

Carroll Wins 2 at Audubon

AUDUBON — Carroll swept a doubleheader here Friday night from the Midwest Conference Western Division champions, the Audubon Wheelers, 6-1, and 4-3. The second game went six innings as the two teams agreed to play two five-inning games.

Pete Marz turned in a superb pitching performance in the opener and Lennie Lehrkamp in the second game as Ted Edwards' club had to rally for the sweep.

Marz spun a three-hitter in the opener, walking just three, while fanning eight. He lost his shutout bid in the fifth inning. Lehrkamp got off to a shaky start in the nightcap and Audubon took a 3-1 lead after two innings, using two well-executed squeeze bunts to do most of the damage. But the junior-to-be

right hander settled down and retired the final six batters. In all, he gave up only two hits and struck out eight. The victories left the Tigers at 6-7 on the year and they could even their mark at 7-7 Monday night when they host Ar-We-Va in an 8 p.m. game. The two losses drop Audubon to 8-7.

First Game

Carroll did all their scoring in the third inning, sending 11 men to the plate in scoring six times.

After Jeff Petersen walked and Ted Nam reached base on one of three Wheeler miscues in the inning, Marz smashed a double off losing pitcher Neil Campbell to make it 1-0. Steve Sundermann then singled home a run to make it 2-0. After Lennie Lehrkamp doubled home

the third run, three more runs scored on two infield errors and a pass ball.

Audubon got its lone run off Marz when Keith Lauridsen walked and Stu Hadley singled in the final inning (the fifth). A walk to Mike Smith loaded the bases, then Gene Campbell hit into a fielder's choice, scoring Lauridsen.

Second Game

The Tigers tied the game in the top of the fifth at 3-3 and won it in the sixth, 4-3.

Petersen and Ted Nam walked to start the fifth. After Marz fanned, Sundermann reached base on an error to load the bases, but Nam was out at the plate trying to steal home on a pitch by losing pitcher Mike Smith. It appeared that Nam would have been safe had he slid.

After another walk loaded the bases, then Bob Lehrkamp walked to bring in the tying run.

The Tigers won the game in the sixth as Tim Fredrickson singled, moved to second on a pass ball and went to third on a wild pitch. After Tom Nam struck out and Petersen walked with two out, Ted Nam singled in Fredrickson to win the game.

Carroll took a 1-0 lead in the first inning as Tom Nam walked, stole second base and went to third on a throwing error. He scored moments later on a wild pitch.

Audubon tied it in their half of the first as losing pitcher Mike Smith laid down a perfect squeeze bunt to score Gene Campbell who had walked and stole second and third bases.

The Wheelers went ahead 3-1 in the second on a walk to Don Jacobsen, a double by Roger Randeris and a squeeze bunt by Craig Young and a pass ball.

Boccabella Belts 2 Homers in Inning

Catcher John Boccabella, according to Montreal Manager Gene Mauch, "exerts a quiet kind of leadership over our pitching staff."

His dominance of Houston's pitching staff, though, was totally unsettling Friday night.

Boccabella became the 18th man in the history of major league baseball to hit two home runs in one inning when the Expos blasted Houston for eight runs in the sixth. He led off with a drive over the left field fence at Jarry Park, then hit a grand slam as Montreal belted the Astros 12-0. They won the second game 14-6.

Elsewhere in the National League, the Atlanta Braves blanked the New York Mets 2-0, the Cincinnati Reds defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 8-2, the Chicago Cubs beat the St. Louis Cardinals 8-5, the Los Angeles Dodgers edged the Pittsburgh Pirates 3-2 and the St. Louis Cardinals trimmed the San Francisco Giants 3-2.

Atlanta's Ron Schueler held the Mets hitless until the ninth inning in posting his first major league shutout. Singles by Ron

Hodges and Felix Millan ruined the no-hit bid. Home runs by Bobby Toian, Tony Perez and Bill Plummer powered the Reds over the Phillies before a record Veterans Stadium crowd of 58,294. Toian added an RBI single. Fred Norman, 6-8, won his fifth victory in his last six decisions.

Chicago's Rick Monday, with some help from San Diego's Pat Corrales, drove in six runs with a grand-slam and a two-run single to help the Cubs. Corrales dropped Monday's pop foul with the bases loaded in the fifth inning, and Monday used the reprieve to drive his 21st homer of the season over the right field fence.

A two-out double by Jose Cruz in the seventh inning drove in Joe Torre and Ted Simmons to carry St. Louis to victory. Bob Gibson pitched a seven-hitter for his 233rd career triumph. The decision tied Gibson with San Francisco's Juan Marichal as the winningest active pitcher.

Don Sutton carried a four-hit shutout into the ninth inning, then had to scramble for the victory as Pittsburgh scored twice with two outs. Manny Sanguillen drove in Al Oliver with a double, then Dave Cash scored Sanguillen with a single. But Sutton retired Reggie Stennett on a line drive to end the game.

Kansas City's Busby on Track Again, 12-1

Kansas City's Steve Busby and Jim Merritt of Texas are back on the track as starters while New York's unbeaten Fred Beene is back where he started—in the bullpen.

Busby, who has had his problems since he no-hit Detroit in April, got another shot at the Tigers Friday night and blanked them until the ninth as the Royals pounded out a 12-1 victory.

Merritt, who has been plagued with arm trouble since he won 20 games for Cincinnati in 1970, shut out Milwaukee after allowing two runs in the first inning and the Rangers rallied for a 5-2 triumph.

Beene made one of his rare starts and, although touched for 14 Minnesota hits, battled into the ninth inning before Sparky Lyle protected the Yankees' 5-2 win over the Twins.

"As far as I'm concerned, Beene is still a middle-inning reliever," said Yankee manager Ralph Houk.

Elsewhere in the American League, the Oakland A's downed the Baltimore Orioles 7-5 but dropped the nightcap 5-3, the Boston Red Sox beat the Chicago White Sox 4-2 and the Cleveland Indians nipped the California Angels 8-7 in 11 innings.

Amos Otis hit his 14th home run of the year and three singles and John Mayberry hit his 20th homer to pace a 20-hit Kansas City assault against Joe Coleman and two Detroit relievers.

Busby, 5-9, had dropped seven of nine decisions since his no-hitter. Merritt scattered eight hits against Milwaukee, including George Scott's two-run homer in the first inning. The Rangers rallied on a two-run homer by Jeff Burroughs and a solo shot by Bill Sudakis to hand the Brewers their 10th defeat in the last 12 games.

The Yankees rallied for five unearned runs off Minnesota's Jim Kaat in the eighth inning, the last three on a home run by designated hitter Jim Ray Hart.

Beene, 5-0, was helped by four double plays and also picked Rod Carew off first base. The Twins scored single runs in the second and fourth innings but got three singles in the first without scoring.

Merv Rottenmund and Enos Cabell rapped consecutive home runs off Oakland's Vida Blue in the seventh inning to give the Orioles a doubleheader split. The A's won the opener as Dick Green drove in four runs and Catfish Hunter won his eighth consecutive decision.

King Wins Title at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Billie Jean King, the defending champion from Long Beach, Calif., defeated Chris Evert of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., 6-0, 7-5 today in the Wimbledon women's singles tennis final.

Russia's Alex Metreveli later met Jan Kodes of Czechoslovakia to decide the Wimbledon men's singles title.

Miss Evert, after a disastrous first set in which she won only six points on Mrs. King's service, looked completely demoralized as she dropped her first service in the second set.

Billie Jean then took a 3-1 lead before Chris' game came together. She broke Mrs. King in the sixth game to level the set at 3-3, then held her own service to take a 4-3 advantage. Each player held service until Billie Jean broke Chris in the 11th game to go up 6-5.

She then served for and won the set 7-5 to claim the title—her fifth Wimbledon crown.

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TEACH YOURSELF TENNIS
3. Hitting the Forehand

The forehand stroke is one flowing motion which can be broken down into four components.

The Backswing: The player always starts from the ready position. The right shoulder and arms pivot while the head of the racket is brought slightly up and back. It remains perpendicular to the ground all the way and describes an arc until it points behind you.

The Approach: The left foot is placed forward toward the point of impact, and the left shoulder faces the net. The knees remain slightly bent and the weight rests mostly on the right foot.

The Hit: Now the weight is shifted slowly from the right foot to the left foot, moving the right shoulder toward the net. This shift weight continues through the moment of impact. The ball is hit when it is a little closer to the net than the left foot.

The Follow-through: The body weight is carried further until it rests on the left foot. The right foot serves for balance. The right shoulder follows the body with the weight of the body until the arm and racket point toward the top of the opponent's backstop.
