

Kuemper Overwhelms Eagles, 8-1

Kuemper ace, Alvie Irlbeck, hurled a two-hitter, and the Knights' batting order exploded for 11 base hits to overwhelm the invading Lake City Eagles, 8-1, here Friday evening.

Elsewhere around the area, the Carroll Tigers b o m b e d Audubon, 7-3, in a non-loop contest, Bill Heenan fired a two-hitter to lead Perry to a 9-4 victory over the Jefferson Rams, and in the western half of the league, Sac City split a doubleheader with St. Bernard's of Breda, dropping the opener, 7-5, and throttling the Bobcats in the follow-up match, 15-1.

Lake City's second baseman, Yunek, was the only thorn in the side of Irlbeck, posting a pair of singles in the fourth and sixth innings. Jim Baldus led the Knights' b a t t i n g attack with

four straight bingos. Jerry Hermens notched a two-bagger for Kuemper, and Jim Nurse stroked a triple.

The Knights ignited for five runs in the second frame, behind a five-hit salvo. Steve Auen, Randy Otto, and Terry Kasperbauer led off the action with consecutive singles. Irlbeck took a free pass, and Baldus stroked his second single of the ball game. Jim Nurse concluded the action with a triple.

Kuemper padded its lead in the fourth inning with two runs off two hits. Baldus and Nurse scored for the Lancers, while Lake City chalked up its lone tally of the game in that frame. Heath led off with a base on balls, and Dave Doty hit into a fielder's choice that wiped out Heath at second base. Yunek stroked a single to advance Doty and load the sacks. Hoover took a base on balls that sent Doty across the plate.

The Knights added a final tally in the sixth frame. Baldus was, again, the culprit,

leading off with a single. Hermens' double sent Baldus around the bases for the eighth run.

Lake City challenged in the sixth inning as Doty led off with a free pass and advanced on Yunek's second one-bagger, but McGrath grounded to second base, and Hoover and Bode were strike-out victims to end the rally.

The Knights return to action tonight, hosting Sioux City Heelan at Carroll Stadium. The twin bill is slated to begin at 8 p.m.

Tigers Find Victory in Audubon

The Carroll Tigers found the win trail Friday night, but not until the fifth inning. The fifth and sixth innings saw the Tigers score seven runs to overcome a 3-0 Audubon lead. The Wheelers never scored after the fourth inning, and the Tigers won their first game in five starts, 7-3.

The Tigers looked to be off to their fifth consecutive loss. Neither team scored in the first two innings, then Audubon found pay dirt in the third.

Centerfielder Dean Nielson took a base on balls, and Wheeler catcher Tom Monahan met the ball for a single. Gene Campbell drew a walk, allowing Nielson a trip across the plate. Monahan advanced to third, and scored on a passed ball. After slamming a double, Randy Williams scored for the Wheelers in the fourth on a sacrifice bunt.

Then it was Carroll's turn to tour the bags. Pitcher Randy Plotz gained the first bag with an error in centerfield. Bruce Pettitt singled. Doug Peterson stepped to the plate and doubled, scoring both Plotz and Pettitt.

The Tigers iced the cake of victory in the sixth inning. Bob Bauder got on base by being hit by a pitched ball. Jim DeBower moved Bauder to third with a double. Ron Anderson singled Bauder for a score. Plotz was up next and singled in DeBower. Pettitt was next to the plate in the hit and run fielding inning and kept the momentum by scoring Anderson on a single. Wayne Hill col-

lected his first hit of the evening by smashing a two-run double. The score stood, 7-3 for the Tigers with only one inning to play.

The next three Wheeler batters were retired in order, and the Tigers returned to Carroll tasting the sweetness of victory. Carroll will try to keep on their winning trail by traveling to Perry Monday evening for a league game with the Perry Bluejays.

Shaving Strokes by Frank Beard. (6th in a Series) There is something very satisfying and impressive about dropping a ball on the ground on a par-3 hole and crunching an iron shot. Given a perfectly groomed tee, I might do the same thing. But very seldom. I almost always tee my iron shots on these holes, and I recommend that you do the same. I'll admit it's partly psychological with me. I know that if I miss the shot and I haven't teed it, I'll hate myself. On the other hand, the percentages are with you teeing the ball, because most teeing areas are not all that level and well-manicured. Take the preferred lie. I can't tell you exactly how high to tee the ball, because conditions vary. Certainly it will be lower than you tee a wood shot, probably just above grass level. Just because the ball is sitting nice and fat on a tee, don't try to sweep it off. Hit down into the back of the ball just as you would if it were on the ground.

Damage Suit Trial Tuesday

A jury trial is scheduled to get under way in District Court here Tuesday in a suit brought by John W. Dailey Jr. of Bayard against Albert Stenstrom, d/b/a Stenstrom Construction Co. of Coon Rapids in connection with a traffic accident on Sept. 29, 1968 in Coon Rapids. The suit asks for \$15,000 in damages plus interest and the costs of the court action for young Dailey, who was 18 at the time of the alleged incident. The suit states Stenstrom had been engaged in construction in widening and repairing the shoulders of a roadway and left a covering of clay and dirt on the blacktop road. The petition also says rain had occurred and the plaintiff's vehicle skidded after coming over a sharp hill, veered off the roadway and struck a tree. The suit states that John W. Dailey Jr. suffered permanent injuries as a result of the accident and that the cause of the damages and injuries was negligence in failing to remove the clay and dirt from the roadway. The suit will be tried before District Judge A. J. Braginton.
