in the eighth inning to lift the A's to victory. Oakland's Frank Fernandez hit a solo homer in the second while Frank Robinson matched that for the Orioles in the seventh.

Robinson's blow was one of only two hits off Oakland starter Roland Fingers, who left for a pinch hitter in the eighth.

The Tigers, held to two hits

and trailing the Angels 3-0, erupted for four runs in the ninth against Andy Messersmith and two relievers. Gates Brown started it with a pinch homer and Jim Northrup cracked a three-run homer with two out to put the Tigers in front 4-3.

The Angels tied it in the last of the ninth on Alex Johnson's run-scoring single, but Detroit won it in the 11th when Stanley singled, stole second and scored on a single by Willie Horton.

The Yankees trailed the Royals 3-2 with one out in the fifth when they kayoed Dick Darg with three consecutive extra-base hits—a triple by Bobby Murcer, Roy White's game-

tying double and Danny Cater's fourth homer.

Bunning, Aguirre, Gibson Post National League Wins

There's still some life left in the elderly pitching arms of Jim Bunning and Hank Aguirre—the hurlers nobody wanted—and Bob Gibson's batting eye isn't gone quite yet, either.

The three veteran pitchers all enjoyed banner performances Wednesday, helping their teams to victories in the rain-abbreviated National League schedule.

Bunning passed the 2,700 career strikeout mark—third on the alltime list behind only Cy Young and Walter Johnson—as Philadelphia thumped Cincinnati 11-4. Aguirre won his third game—his highest total since 1966—helping Chicago top Los Angeles 6-5 in 11 innings. And Gibson ripped three hits including a seventh inning single that broke a tie and moved St. Louis to a 6-5 victory over San Francisco.

In the only other National League game played, Houston's Jack Billingham shut out Mont-

real 5-0. New York at Atlanta and San Diego at Pittsburgh were both postponed by rain.

Bunning pitched the first six innings against the Reds and then Dick Selma finished up as Philadelphia exploded for seven runs in its last three swings to end a five-game Cincinnati winning streak.

Larry Hise's bases-loaded, two-out single broke a 4-4 tie in the seventh and then the Phillies added five wrapup runs in the ninth, two on a single by Tony Taylor, who had opened the game with a first pitch homer.

Bunning, a free-agent pickup over the winter, won his third game—not a terribly large number for most pitchers but an important plateau for Chicago's Aguirre, another ex-free agent who had not managed that many in four seasons.

Aguirre pitched the last two innings of the Cubs' 11-inning victory over Los Angeles and became the winner when hot-hitting Jim Hickman singled

the deciding run home. Hickman, on a 12-for-27 streak with 11 runs batted in and four homers over the last eight games, con on an 0-2 pitch to drive Beckett from second. Beckert and Billy William, stroked singles, setting up the winning rally.

Gibson went the distance and it was a good thing because he did a major part of the Cardinals' hitting. He singled home a run in the second inning and singled again, setting up a run in the fourth. Then he tapped a 3-2 pitch into right field to climax the Cardinals' winning rally in the seventh.

The Giants tagged Gibson for eight hits and had him on the ropes early but couldn't deliver the knockout punch.

Billingham, making his first start of the year, extended his shutout string to 20 innings with his whitewash against Montreal. The tall right-hander scattered eight hits and struck out 10 Expos.
