

Harlan Wins Mid-West Baseball Crown, 4-1

Harlan's heavy artillery gunned down the Kuemper Knights, 4-1, in the Mid-West Conference championship baseball play-off here Sunday night.

A triple by Bruce Dotzler in the third inning and a towering home run by Brent Petersen in the sixth, each blast with a man aboard, gave the Cyclones all the runs they needed.

Kuemper will get back into regular season play with a 12-4 season record tonight against Paton-Churdan in an 8 p.m. game at Carroll stadium. On Thursday the Knights will host Aurelia, and on Saturday Kuemper treks to Des Moines for a game with Dowling.

Kuemper's lone run in the contest here Sunday came on

a pair of infield blows and a passed ball.

The Knights were down, 2-0, and had one down when they started a rally in the fourth. Rich Golwitzer chopped a dribbler to the mound that eluded Harlan pitcher Jim Schmitz. The ball died in the grass before shortstop Roger Jacobsen could make a play and was officially ruled an infield hit.

Golwitzer went to second on a passed ball.

Clean-up hitter Bill Henkenius fanned, but Steve Auen walked to keep the rally alive.

Jim Nurse shot a hard grounder to short. The ball hopped as it came off the infield grass and ran up Jacobsen's arm. That, too, was officially ruled an infield hit and it plated Golwitzer with Kuemper's lone

run.

Randy Lengeling bore the brunt of the Harlan assault and suffered his first mound loss of the campaign.

The Cyclones had Lengeling in trouble in the first with a two-out double by Bill Munchrath and a single by Steve Daeges. But Lengeling reared back for a little extra and fanned Schmitz to get out of that jam.

In the third the Cyclones broke through when Tom Heese singled to right with one down

to ignite the uprising.

Heese went to second on a steal that wasn't necessary because Dotzler tripled to right. Munchrath then singled Dotzler home.

Lengeling kept the Cyclones stymied through the fourth and fifth although he yielded a single to Petersen in the fourth and a single to Munchrath in the fifth. Munchrath's blow was a hard shot that skipped past short with two down. Steve Daeges lived on an error, but Lengeling got Schmitz on a grounder to third to get out of

that predicament.

Bob Schneider walked to open the sixth, and Brent Petersen followed with a towering home run that sailed out of sight over the left field fence.

Lengeling departed in favor of Bill Henkenius who got out of the sixth in one-two-three order. Henkenius gave up a two-out single to Daeges in the seventh but whiffed Schmitz to end that.

Kuemper was stymied in the first frame when Don Baldus

walked and was sacrificed to second by Jerry Hermesen. Golwitzer whiffed and Henkenius grounded to first to strand the base runner.

The Knights couldn't get anybody aboard in the second or third. In the fifth Dan Schmitz was plunked by a pitch by Lengeling fanned and Baldus grounded out. Hermesen walked, but Golwitzer fanned for the third out.

It was up and down in order in the sixth, but in the seventh the Knights got Lon Dentlinger on with a walk with two down, but he was stranded by Baldus.

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Battling Cubs Drop 15 of 17

Never let it be said that the Chicago Cubs are going down without a fight. Perish the thought. Down they are going, but they've still got plenty of fight left.

The Cubs are stuck in a spin that has seen them drop 15 of the last 17 games and tumble from first place to fourth in the National League's East Division. All the frustrations of the slump seemed to explode in the ninth inning of Sunday's 5-2 loss to Pittsburgh.

Pirate pitcher Dock Ellis was at bat and after ducking a close one, he started saying—to no one in particular but loud enough for plate Umpire Nick Colosi to hear—that he'd get even.

"Ellis kept saying he was going to get somebody," said Colosi "so I decided to stop it right there and then." Colosi summoned Chicago Manager Leo Durocher and Denny Murtagh, skipper of the Pirates, to a home plate conference to head off the war. But the truce came too late. Moments after the

conference broke up, Durocher exchanged angry words with Ellis and the brawl was on.

"It was just like a hockey fight," said Pittsburgh's Richie Hebner, who had tagged a two-run homer in the first inning. "I loved every minute of it."

When peace was restored, the Pirates finished beating the Cubs on the scoreboard and dropped Chicago five games behind first place New York. The Cubs led the division by 4½ games when their slide started June 21.

The brawl also resulted in sending Murtagh, who has a heart condition, to a hospital for a checkup. Murtagh, who was not involved in the fracas, was examined at the hospital and later released.

Elsewhere in the National League Sunday, the Mets edged Philadelphia 5-4, St. Louis rapped Montreal 5-3, Cincinnati trimmed Houston 3-1, San Diego edged Atlanta 6-5 and Los Angeles shut out San Francisco 4-0.

In the American League, Washington swept a double-

header from New York 7-3 and 7-3, Boston ripped Cleveland 8-4, Milwaukee nipped Kansas City, 2-1, Minnesota bombed Chicago 12-3, California dropped Oakland 5-1 and Baltimore shut out Detroit 2-0.

The Pirates, who've taken over second place in the NL East with 10 victories in the last 13 games, were still angry at Durocher and the Cubs after the game. Coach Don Leppert, who had charged Durocher, was steaming.

"He was trying to stir up his ball club by hurting one of our players," said Leppert. "If I'd gotten to him I guarantee you he'd have to resign."

The umpires had to break up the fight shorthanded. Senior man Tom Gorman suffered a broken right ankle and possible broken ribs in a first inning basepath collision with Pittsburgh first baseman Al Oliver. Gorman, 51, was removed from the field on a stretcher and taken to Wesley Memorial Hospital.

The Mets got a home run and RBI from Ron Swoboda for the first time since May 31, and it helped beat the Phillies. Tommie Agee's single, extending his hitting streak to 16 games was the only hit in a two-run seventh that gave the Mets their winning margin.

Hitless Tigers Win 8-1 Contest

"Lady Luck must be smiling on us," was Coach Jerry Hansen's comment here Friday evening after his Carroll Tigers stopped the Charter Oak-Ute Bobcats, 8-1, in the most unorthodox victory of the summer baseball campaign.

The Tigers could not buy a hit in their third straight victory this week, but the runs came cheap. Bobcat hurlers, Mark Gries, Ross Schultz, and Mark Kuhlman combined to hold the Bengals at bay through the seven-inning stretch without a single hit. Carroll ace, Steve Brechler, turned in another outstanding performance on the mound with a two-hitter. Brechler has permitted only five hits in the past three games.

But the Bobcat defense was not quite so sterling. "Passed balls made a lot of difference," Hansen said. The Carroll club cashed in on three passed balls and three costly Bobcat errors.

The clincher came in the third frame as the Tigers destroyed the Bobcat hopes with a five-run uprising off four consecutive walks, a passed ball, and an error. Carroll added a run in the fifth and two more tallies in the sixth off Charter Oak-Ute errors.

The Tigers face another Bobcat team tonight, squaring off against St. Bernard's at Breda. The non-loop contest is slated for 8 p.m.
