

Audubon Clips Carroll, 7-1

Audubon exploded for six runs in the final three innings and Randy LaFoy scattered five hits to give the Wheelers a 7-1 victory over Carroll Friday night at Carroll Stadium.

The triumph kept Audubon unbeaten with a 3-0 record and the loss gave the Tigers an 0-3 mark.

The Wheelers broke a 1-1 tie in the fifth with two runs then added a single run in the sixth and wrapped things up with three more in the seventh.

It was shortstop Tom Monahan's fifth inning triple to left center that broke a 1-1 dead-

lock that had existed since the first inning. Then Rick Petersen laid down a perfect bunt to squeeze home Monahan to make it 3-1.

The Wheelers got their fourth run in the sixth on Dean Nielsen's triple to left center, scoring Don Jacobson who had reached base after being hit by a pitch.

Craig Young rapped a run-scoring single to make it 5-1 in the seventh and two more runs scored on Randy Plotz's wild pitch. Plotz had relieved starting pitcher Pete Marz with two out in the sixth inning.

Audubon got a quick 1-0 lead in the first inning on two throw-

ing errors by Tiger infielders.

Carroll tied it up in the bottom of the inning on Marz' sharp single to left that scored leadoff man Ron Anderson who had walked and moved to second on a steal.

The Tigers, however, couldn't get a big threat going against LaFoy who struck out 10, including the side in the sixth.

Carroll did threaten in the fourth, fifth and sixth innings, getting two men on base, but that was it. In all, seven Tigers were stranded on the bases as compared to Audubon's eight.

Carroll travels to Sac City Monday for an 8 p.m. game. Then return home for an 8 p.m. start against St. Bernard's of Breda on Wednesday.

telephone interview from his Thailand base. "There was nothing else to do. I used a surgical knife from my survival kit. I was getting to look pretty scrubby."

Locher still had several days growing of beard and a big grin when the rescue helicopter landed him at the base.

When Locher bailed out of his crippled Phantom, he kept moving.

"I ate assorted fruits from the trees and imagined they were steaks. I drank rain and stream water and imagined it was root beer. I was getting pretty hungry. But I never had any trouble sleeping, only when it rained."

Locher could hear F4 jets screaming overhead as they streaked to their targets deep inside North Vietnam day after day.

But the pilots, alerted to listen to radio signals from Locher, didn't pick up his beeper until Thursday. His position was confirmed and the rescue armada moved in through heavy North Vietnamese ground fire to lift him out.

Locher has served 20 months as a combat pilot with 68 missions over North Vietnam and the rest over Laos and South Vietnam. He voluntarily extended 12 months beyond his first one-year tour. Military spokesmen said his second tour would be cut short by four months and he would be reassigned out of the combat zone because of having already gone through one ordeal.

Anti-Marxists Gain in Chilean Election SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Anti-Marxist opposition candidates ran considerably better than expected Friday in Chile's biggest labor group election. The week-long voting is expected to end today.

Early returns gave Christian Democratic party office-seekers 25 per cent of the vote, leading one party official to say, "This is like U.S. Republicans being elected to the Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union."

The 19-year-old confederation has been dominated by Communists and the pro-Marxist city today as they prepared for a demonstration by tens of thousands of militant Protestants.
