Schiller Fires 78 in State Amateur

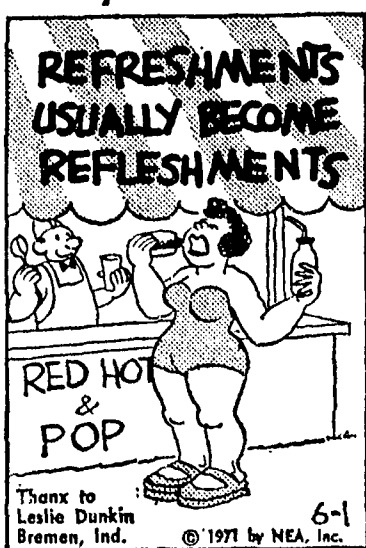

Plotz, Tigers Rip Irwin, 10-3

When Carroll's lanky right-hander Randy Plotz surrenders the mound duties in the middle of a game, it generally means that the Tigers are on the bottom end of a tight score. Such was not the case here Tuesday evening. Plotz delivered the pitching chores to Wayne Hill in the fifth frame after holding challenging Irwin to one hit and three unearned tallies, while the Tigers had mounted a 7-3 advantage. Hill followed with a one-hit pitching performance over the final two innings, and the Carroll crew went on to blitz Irwin, 10-3, in a first round sectional contest.

The Bengals jumped to an early lead in the ball game with a four-run outburst in the opening frame. Ron Anderson survived on an error at third base in the lead-off slot, and raced around the sacks on Wayne Hill's follow-up three-base hit. Bruce Pettitt kept the action alive

with a singleton that plated Hill from third base. Doug Peterson advanced Pettitt with a sacrifice to shortstop, and Plotz concluded the action with a single. Free passes issued to Mike Tryon, Lynn Olerich, and Bob Brown polished off the scoring action in that inning.

In the 6 p.m. contest that preceded the Carroll-Irwin game, Manning advanced in sectional play with an 11-3 triumph over Coon Rapids. Gary Graner went the distance on the mound for the Bulldogs.

Irwin broke into the scoring column in the third inning with a pair of unearned tallies. Marcussen led off with a base on balls and advanced as an infield error saved Barrett at first base.
