

Plotz Stars as Tigers Raise Mark—

Tigers Bomb Breda, 12-2; Knights Tune up

BREDA — Veteran right-hander, Randy Plotz fired a four-hitter, and the Carroll Tigers scattered twelve hits to down the Bobcats of St. Bernard's, 12-2, in a non-conference baseball match here Wednesday evening.

The victory hoisted the Tigers' mark to 3-1 in non-conference action. In their May 28 opener, the Bengals ran roughshod over Cedar Valley in a twin bill, 13-5 and 13-1. On May 31, the Carroll club dropped a cliff-hanger to the Audubon Wheelers, 12-11. Denison will play host to Carroll Friday in a double-header, non-conference contest, beginning at 6 p.m. The Tigers move into conference

action here June 7, hosting midwest powerhouse, Perry. A seven-run explosion in the fifth frame highlighted what was, in most respects, Carroll's game from beginning to end. Plotz and Bruce Pettitt combined in the first inning to give the Tigers a 1-0 edge. Ron Anderson's double-bagger in the third frame brought Dan Bernholtz across the plate for the second tally.

Bernholtz led off in the fifth inning with a single and advanced on an error at third base. Anderson whiffed, but Plotz compensated with a long blast to the outfield that stretched for a triple. Pettitt took a base on balls and Doug

Peterson matched Plotz with the second triple of the inning. Breda hurler, Polking, began to suffer control problems after that and issued free passes to six out of seven of the next Carroll batters, raising the Tiger's advantage to 9-0. The Bobcats remained scoreless through the first five innings, while the Tigers struck back again in the sixth frame with a three-run attack. The Breda team finally got into the scoring column in the bottom of that inning with a pair of runs.

After suffering a 5-1 loss at the hands of Des Moines Dowling on May 29, Coach Lou Galetch's Kuemper Knights will swing into action again on

Friday with a conference match at Lake City. Mound duties will be divided between the top three hurlers on the Lancer pitching staff, Bill Henkenius, Albie Irlbeck, and Dan Nurse. Rounding out the pitchers are Jerry Starman and Jim Steffes.

Henkenius and Nurse will share first base and Steve Auen and Terry Kasperbauer will switch off at second base. Jim Nurse will be stationed at shortstop and Dan Schmitz and Tom Gradoville will share the hot-spot at third base. Randy Otto and Mark Heithoff are slated for catching duties.

Regain Lead in AL East—

Those Battling Birds Come Home to Roost

Those battling Birds from Baltimore have come home to roost—without throwing single punch.

The Orioles pecked their way to a 3-2 12-inning victory over the Chicago White Sox Wednesday night and regained first place in the American League East.

No beanballs were unleashed and no fans were pummeled—in contrast to the Orioles' Memorial Day donnybrook at Chi-

cago. The world champions merely dazzled the White Sox with their footwork this time around.

Paul Blair scored the winning run on a bases-loaded wild pitch by Terry Forster in the 12th—after dodging a tag by third baseman Bill Melton to reach third on Dave Johnson's one-out grounder.

Brooks Robinson had tied the game with a two-run single in the ninth—after Merv Rettenmund kept the rally going by beating out a slow roller to Melton.

The victory, coupled with Boston's 6-1 loss to the New York Yankees, sent Baltimore into the division lead for the first time since April 29—with a margin of four percentage points over the skidding Red Sox.

Elsewhere in the AL, Detroit nipped Minnesota 5-4; California edged Washington 2-1 in a rain-shortened game and Cleveland topped Milwaukee 4-2. Kansas City and Oakland were not scheduled.

In National League action, the New York Mets downed San

Francisco 5-2; the Chicago Cubs swept a two-night doubleheader from Cincinnati 6-3 and 4-1; Pittsburgh slammed St. Louis 10-1; Los Angeles walloped Montreal 7-1; San Diego blanked Philadelphia 6-0 and Atlanta beat Houston 3-1.

Tom Bradley, Chicago's young pitching star, stymied the Orioles on three hits until the ninth, when Dave Johnson cracked a leadoff single. He took second on a balk, before Bradley walked Frank Robinson and gave up Rettenmund's infield hit, filling the bases.

Brooks Robinson then knotted it 2-2 with single to left.

In the 12th, Vicente Romo walked Blair, batting for reliever Dick Hall, on four pitches. Don Buford sacrificed and Johnson bounced to Melton, who went for the sidestepping Blair and missed the tag. The White Sox protested that Blair had left the baseline and Coach Joe Lonnett was ejected from the game.

Triple Crown Thorn May Be Purse Finder

NEW YORK (AP)— Back in 1968 Stagedoor Johnny won his first race about a month before he won the Belmont Stakes. Saturday, Purse Finder will try for a similar achievement at the loss of the Triple Crown for Canero II.

“He is getting better every day,” Trainer Jimmy Conway said Wednesday of Purse Finder, who won the first race of his 8-race career May 12, just three days before Canero II added the Preakness victory to his win in the Kentucky Derby.

Classic. Canero II and probably eight other 3-year-olds will be entered Friday morning for the Belmont, which is scheduled to go off at 5:35 p.m. EDT Saturday. Television coverage will be from 5-6 p.m. and radio coverage from 5:25-5:45 p.m., both by CBS.

Trainer Juan Arias and jockey Gustavo Avila both expressed satisfaction Wednesday after Canero II worked 5/8 mile on the Belmont main track in 1:04. Although this is generally considered a slow move, it was faster than Canero II's final work out at the same distance for the Derby and the Preakness.

Besides Purse Finder and Solo Mio, Canero II's other likely opponents in his bid to become racing's ninth Triple Crown winner and first since Citation in 1948 are the Johnny Campo-trained pair of Neil Helman's Good Behaving and Frank J. Caldwell's Jim French, Mr. & Mrs. Harry Linger's Salem, William A. Levitt's Bold Reason, Mrs. Ethel D. Jacobs' Epic Journey and Tartan Stable's Highbinder.

Bonallack Sidelined In British Amateur

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland (AP)— Mike Schwitz, a 28-year-old attorney from South Africa, pulled off the big upset of the day today by defeating defending champion Mike Bonallack, British Walker Cup captain 4 and 3 in the fourth round of the British Amateur Golf Championship.

Schwitz had two birdies over Carnoustie's 6,828-yard, par-72 links and those were the holes that destroyed the 36-year-old Bonallack, winner of the title for the last two years and a five-time champion.

Schwitz said, “I went out this morning thinking I had nothing to lose and Michael had everything to lose. So I played a relaxed sort of game. It would be great if I could do a Bobby Cole in this championship.”

Cole, another South Africa who now is a professional, won the British Amateur over these ancient links in 1966.

Hugh Stuart, a 28-year-old British Walker Cup player defeated John Farquhar of Amarillo, Tex., 3 and 2 in the fourth round.

Jim Simons, 21, American Walker Cup player from Butler, Pa., and a student at Wake Forest University, defeated Howard Clark, a 16-year-old English boy, 3 and 2 to advance into this afternoon's fifth round—one that leaves only 16 players in the field from the original entry of 250.

Michael Sanger of Mt. Kisco, N.Y. also went into the fifth round with a 3 and 2 victory over Andrew Chandler, an 18-year-old Briton who ousted U.S. Walker Cup player Vinnie Giles of Richmond, Va., Wednesday.
