

Move Out of Loop Cellar—

Tigers Rap Eagles, 11-4

The Carroll Tigers snapped an eight-game losing streak which dated back to June 9 as they defeated the Lake City Eagles here Monday night, 11-4. The win pulled the Tigers out of the Midwest Conference Eastern Division cellar and plunged the Eagles into the basement.

The Tigers now stand with two wins and six losses in league play, while Lake City has posted a 1-7 loop mark.

Carroll sailed to the victory on five hits for the evening, and runs in four of the six offensive innings. The Carroll second inning provided all the runs they needed as five Tigers crossed the plate.

Steve Sundermann led off the second for the Bengals with a walk and moved to second when the right fielder dropped a fly ball from Lynn Olerich. Following a pop out by Ted Nam, Dan Sheehan loaded the bases with a bunt.

Sundermann was picked off

at third on a throw from Eagle pitcher Clark Johnson. Ron Anderson again loaded the bases on a fielder's choice. Tom Nam then cracked a sharp single which moved Olerich across the plate.

With bases still full Randy Plotz drove in Sheehan, Nam and Anderson with a fly to right-center. Confusion in the Lake City outfield caused the fly to be dropped and allowed Plotz to move to third. Plotz then scored on a wild pitch as Pete Marz struck out to end the inning.

The Tigers added three more runs in the fifth stanza, as Marz started the inning with a walk. First baseman Bob Brown drove a double to the left field fence which scored Marz. Steve Sundermann walked, and he and Brown both scored on pass balls.

The Eagles scored two of their runs in the first inning. Joe Dewey got on when he was hit by a pitch, and moved to

second when Mike Fell walked. Lake City catcher Larry McCaulley singled in Dewey, and one batter later Fell scored on a wild pitch.

The win was the first victory of the season for Plotz, who had an 0-5 record coming into the game. The Tiger hurler struck out 11 batters and walked eight.

The Tigers meet the Sac City Indians Wednesday night here in a non-conference duel.

There were plenty of fireworks for Lou Galetich's club. They banged out 11 hits, including five doubles, which didn't hurt the team's low batting average of .227.

The Knights didn't waste any time against Ram starting pitcher Steve Little as they got one run in the first inning and added four in the second and five more in the third to build up an insurmountable 10-1 lead.

A shaky infield didn't help Little either as Jefferson committed seven errors, all coming in the first three frames.

Two mistakes gave the Knights their first run. George Neil, who had a productive night, getting three hits and three runs batted in, opened the game reaching first base

on an error. He moved to second on Phil Baldus' sacrifice and to third on a strikeout. With two down, he came home as Dan Nurse reached first via an error.

The Knights padded their lead to 5-0 in the second inning as Neil cracked a bases loaded single to make it 3-0 and the other runs came home on an error and the first of Nurse's two doubles.

Kuemper, which sent nine men to bat in the second inning, had 10 bat in the third. Mark Heithoff, who had two doubles in the game, got one to drive in Steve Garbier. Back-to-back two-run doubles by Nurse and Kasperbauer made it 10-1.

The Knights got their run in the fourth as Mark Heithoff dou-

bled, went to third on Garbier's sacrifice and scored on Neil's third hit of the game.

The Rams got their only run in the second inning as Jeff Schrader doubled, moved to third on winning pitcher Jerry Starman's balk and scored on a pass ball.

Starman was effective in the five innings he worked, scattering four hits and striking out nine. His record is now 3-1 and his earned run average dipped to 2.33.

Kuemper is idled until Thursday night when they host Aurelia. They then travel to Des Moines Saturday night for a game with Metropolitan Conference leader, Dowling.

Pressure Now Off for Seagren

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Tears streamed down Bob Seagren's face. The handsome Olympic champion sat in the light of a setting sun and simply, quietly cried.

He had just set the world record in the pole vault, something he had done four times previously. So why the emotion?

The 25-year-old Southern California Strider athlete suffered a severe knee injury in a horse-back riding accident late last year and surgery was performed. He came back, however, and made what appeared to many a futile attempt to get back into shape for the 20th Olympic Games this year. His progress was slow.

"He worked so hard," said Verne Wolfe, head track coach at the University of Southern California, where Seagren was graduated and began his comeback. "He's always been dedicated, but I really didn't think he'd come back this fast."

"When I got to Eugene, I was relaxed," Seagren said. "I was happy with my progress." He had regained a share of the world mark at 18 feet 4 1/4 inches and was considered the old pro of the event.

"Then I started thinking. 'The guys are good. What if my pole slipped? What if I didn't

qualify?' and then I got nervous. 'I couldn't sleep. I walked around my room at night. I didn't have any concentration.'

The competition started last Sunday at Hayward Field and "everyone was so hot. Everyone looked so good I got nervous," he said. Then he warmed up by clearing the bar at about 18-1/2.

"That relaxed me for a minute," he said. "But they looked so good at 17-8 1/2, and then again at 18," he said.

The others who cleared 17-8 1/2 were Dave Roberts of Rice, Jan Johnson of Alabama and Steve Smith of Long Beach State. Then all but Roberts made 18-0 1/2. And Seagren tightened up once again.

Seconds after celebrating his 18-5 1/2 leap with a whoop Seagren broke down.
