

Kuemper Ousted From Tournament Play, 2-1

Kuemper's bid for a berth in this week's Iowa High School Baseball Tournament at Cedar Rapids came to a halt, 2-1, Saturday night at Boone.

It was a game where the pitcher's dominated as Boone's Tom Price and Kuemper's Bill Henkenius both tossed three-hitters.

The game was scoreless until the sixth inning. Bob Sapp started the Toreador's sixth reaching first base on an infield error. Larry Harris followed with a line single to left to put runners at first and second. Clean-up batter Terry Martin laced a single to make it 1-0.

With runners at first and second and one out, Boone pulled off a surprise double steal. Barry Cory followed with a well-executed squeeze bunt, scoring Larry Harris to make it 2-0 as Henkenius' only play was to first base. Jim McVicker ended the inning by striking out.

The Knights' Jim Nurse started the bottom of the sixth with a base hit into deep short. Henkenius followed with a bouncing ball up the middle, forcing Nurse out at second. The relay throw to first wasn't in time for the double play, but Henkenius was caught off first after he had made the turn for second base. Dan Schmitz grounded out for the third out.

Kuemper who finished with a 16-8 record, scored its lone run in the seventh. Steve Auen walked to start the inning. After Randy Otto and Terry Kasperbauer went down on strikes, Dan Nurse on a 3-2 pitch, lined a single too left field. The ball got by the left fielder and Auen raced home from first with Nurse going down to second. Tom Price ended the Knights' rally and state tournament hopes by striking out Jim Baldus to end the game.

Boone's first runner of the game was Terry Harris in the first, but he was promptly

plucked off first base by Henkenius on a great move. Kuemper's first base runner was Schmitz in the second inning as he blooped a double down the left field line.

Both these excellent clubs threatened in the fourth inning. Terry Harris' double over Baldus' head in right started the Toreador threat. An infield error put runners on first and third with one out. After Larry Harris stole second and Martin walked to load the bases, Henkenius got out of the jam by getting Spike Davis to ground out to third as Schmitz's throw to Otto at home was in time and by getting Cory out on a pop out to Auen.

With two out in the Kuemper fourth, Schmitz walked on four straight pitches. Schmitz was caught in a run-down between first and second after Price made a pickoff attempt. Schmitz would have been a sure out, but Boone's first baseman threw the ball into left field as Schmitz raced to third. Auen followed with a walk and stole second, but Otto struck out to end the frame.

Boone had a base runner in scoring position in the fifth as McVicker walked and moved to second on a balk by Henkenius. Henkenius settled down and got Brian Walker and Terry Harris on strikes and Price on a ground out.

Kuemper's Dan Nurse walked

in the fifth with one out, but was stranded on first base.

Price and Henkenius were both excellent as each gave up three hits. Price and Henkenius, both lefties, had control problems, walking five and four respectively. Boone's ace struck out nine, while Kuemper's ace fanned six.

It was a heart-breaking loss for Henkenius as he suffered only his third loss of the season in 12 decisions, and only his fourth career loss in 24 decisions. Price's moved his record to 13-2 and could make that better with the state tournament coming.

Other teams advancing to the state tournament are Iowa Falls, a 3-1 winner in eight

innings over Ames; Burlington, a 5-0 victor over Newton; Albert City-Truesdale, a 13-1 winner over Spirit Lake; Fort Dodge, a 4-1 winner over Rockford; Oelwein, a 4-2 victor over East Waterloo; Creston, a 2-1 winner over Council Bluffs Lincoln in 10 innings and Benton Community of Van Horne, a 1-0 winner over Clinton in eight innings.

The officials of the Iowa High School Athletic Association announced first round pairings. Fort Dodge-Albert City-Truesdale and Iowa Falls-Boone will meet on Wednesday at 6 and 8 p.m. respectively. On Thursday, Oelwein will face Burlington at 6 p.m. and Van Horne will battle Creston at 8 p.m.

Carroll Kuemper and Carroll each landed one player on the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association All-District Team. The Knights' Henkenius landed a second team berth at pitcher on the Southwest area team and Carroll's third baseman Bruce Pettit landed a third team spot. Other area players making the district squad were Jefferson's third baseman Tom Lynch on the second team and Atlantic's shortstop Jim Watson on the second team. Perry's Scott Whitton and Rick Heenan, gained third team places as did another Atlantic player, Scott Rogers.

Killebrew ripped his 499th career blast Sunday as the Twins stopped the Boston Red Sox 4-2. But it was only his 12th this season—an unusually low total for the Killer — and snapped him out of a month-long homer drought.

The 39-homer plateau has been reached by only nine players in baseball history, the last being Ernie Banks of the Chicago Cubs in 1970.

While Killebrew inched toward the half-grand mark Sunday, Oakland's magical Vida Blue closed in on a 20-victory season, winning his 19th as the A's trimmed the Detroit Tigers 6-1 to gain a split of their doubleheader. The Tigers won the first game 7-4.

In Sunday's other American League games, the New York Yankees took a doubleheader from the Milwaukee Brewers, 6-2 in 11 innings and 11-9; the California Angels hammered the Baltimore Orioles twice, 6-2 and 9-6 in 13; the Chicago White Sox beat the Washington Senators 5-1 and 9-6 and the Kansas City Royals beat Cleveland 4-3 in the first game of their twin bill but lost 2-1 to the Indians in the second.

Killebrew drove in a run for Minnesota with a single in the third inning, then capped a five-run explosion in the fifth off former teammate Luis Tiant with a 386-foot drive with two men aboard, his first homer since June 22.

Blue, boosting his record to 19-3, left after six innings of one-hit work simply because Oakland Manager Dick Williams "wanted to give me a rest."

Blue was struck on the foot by a pitch in the fourth inning. But that wasn't the reason Blue made an early departure and left the mopping up to Rollie Fingers.

"I guess he's just trying to save my arm so I can play this game a little longer," said Blue.

Williams, asked if he would consider lifting Blue if he were aiming for his 20th victory, said: "No, I wouldn't hesitate to take him out—the 20th
