

# Tigers Oust Breda In Sectional Fray, 4-3

Bruce Pettitt rifled a run-scoring clutch shot to deep right field in the bottom of the seventh frame to give the Carroll Tigers a 4-3 edge over the Breda Bobcats of St. Bernard's High School in the opening round of Boys High School Sectional Baseball here Wednesday evening.

The Tigers are slated to square off against the Kuemper Knights, who drew a bye in the opening round, in the quarter finals of sectional play tonight at 8 p.m. The opening contest at Carroll Stadium will pit the Denison Monarchs, who bombed Glid-

den-Ralston, 10-0, in the first round, against the Lake City Eagles. That game is scheduled for 6 p.m.

Carroll hurlers, Doug Peterson and Steve Brechler, combined to stymie the Bobcats on two hits. Peterson surrendered a pair of hits during his six and one-third inning stint on the mound. The husky right-hander got himself into trouble with one out in the seventh and the Bobcats trailing by a run. Brechler came to the mound in relief, but the Breda club slipped the tying run over the plate on three passed balls before the Carroll southpaw retired the side.

Peterson and Brechler were also the big men in the hitting line-up for Carroll. Peterson stroked a pair of singles and a booming triple to right field, while Brechler cracked a one-bagger and an inside-the-park homer.

The Tigers ripped off a pair of runs in the bottom of the third inning to take an early lead in the ball game. Gary Lehrkamp led off with a line drive to left and advanced to second on an errant throw from the plate. Ron Anderson and Pettitt were strike-out victims, but Brechler plated Lehrkamp with a single.

Peterson followed with a one-bagger to score Brechler for the second tally. Roger Fuller flew out to center field to retire the side.

The Bobcats could not get a base runner past second in the opening five frames, while the Tigers added another run to their total in the bottom of the fifth on Brechler's home run blast that bounced and rolled to the 392 foot mark in left-center field.

Breda rallied in the top of the sixth inning with a two-run outburst. Peterson issued consecutive passes to Lee Buelt

and Jim Kennebeck to place the Bobcats in scoring position. Bob Polking fanned for the first out, but Jerry Koster's slow grounder between shortstop and third base was left untouched to load the sacks.

The Tigers bought time on Glen Koster's pop-up to first for the second out, but the encouragement did not last for long. Mike Steinkamp was whacked in the shoulder by a pitch to force the first run over the plate. A wild pitch was Jerry Koster's green light for the plate and Breda forged to within one run of the Carroll total. Joe Schwabe whiffed for the third out.

The Bengals went three up,

three down in the bottom of the sixth frame before the Bobcats forced a deadlock in the top of the seventh.

Russ Polking took a base on balls in the lead off role in the top of the seventh inning. Peterson ran into control problems and surrendered the mound duties to Brechler. Carroll catcher, Bob Baudler found difficulties in adjusting to the new pitcher and let a passed ball advance Polking to second base. Baudler rectified the miscue with a pick-off play to third base for the first out. Mike Nieland drew a pass, but Baudler's difficulties behind the plate continued and three passed balls sent Nieland around the bases to tie up the score at three apiece.

The Carroll club took advantage of their last chance to break the tie. Anderson walked and stole second base to give the Tigers a scoring threat. Pettitt rammed a long drive to deep right field for extra bases as Anderson scored to win the game and Pettitt was credited with a run-scoring double.

out in the bottom of the first inning with Denison leading 2-0 on no hits at that point. Those runs came on a walk to Ed Fink, a passed ball, an infield error, a sacrifice pop in foul territory back of first after which Fink scored, and another error.

The lone earned run off Glidden-Ralston starting hurler Randy Braden came in the second inning here Wednesday.

Tom Barnes beat out an infield hit with one down and took second on a passed ball. Chip McGinn doubled to center and Barnes cruised home

with Denison's third run.

That uprising was cut short after Randy Ulmer walked and McGinn was shot down trying to steal third and Fink grounded out.

The Wildcats, who are now 5-8 on the season compared to Denison's 7-9 record, had a threat going in the bottom of the first Wednesday. With two down, Braden singled to left and Daryl Copp was safe on an error at first. Tom Moorhouse then grounded to the mound to cut the rally short. Denison went down in order in the third for the only time

that happened to the Monarchs in five frames.

In the bottom of the third, Glidden-Ralston tried to get back in the game when Mike Wiederin led off with a single to center. Dave Walkup walked and there were two on and none down.

Then the Monarchs came up with a snappy double play as Steve Bennett grounded sharply to Grau on the mound. Grau's throw to Denny Fineran at third nailed Wiederin and the throw across the diamond to first got Bennett. Braden grounded to sec-

ond and the side was retired.

The Monarchs padded the lead with four more in the fourth. Fineran lived on an error with one down. Tom Barnes popped out. McGinn singled. Ulmer was safe on an error at short as two runs scored. Ed Fink beat out an infield hit and Grau singled Ulmer home. Randy Waldron singled to right and Fink scored.

Another Monarch uprising in the fifth netted three more runs for the 10-run cushion. Ed Launderville was safe on an error. Fineran grounded to second and lived on a fielder's choice

as the Wildcats missed pinch-runner Mitch Hansen at third. Barnes flied to center for the first out, but McGinn walked to load the sacks. Ulmer walked to force in Hansen and Braden was lifted for Pat McNaught.

## Hitters Dominate Major Leagues

NEW YORK (AP) — Only two years ago hitters were moaning loudly and pitchers smiling quietly as the men on the mound dominated the game. Now who's grinning and who's groaning?

Whether it was because of the lowering of the pitching mound, a shortening of the strike zone, expansion, the new artificial fields or a livening of the baseball, 1970 has become the year of the hitters—at least as the second half of the season began today.

In 1968, there were only six .300 hitters in the major leagues—only one in the American League—and just 1,995 home runs, bringing a cry that low run games were turning off the fans.

Things picked up last year when there were 18 .300 hitters and more than 3,000 homers, and by the first half of this season, bats were booming more than ever. And the way hitters like Pete Rose and Carl Yastrzemski talked at the All-Star game Tuesday after playing on Cincinnati's new Astroturf, the second half of the season will bring more of the same. As play resumed today with

12 games, there were 39 hitters batting .300 or better and already almost 2,000 home runs in the majors.

The Cincinnati Reds, keeping in tune with the times, are the top hitting team in the majors with 123 home runs and a team batting average of about .277. Those figures, along with improved pitching over last year, have made the Reds the only runaway leader going into the last half of July.

The Reds have surprised everyone by taking a 10-game lead at the All-Star break in the National League West, a division that had a tight four-team race last season when the Reds finished fourth.

The biggest surprise in the American League has been the California Angels, who were in last place, 22 games back, at

this time last season in the West. The Angels presently are second to Minnesota, five games behind.

Cincinnati's pitching staff has been perhaps the biggest surprise of all. The Reds added rookie Wayne Simpson and Jim McGlothlin and Gary Nolan returned from arm trouble to join holdover Jim Merritt, and all four have a chance at 20 victories—no team has ever had four 20-game winners in one season. Merritt has 14, Simpson 13 and McGlothlin and Nolan 11 each, joining nine other National League pitchers who have 10 or more victories. The American League has nine.

In 1969, there were 15 20-game winners with a number of them certain not to repeat. Denny McLain of Detroit, after sitting out until July, is without a victory after consecutive seasons of

31 and 24 triumphs; Dave Boswell of Minnesota and Juan Marchal of San Francisco have only three each, and Bill Singer of Los Angeles, sidelined earlier by hepatitis, has five.

Phil Niekro of Atlanta has only seven and Mel Stottlemyre of the New York Yankees and Larry Dierker of Houston have eight each. Baltimore has a crack at three 20-gamers in Jim Palmer and Dave McNally, 12 each and Mike Cuellar, 11.

## Tulsa Downs Oaks In 12 Frames, 4-3

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Tulsa downed Iowa, 4-3, Wednesday night in a 12-inning American Association baseball contest.

The victory over Eastern Division leading Iowa, coupled with Oklahoma City's two losses to Omaha, moved the Oilers just three games back of Oklahoma City in the west.

Oiler heroes Wednesday were Fred Rico and Bob Guindon. Rico smashed a long single to right center field to score catcher John Olerud with two out.

Guindon, saved the Oilers with a powerful clout over the center-field wall in the bottom of the 11th with Iowa leading, 3-2 and two out.
