

Tornadoes Belt Tigers

The Storm Lake Tornadoes took advantage of five walks in the third inning and scored four runs on one hit to give them enough tallies for an 8-2 win over the Carroll Tigers here Friday night.

Although the Tornadoes came into the contest with an 18-5 record, compared to 3-13 for the Tigers, they found the going tougher than they may have expected.

The Tigers retired the first three Storm Lake batters of the game, while getting two men on base themselves in the first stanza. Marz and company wiped out the next four hitters in the second inning, with one man getting on base due to a dropped third strike.

But when the Storm Lake half of the third inning ended, the Tigers were down four runs off only one hit. Mark Eliason started the third for the visitors with a walk and moved to second on a missed pick-off attempt. Mike Madson walked, and both Eliason and Madson advanced on an infield out by Rich Sievers.

Marz, having problems with his control, walked Randy Utter to load the bases, and then

walked John Julius to score Eliason and leave the bases full. Brad Jones then blasted a double to score Madson and Utter. The final Storm Lake run of the inning came minutes after when Julius scored from third on a wild pitch.

The Tigers weren't ready to say uncle, as they started the fourth inning with a long double by Marz to right-center. Marz moved in for the Bangals' first tally of the evening on a single by Bob Brown into centerfield.

Carroll got their final run in the fifth when Tom Nam started the inning by beating out an infield grounder. The fleet-footed Nam then stole second and scored when an attempt to throw him out at third on another steal went wild.

The Tigers had retired Storm Lake for no hits and no runs in both the fourth and fifth innings, and at the end of five the Tigers were down, 4-2.

But the Tornadoes rallied for insurance runs in the sixth and seventh innings. Eliason smashed an inside-the-park home run in the sixth for the Tornadoes' solo tally in that frame.

Storm Lake found three runs in the seventh, all scored on Tiger errors. Jones led off with a single, then stole second and third. Terry Paulson followed with a walk and stole second. Mike Francis cracked a sharp shot to shortstop Ron Anderson, and while the Tiger fielder was looking for the handle on the ball, Jones and Paulson had scored. Francis then scored from first on a throwing error by third baseman Randy Plotz. The Tigers will go against hometown rival, Kuemper, Monday night at 8 p.m. in the first round of sectional tournament play. The Carroll-Kuemper game promises to be a real battle, as the two clubs have split one game each in the two games they've played, and Tiger coach Ted Edwards said the Bangals "get up" for their bouts with Kuemper.

Knights Blank Denison

DENISON — Kuemper got another superb pitching performance for the second straight night Friday. The Knights blanked Storm Lake, 5-0, Thursday night behind Dan Nurse's two-hitter. It was left hander Jim Steffes' turn and he shutout Denison, 5-0, on a five-hitter.

Steffes scattered four hits in lifting his record to 3-2 on the season and got eight batters on strikeouts.

The Monarchs, the Midwest Conference Western Division champions, threatened only twice — in the fifth inning and seventh inning.

Kuemper jumped on Denison pitching ace, Denny Fineran, for three runs in the third, and single runs in the sixth and seventh innings. The losers have a 10-4 record and Fineran has

been their workhorse, compiling an 8-3 pitching mark.

Steffes led off the Knight third by walking. George Neil, the leading hitter for Lou Galetich's club at .339, doubled to put runners at second and third. Terry Kasperbauer then drilled a two-run single. The third run of the inning came home as a delayed steal worked with Kasperbauer scoring.

Kuemper made it 4-0 after six as Tom Gradoville walked, moved to second on a pass ball and came home on Neil's second hit of the game. The final run was scored in the seventh as Kasperbauer came home on one of three Denison errors.

Fineran pitched well in the losing effort, limiting the Knights to five hits, but two of them came in the third inning. He struck out 11, getting six in the final three innings.

Kuemper, now 9-8 on the season and winner of its last two, faces Carroll at 8 p.m. Monday night in sectional tournament play. The two teams split during the regular season with the Tigers taking the first game, 9-7, and the Knights, the second, 4-3.

Denison also opens up sectional play Monday night, facing Dunlap.

CHURDAN — Joseph S. Riehl, 86, retired Churdan farmer, died Thursday evening, July 13, at the Extended Care Center, Greene County Hospital.

McGovern announced the new chairman is Mrs. Jean Westwood of West Jordan, Utah, who was a Utah Democratic committeewoman and an ardent McGovern supporter.

An awkward moment followed, and Salinger, apparently noting the vigorous applause for Paterson, withdrew from contention, saying, "I think I sense the feeling of this committee." Paterson was elected.

Mrs. Westwood is the first woman of either major party to head a national committee. Friends described the 48-year-old grandmother as a dedicated organizer who knew Sen. McGovern would get the nomination when others considered him a long shot.

Aides said McGovern plans to relax at home in Washington all weekend with no public appearances and no meetings, and then leave Monday morning for a two-week vacation at Sylvan Lake Lodge near Custer, S.D.

Congressman Neal Smith was "a little bit puzzled and surprised" at Senator McGovern selecting Senator Tom Eagleton as his running mate. Smith, who has known Eagleton since the Missouri was elected to the Senate, rates him as a "moderate to a liberal."

"It may be that some of the more logical choices did not want to run. I don't know if that's so or not, but Tom Eagleton is a fine man," Smith related.

Linus Brenner, Mapleton farmer, came to Miami Beach as a strong supporter of Senator Ed Muskie; he left this sun capital as a McGovern convert.

"Yes, I plan to work for McGovern. Basically because I like to see unity in our party and because without it, we can't unseat Nixon and this really is our primary purpose," Brenner commented.

What are McGovern's chances in Iowa? "Pretty good," said Brenner.

Robert Burke, a farmer from DeWitt who also was a delegate, agrees. "Since McGovern is a midwesterner he knows the problems of agriculture and I think he's going to win the approval of the farmers."

James Shannon, delegate from Mason City who voted for Ted Kennedy for president, has some very strong views about amnesty. "As a member of the American Legion and having brothers who just returned from Vietnam, I think blanket amnesty is out and I won't support anyone who favors it."

Shannon said his feelings on the issue are so strong that if McGovern comes out for blanket amnesty he will resign his position as Cerro Gordo County Chairman; Shannon has been active in the Democratic party organization for 24 years.

The moment Al Saggs arrived in Miami Beach he started working against the McGovern forces. But he is not going away from the national convention with bitter feelings.

"I fought him (McGovern) all the way and was defeated. "I have no reservations about him," said the Council Bluffs delegate. "I'm going to work for him and I think most of the delegates who did not vote for him feel the same way."

State Senator Cloyd Robinson of Cedar Rapids and his family got to squeeze in the final day of the convention as part of their vacation. Robinson feels McGovern faces an "up-hill battle," and that the outcome of the presidential race "will have a definite bearing of the races at a local level."

From a person standpoint, Robinson believes that "Muskie would have been a stronger candidate to head up the ticket."

Questions, Answers on U.S. Tax Matters

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q — I expect to be hospitalized soon for surgery. I can be released early if someone comes to the house to change the dressing. Will the house calls be paid by Medicare?

A — Services of this type may be covered under Home Health Benefits. The services must be prescribed by your attending physician through the local Home Health Agency certified by Medicare. Be sure to talk this over with your doctor so he can make the necessary arrangements. To be covered by Medicare he must make the arrangements before home visits begin.

Q — I am a 58-year-old widow and my boy and I were receiving social security. He was 18 last month and my benefits were stopped. When will I again be eligible?

A — Assuming you are not totally disabled, you must wait until you attain age 60 when you would qualify for a reduced widow's benefit. Or if you do not want reduced benefits, you could receive full widow's benefits by not applying until age 6
