

Knights Batter Glidden, 12-1

Kuemper used the four-hit pitching of Dan Nurse and banged out 12 hits as the Knights rolled to a convincing 12-1 triumph over Glidden Thursday night in the second round of the sectional baseball tournament.

The winners grabbed a shaky 2-1 lead after the first inning. Jim Baldus singled to start the game and went to second on Jerry Hermsen's perfect sacrifice bunt. After Jim Nurse popped out, Bill Henkenius lined a sharp single to center, scoring Baldus. Henkenius moved all the way to third as the ball went through the centerfielder's legs and scored on a passed ball.

In other action for area teams, Denison bombed East Monona 13-1 at Onawa as Randy Ulmer had a three-run double and Ed Finks had two hits. Denison, now 15-9 on the sea-

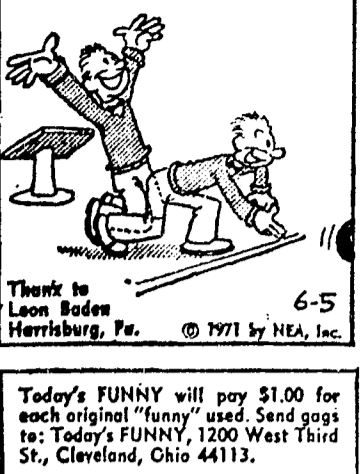
Nurse was a superb on the mound after getting by a shaky first inning. He walked just two and struck out 12 as he won his fourth game of the season.

Hill Leads Tigers Past Manning, 5-0

Wayne Hill hurled a sterling two-hitter and combined with Doug Peterson for five hits, including three triples, to lead the Carroll Tigers to a 5-0 shut out over the Manning Bulldogs in the second round of sectional tournament action here Thursday evening.

Hill held the Bulldogs in check with a pair of singles, surrendered to Kevin Pfannkuch in the second inning and Gary Graner in the third frame. Meanwhile, the Tiger pitcher smacked a pair of triples, and clean-up hitter, Peterson responded with a one-run triple, a two-run single, and finally, a one-run single in the fourth inning that wrapped up the Carroll scoring parade.

The Tigers meet Kuemper in the third round here Saturday, July 17, at 8 p.m. The

Knights crushed Glidden-Ralston in the follow-up match Thursday evening, 12-1. Hill got the action under way for the Tigers in the first inning with the first of his three-baggers. Peterson's triple plated Hill for the first run, while Randy Plotz hit into an error in center field that scored Peterson for the second tally.

The Bulldogs went down in order in the first frame, while Pfannkuch stroked a singleton for the Manning team in the second inning. Hill fanned Mike Mohr for the first out in that inning, and Kent Rutz grounded to third for the second out. Keith Stribe grounded to second base for the final out, and Pfannkuch was stranded at first base.

The Tigers broke into the scoring column again in the bottom half of the second frame with a two-run salvo.

Ron Anderson reached first base on a free pass after Bob Brown grounded to shortstop. Hill hit into a fielder's choice that erased Anderson at second base. Hill advanced on a wild pitch before Bruce Pettitt joined him on the sacks with a single. Another wild pitch sent the runners ahead, setting the stage for Peterson's single that plated both Hill and Pettitt. Plotz dropped a fly ball into the left fielder's glove for the third out.

Carroll chalked up its final tally in the fourth inning. Hill again setting up the offensive punch with his second triple. Anderson and Pettitt were strike-out victims before Peterson stroked the single that plated Hill for the fifth and final run.

Manning threatened in the seventh inning when Mohr cir-

cled the sacks to third base on an error, but the attempt was cut short by an unfortunate mistake on Mohr's part. The Manning speedster forgot to touch second base on his way around the circuit and was signalled out by the base umpire.

Pirates Nip Padres in 17 Inning Duel

The game's not over till the last man is out. Nobody knows just who first coined that famous remark about the grand, old game of baseball. But manager Danny Murtaugh believes it. Oh, does he ever believe it. Murtaugh watched his Pittsburgh Pirates work their way dangerously close to their last out three times Thursday night, only to bounce back each time against San Diego. The Pirates eventually beat the Padres 4-3 with Roberto Clemente's 17th inning home run ending the longest game of the National League season.

Elsewhere in the NL Thursday, Los Angeles shut out Atlanta 6-0, New York defeated Houston 9-4, Chicago edged Philadelphia 7-6, Cincinnati shaded San Francisco 2-1 and St. Louis split a doubleheader with Montreal, winning 7-3 and then losing 6-4.

In the American League, Milwaukee blanked New York 1-0, Boston shut out Minnesota 3-0 in 13 innings, Washington whipped Chicago 8-3, Kansas City blanked Cleveland 1-0, Baltimore edged California 4-3 and Oakland nipped Detroit 8-7.

The Pirates simply refused to

give up against the Padres and as a result, stretched their winning streak to seven games. Forgive Murtaugh if there were a couple of moments when he figured the streak was over.

San Diego nursed a 1-0 lead into the ninth inning and the way starter Dave Roberts was pitching, it looked like enough. But the Pirates scratched out the tying run on a walk, a bouncing single by Jose Pagan and Gene Alley's sacrifice fly.

Roberts, who had struck out slugger Willie Stargell four times, left in the 10th and three innings later, Stargell got even.

The Padres had taken the lead in the top of the 13th on a pinch homer by Ivan Murrell. Reliever Al Severinsen struck out the first two batters in the bottom half of the inning and that left only Stargell.

The big slugger walloped his 31st homer over the wall, tying the game again. In the 16th, the Padres tried again, pushing across the tie-breaking run again, this time on a wild pitch.

But again, the Pirates refused to fold. This time there was only one out in the bottom half of the inning when Richie Hebner tagged his 14th homer of the year, tying it again.

If by now the Padres' spirit was broken, they could hardly be blamed. Clemente then gave them a mercifully quick finish, hammering a one-out homer in the 17th to end the 4-hour, 12-minute marathon.

Los Angeles chopped a game off San Francisco's West Division lead, blanking Atlanta while the Giants were dropping a tough one in Cincinnati.
