# Sac City Stops Tigers, 12-4

SAC CITY — The Carroll Tigers couldn't overcome the destruction of the first inning last night, and fell to Sac City for their fourth straight defeat, 12-4.

The Tigers led the inning with Ron Anderson hitting the plate to put the Tigers ahead 1-0. Then it was Sac City's turn to swing the bats.

The Indians produced six runs from their half of the first inning. Stan Blaue led off for the Indians with a base on balls, followed by Mike Bottorff with the same. Indian pitcher, Lynn Garrels, singled through the key and

scored both Blaue and Bottorff.

Two batters followed Garrels, and the bases were loaded. In the next two plays two men were forced out at the plate, still leaving the bags full. With two down in the first, the Indians scored four unearned runs. The score stood, 6-1.

Two Sac City runs were walked in during the second inning, and the Indians led 8-1.

The Tigers perked up in the third inning and it looked like they might make a comeback. Randy Plotz tripled, and Carroll pitcher Wayne Hill walked. Hill

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was off for second with the next pitch, and Indian catcher, Heidenreich over-threw second. Plotz scored and Hill went to third. With bases full the Indians walked another and Hill came in.

A controversy arose in the top of the fourth inning. With one down and bases full, Doug Peterson smacked the ball to the shortstop, who threw out Anderson at the plate. The Indian catcher then threw the ball to first for the double play. The

first base umpire ruled Peterson safe, while the plate umpire called him out at first. The plate umpire prevailed, and the inning was over.

The sixth inning was the final slap in the face for the Tigers. The Indians scored four quick runs in a flurry of past-balls and overthrows.

The Tigers travel to Audubon tomorrow night for a non-league game, and will jaunt to Perry Monday night for league action.

**Prediction**  
Jack Nicklaus is just an ordinary putter, but bulldog determination and bull strength should pull him through to the Open golf title at the Merion Golf Club course, Ardmore, Pa. This week, predicts old Dutch Harrison.

"I never thought Jack could putt much, but he's the only man strong enough to get out of the rough here," said the 61-year-old club pro, once known as the Arkansas Traveler.

**The Old Pro**  
Speaking of Dutch Harrison . . . he's the oldest man ever to qualify for the U.S. Open championship, which starts its 71st run today. Dutch came close to winning the 1950 Open. He three-putted the first and ninth holes on the final round and finished a stroke back of Ben Hogan, George Fazio, and Lloyd Mangrum in the historic comeback event won by Hogan in the playoff. Dutch is now a teaching pro at the Forest Hills Club in St. Louis.

**Licenses**  
Iowa hunters and fishermen would pay more for hunting and fishing licenses under a bill passed by the Senate and sent to the House. The bill was passed 27-18 after several hours of debate in the Senate Wednesday. It would raise fishing licenses from \$3 to \$4, hunting

licenses from \$3 to \$5, and combined hunting and fishing licenses from \$5 to \$8. Iowans over 65, however, would pay the same prices they pay now. The fee increases would bring in about \$300 thousand to the State Conservation Commission for capital improvements. That, added to \$240 thousand in federal money, would be used for buildings and fish hatcheries, the bill's supporters said.

**'Row Your Boat'**  
The University of Washington tested its confidence Wednesday, as it began defense of its Intercollegiate Rowing Association championship. Entering the afternoon's qualifying heats, the Huskies were described by coxswain — Captain Dwight Phillips as "Cocky no, confident yes" about chances to capture their second straight varsity eight title.

In Little League action this week, the Cards crushed the Braves, 11-1, the Cubs topped the Yanks, 12-10, the Athletics whipped the Mets, 10-3, and in the minors, the Batmen defeated the Broadcasters, 4-1.

### Junior Golf

Kevan Juergens and Steve Crane advanced to the second round in the third flight, but Steve Heider was eliminated from championship play in the Boys' State Junior tournament now going on in Iowa City. Heider led the Carroll contingent in Tuesday's qualifying round with a 77, but lost his first round match Wednesday in the championship flight to Kym Hougham of Walcott 5 & 4 and then lost a consolation round match to Gary Stewart of Ottumwa 5 & 3. Stewart had shot a one-under-par 70 Tuesday to take medalist honors in the qualifying play.

Crane recorded the most lopsided win possible in match play when he won the first ten holes of his match with Ned Glisof Boone to record a 10 & 8 win. Juergens had to go 20 holes before eliminating Ron Manske of Algona 1 up. Juergens shot an 82 and Crane an 83 in Tuesday's qualifying.

Meanwhile at Fairfield, Jill Juergens took a four stroke lead in the third flight heading into today's final round of the Girls' State Junior at Fairfield after shooting a 45 Wednesday. Her 196 total for four rounds gives her a four shot lead over Sue Bouck of Cedar Rapids.

Sue Nagl, Carroll's other entrant in the girls' meet, qualified for the championship flight, but was well down the list after shooting a 93 Wednesday. Her three-day total of 277 left her in 13th place, 44 strokes of the leading total of Tina Mulert of Dubuque.

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## Shaving Strokes

You can't see yourself swing a golf club, right? And there are certain things you can rarely tell about your swing without an objective perspective.

So I suggest that, when you want to solve a swing problem, you get a friend who has played a lot of golf with you — who has seen you at your best and worst — and take him to the practice tee and let him watch you hit balls. Ask him what you're doing differently.

Most golfers are keener students of the game than they are given credit for. And all of them are eager to dispense sage counsel.

The danger, on tour an everywhere else, is in listening to too many voices, some of whom may not be that anxious to improve your game. But if you have someone you can trust, you can do yourself a great deal of good by relying on him to tell you what you're doing wrong.
