

# Knights Romp on Homers, 14-0; Glidden Wins

Reminded of his statements last year criticizing Landry and the team's front office, Thomas said, "You're talking about the past. Wait a few more weeks and I'll give you something else to go on." He also said he would end his much-publicized silence and talk about football to reporters this year "if I have time."

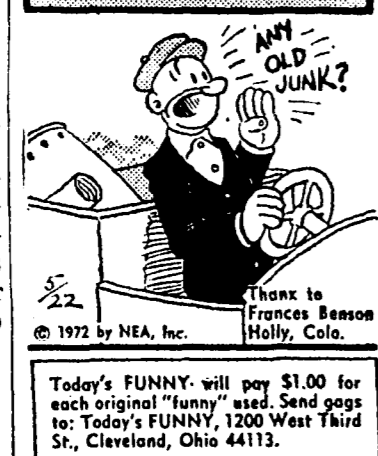
"I'm not taking Al Lewis cheaply," Ali said. "This boy is big and strong, make no mistake about that."
