Unearned Runs Clip Tigers

Sports Glances

Two unearned runs in the sixth inning gave Denison an 8-6 win over Carroll Wednesday night at Carroll Stadium.

Denison had taken an early 3-0 lead, but the Tigers came back and knotted the score at 6-6 in a three-run Carroll fifth.

Carroll's first run in the fifth came from a Denison balk. The two other runs were forced in by bases on balls to Tom Reiman and Jeff Petersen. The three runs, plus three scored in the third frame, gave the Tigers a 6-6 tie and the bases loaded. There was one out.

The next two Carroll batters struck out, however, and the inning was over.

A base on balls and a stolen base placed a Denison player on second in the top of the sixth. A Carroll fielding error on Kim Lorenzen's infield grounder allowed Lorenzen to reach first and Ron Lechtenberg to score from second.

Lorenzen advanced to second on a stolen base and was driven home by a Mike Curnyn single. That gave Denison its 8-6 lead.

The Tigers couldn't manage a score in either the sixth or seventh. In fact, the only base runners Carroll had in the last two innings came via walks.

The first runs of the game came in the first at-bat for

Denison. Doug Wiebers slugged a double, followed by a walk to Pat Sullivan. A fielder's choice scored Wiebers and let Rollie Wiebers take first.

A long sacrifice fly to Eric Siemer in right field sent Sullivan and Rollie Wiebers across the plate to give the visitors a three-run advantage with Carroll yet to bat.

Carroll picked up a trio of runs in the third inning on five hits.

A single by Siemer drove in Tom Reiter and Reiman and a one-base hit by Ron Bernholtz scored Todd Buck. Also hitting in the inning were Todd Pettitt, Petersen and Reiter.

Carroll managed six hits for

the night, while the visitors got five.

The Tigers stranded 10 runners on the base paths. Denison left six on.

Todd Pettitt went six innings for the Tigers, but was relieved by Siemer in the seventh, the first time Coach Ted Edwards has used a reliever this season.

The loss dropped Carroll's record to 5-4, while Denison upped their mark to 6-3.

The Tigers will face Jefferson on the Carroll diamond Friday night at 8:00. Carroll will take a 2-1 league mark into the Midwest Conference affair.

No-Hit Job by Royals' Busby

George Scott ruined a perfectly good evening for Steve Busby Wednesday night.

The Milwaukee first baseman walked on a 3-2 count. Busby's rare moment of imperfection, and thus spoiled a perfect game by the Kansas City pitcher.

Scott was the only baserunner Busby allowed during a 2-0 no-hitter, first of the 1974 baseball season and the second of his brief career.

"I didn't make a whole lot of bad pitches and made them hit the ball," said Busby, who received excellent fielding support en route to his beauty.

Two catches by right fielder Al Cowens and a sparkling play by second baseman Cookie Rojas preserved the no-hitter.

With one out in the second inning, Darrell Porter hit a long drive to right center which Cowens snared on the run. With two out in the fourth, Cowens raced into the same territory to flag down a drive by Scott. With two out in the eighth, Bob Hansen hit a hard ground ball headed toward

right field, but Rojas intercepted it with a diving, whirl-and-throw play.

"That was the play that made the whole game," said Busby. "That was super. I can't recall him doing that since I've been here with this club, diving for a ball that far from him and coming up with it."

Busby, who pitched a no-hitter against Detroit as a rookie last year, thought Wednesday night's game was better.

In the other American League games, the Texas Rangers beat the Detroit Tigers 4-2 in 11 innings; the Baltimore Orioles nipped the Minnesota Twins 6-5; the Chicago White Sox pounded the Cleveland Indians 15-4; the New York Yankees trimmed the California Angels 2-1 and the Boston Red Sox nipped the Oakland A's 2-1 in 11 innings.

Ed Brinkman knocked in the tie-breaking run with an 11th-inning double, pushing Detroit over Texas.

Orioles 6, Twins 5

Brooks Robinson drove in

three runs and Earl Williams drove in two, leading Baltimore over Minnesota. Winner Dave McNally, 6-5, had a one-hitter until the Twins scored in the seventh on a double by Steve Brye.

White Sox 15, Indians 4

A seven-run seventh inning, triggered by Dick Allen's two-run homer, powered Chicago over Cleveland.

Red Sox 2, A's 1

Bob Montgomery's bases-loaded sacrifice fly in the 11th inning gave Boston its victory over Oakland.

Yankees 2, Angels 1

George Medich shackled California on seven hits and Chris Chambliss doubled to drive in the winning run in New York's victory over the Angels.

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)—Iowa girls high school basketball teams will not be divided into classes for the 1974-75 season, says a high school basketball official.

But there will be some minor rules changes, said Wayne Cooley, executive secretary of the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union.

The board of directors voted Wednesday to eliminate stalling by guards—in the backcourt of play—effective when the high school schedules begin in November, said Cooley.

When the officials decide a team is beginning to stall in the backcourt they can warn the guards. They then will have 10 seconds to advance the ball to the forward court, he said.

Once the ball is in the forward court, Cooley said, the offense cannot throw the ball back to the backcourt.
