

Kuemper Blanks Jeff, 1-0 On Henkenius 3 Hitter

Bill Henkenius, Kuemper's southpaw mound ace, pitched and batted the Knights to a 1-0 victory over Jefferson in the eastern division of the Mid-West baseball league here Friday night.

Henkenius blanked the Rams on three hits, fanned 12, and doubled home the winning run in the sixth inning.

The Knights take a breather from conference action tonight when they host the Breda Bohcats in a game at 8 p.m. in Carroll Stadium.

It was the second shut-out win in as many days when the Knights bested the Rams here Friday. On Thursday KHS blanked Paton-Churdan, 7-0.

Henkenius found himself locked in a stirring mound duel with Jefferson's Jim Faaborg who limited the Red and Gold to four safeties and fanned 12 over the seven inning route.

Jim Nurse ignited Kuemper's winning rally in the bottom of the sixth when he led off with an infield hit on a dribbler to third. The Jefferson third baseman made a desperate but futile effort to get Nurse at first and heaved the ball into the right field bull pen.

Nurse alertly took third on the two-base throwing error

and actually could have scored at that time because the Jefferson catcher, pitcher and first baseman all converged on the area of the overthrow and left home plate unprotected.

The oversight appeared academic at the time with none down and clean-up hitter Dan Schmitz and No. 5 hitter Lon Dentlinger coming up. But Schmitz and Dentlinger went down on strikes and Nurse remained perched on third.

That left it squarely up to Henkenius and he responded with a booming double to right-center that sailed over the heads of the Jefferson outfielders. Nurse, who could have scored from first with two down, merely trotted home from the third and counted the winning run.

The Knights didn't mount many threats as they were victimized by Faaborg's curve. Don Baldus got to second in the first, but three successive whiffs foiled that bid. Pat Riddle reached second in the third and was stranded.

Kuemper had a good threat under way in the fifth when Jim Baldus was hit by a pitch. Pinch-runner Golwitzer was safe at second on Riddle's fielder's choice and both run-

ners moved up on a ground-out by Don Baldus. But with two down, Jerry Hermesen fanned.

Henkenius survived three threats in which the Rams had runners in scoring position. Mike Wolterman doubled to right with one down in the first. Faaborg drove a sharp grounder to short, and Nurse made a flawless play and went to third in time to nail Wolterman. Henkenius then fanned clean-up hitter John Shanda to retire the side.

In the third, Dan Murphy walked with two down and stole second, but Wolterman was up next and fanned. In the fourth, Faaborg led off with an infield single and took second on a passed ball. Henkenius buckled to the task and fanned Shanda and Dan Lehman and induced Jeff Raaz to fly to left.

The Rams got Wolterman aboard via his second hit with one down in the sixth. After Faaborg skied to left, Wolterman was thrown out stealing to check the last Jefferson threat.

Brechler Spins Two Hitter In Tiger Win Over Eagles

LAKE CITY - Steve Brechler hurled a brilliant two-hitter, and the Carroll Tigers scattered 14 hits to sink the Lake City Eagles, 7-5, in a Midwest League eastern division contest here Friday evening.

It was the first eastern division encounter for the Tigers who came into the fray with a 1-2 record. But the vic-

tory did not come easy. Carroll's defensive unit slackened during the final two innings and surrendered four unearned runs to Lake City. Brechler, pitching with a sore arm after the third frame, saved the game for the Tigers with five of his 13 strikeouts in the last two innings.

After a stale first inning for

both clubs, Randy Plotz got things rolling for Carroll in the top of the second with an arching triple to deep right field. Jim DeBower, Carroll's lanky first baseman, followed Plotz in the batting order and cracked a two-bagger to score the first run.

The Carroll battery and Coach Jerry Hanson hotly disputed the calls of plate umpire Lee Campbell in the bottom of the second inning, but to no avail. Four Lake City batters were issued free passes to first, giving Lake City their lone run of the inning and tying the score at one apiece.

The Tigers forced a two-run tie-breaker in the third frame on consecutive singles by Bruce Pettitt, Brechler, Roger Fuller, and Doug Peterson.

Brechler continued to hold the Eagles hitless through the next three frames, while the Carroll Club notched another tally in the top of the fifth. Brechler opened that inning with a rap to left and scampered to second base on an error. Peterson slammed a double to right-center field to score Brechler and give Carroll a 4-1 margin.

The Bengals reared into action again in the sixth with a three-run outburst. Wayne Hill reached first on an error and advanced on Bob Baudler's pinch hit single through the keyhole. Gary Lehrkamp brought both runners across the plate safely on a double to deep left field. Pettitt kept things alive with a smack over shortstop to score Lehrkamp for Carroll's seventh tally.

The Eagles took over the scoring duties in the bottom of the sixth with a pair of runs. Mike Remsburg reached first with a base on balls, but Dean Hoover was fanned by Brechler. Neil Dial lived on a first base error, and Remsburg scampered over the plate for the first run. Dave
