

Carroll Takes 3rd Straight

FARNHAMVILLE — Carroll survived walks, wild pitches and hit by pitches to even their season mark at 7-7 with a 4-1 victory over Cedar Valley of Somers here Wednesday night.

The last time Ted Edwards' club was at the .500 mark or better percentage-wise was back on June 13.

The Tigers won the game in the seventh as Ted Nam raced home from third base on a pass ball to give them their third straight victory.

Tiger starting pitcher Pete Marz and winning reliever Lonnie Lehrkamp combined for 11 walks, eight of them charged to Marz who allowed just one hit in four innings, but was taken out in the fifth.

After Carroll erupted for four

runs in the fifth to wipe out a 2-0 deficit, the Indians, now 10-5 overall, tied it up in the bottom of the fifth on two wild pitches.

Lonnie Lehrkamp got out of several bases loaded jams in the fifth to save the Tigers from any more than a 4-4 deadlock.

In the sixth, the Indians loaded the bases with the help of two walks and a hit batsmen, but the junior right hander got out of the inning on a pop out.

In the seventh, Cedar Valley loaded the bases again for the third straight inning as a single and two hit batsmen filled the bases. After two out, pinch-runner Curt Peterson tried to score from third base on a pass ball, but Tiger catcher Dan Sheehan's throw to the plate to Lonnie Lehrkamp nailed the runner to end the game.

The winners banged out nine hits for the night with Bob Lehrkamp and Tim Fredrickson leading the attack with two hits each. Bob's hits were big ones — a double and a solo homer over the center field fence.

Bob's homer to lead off the fifth inning off losing pitcher Jerry McCubbin got Carroll on the scoreboard for the first time. After Sheehan was hit by a pitch near his nose, Rick Beyer pinch-ran for him. An infield throwing error put Fredrickson on base and left runners at third and first. Tom Nam then drilled a single to tie the game at two-all.

Jeff Petersen then reached base on an error to make it 3-2 and the fourth run scored on a throw to first base after a drop third strike, allowing Tom

Nam to race home from third base.

The Tigers won the game in the seventh. Petersen and Ted Nam led off with singles, but Petersen was picked off second base. After Marz struck out, Sundermann walked and Ted Nam who moved to third on a wild throw, scored the deciding run on a pass ball.

Carroll returns to action Friday night, hosting Ar-Wa-Va at 8 p.m. Their next game after that will be in the sectional tournament starting Monday at Carroll against the Ar-Wa-Va-Glidden-Ralston winner of a Saturday game.

Note: It also must be noted that Carroll right fielder Steve Sun-

dermann threw a runner out at home plate in the fifth inning who was trying to score on a single from second base.

Knights Slug 14 Hits in Loss—

St. Edmond Nips KHS, 8-7

The Kuemper Knights scattered 14 hits in a losing cause here Wednesday night as Fort Dodge St. Edmond collected eight runs on eight hits to take home the 8-7 victory. Kuemper, now 12-8 on the season, will face Storm Lake at the Carroll Stadium tonight.

An indication of the way the two clubs were hitting the ball can be seen in the number of walks and strikeouts in the game. Kuemper pitcher Tim Reicks, who pitched six and a third innings before being relieved by Dean Heisterkamp, walked six and struck out two. St. Edmond pitcher Tom Maher walked only three Knights and struck out only two. Three pitchers combined for only six strikeouts and nine walks.

St. Edmond scored seven runs in the second and third innings on six hits. Kuemper launched a steady comeback effort after trailing 7-1 in the third inning, but could not quite reach the visitors.

as he opened the inning with a walk and moved to third on consecutive base hits by Steve Garbier and John Heithoff. Hunter scored when third baseman Baker bobbled a ground ball from Mark Hermesen.

With bases loaded and no outs in the second inning, the Gaels used force outs at home to retire the inning. The final play in the inning was a third-catcher, catcher-to-first double play.

The Knights scored two more runs in the fifth inning using two hits. Joe Roetker, playing for injured Mark Heithoff, singled to center field and moved to second on Hunter's base hit. Both runners advanced on a wild pitch. Roetker scored when Baker committed his second error of the game on a ground

ball from Hermesen, which moved Hunter to third. Hunter scored when Gael catcher, Hruska, attempted to pick off Hermesen's steal to second.

Hunter drove in two runs in the sixth inning, scoring George Neil and Terry Kasperbauer. Neil had reached base on a fielders choice, while Kasperbauer had singled.
