

Dodgers Beat Knights

Fort Dodge's Dave Hanson fired a one-hitter and struck out 13 as the Dodgers blanked Kuemper for the second time this month, 1-0, Tuesday night at Carroll Stadium.

The tall Dodger lefthander lost his no-hit bid with two out in the seventh inning when Mark Heithoff singled cleanly to left.

The Dodgers, who won the first meeting between these two clubs, 2-0, back on June 6, got their run in the top of the first inning when Randy Hill singled home Scott Stiles. Stiles had led off the game with a single and moved to second on a ground out.

Hanson was untouchable as he allowed only three base-runners until the seventh frame. He struck out the side in the third and seventh innings and got two each in the first, fourth, fifth and sixth frames.

The Knights only threat in the game was in the seventh as John Heithoff walked with one out. After Steve Garbier

went down on strikes, Mark Heithoff singled. But Hanson, whose curve was excellent all night, got pinch-hitter Jerry Starman on strikes to end the game.

Kuemper pitcher Jim Steffes was brilliant on the mound, too, scattering six hits, and giving up only two safeties after the second inning. It was Steffes' first loss in two decisions, but he lowered his earned run average to a sparkling 2.19.

"Hanson was excellent tonight," said veteran Fort Dodge coach Ed McNeil. "He was ahead of the hitters and his curve ball was working well." Hanson's record is now 2-1 and the Dodgers' overall mark is 3-5.

Dow City Home on National Register

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — The century-old Dow House, once the center of activity in the Crawford County town of Dow City has been placed on the National Register of Historic Places, according to Adrian D. Anderson, assistant state archaeologist.

Anderson, who is the state liaison officer for the National Historic Preservation Act, said Tuesday the structure is the sixth historic place in Iowa to be included in the register this year.
