

Stech No-Hits Carroll

PERRY — Roger Stech tossed a five-inning no-hitter and struck out 13 as Perry blanked Carroll in a Midwest Conference game here Friday night, 10-0.

The Tigers' Ted Nam almost ended the Blujays' pitcher no-hitter with two out in the fifth when he lined a shot at Stech. However, Stech knocked the ball down and threw Nam out at first base to end the game.

Besides that, the only other Tiger to hit the ball was Steve Sundermann who popped out to the second baseman in the third inning.

Stech retired the first seven in order, the first six by strikeouts, before Jim Jensen walked with one out in the third.

Carroll got three men on base in the fourth via base on balls, but couldn't do anything. Ted Nam led off by walking, but

was thrown out attempting to steal. Tom Nam and Pete Marz then walked, but Stech settled down and got Jeff Petersen and Lonnie Lehrkamp on strikeouts.

Perry, now 4-1 in league play and tied with Jefferson for first place in the Eastern Division, who beat Lake City Friday night, 8-3, got the only run they needed in the first.

Stech led off the game with a single, stole second and came home on two ground outs.

Tiger pitcher Marz didn't pitch that bad, but he had poor support as his teammates committed five errors.

Perry scored three runs in the second, all of which were unearned and added six more in the fourth, of which four were unearned.

Stech and David Hayes led the winners at the plate, each collecting two hits and two RBIs as Perry only managed six hits off Marz.
