**COUNCIL BLUFFS** — Kuemper stayed alive in the Lewis Central Baseball Tournament here Friday night by whipping Woodbine, 7-2, in the double-elimination meet.

The Knights, now 1-1 in the tourney, can stay alive in the tourney if they can beat the loser of the St. Albert-Abraham Lincoln Council Bluffs game here today at 4 p.m. on the Lewis Central diamond.

Kuemper got a good pitching performance out of Alan Kohorst as the righthander scattered five hits and struck out four. Both runs scored off him were unearned.

The Knights banged out 10 hits off southpaw Dennis Elwain with Russ Rupiper and Mike Gute leading the way with two hits each. Gute was the big star as he collected a double and a triple.

Woodbine, now eliminated from the tournament and 7-8 overall, grabbed a 1-0 lead in the second as Joe Book led off with a single and took second

as the ball got by leftfielder Tom Nurse.

Then Ron Kenkel lined a bad hop single past shortstop Gute to make it 1-0.

Kuemper finally got going in the fourth as they erupted for five runs on five hits. They also had some help from Woodbine as the losers committed four errors in the inning.

Phil Baldus led off the inning and reached base on an error. Gute then tripled to right center to knot the score at 1-1.

Tom Nurse then slammed a single to left and Kuemper was in the lead for good at 2-1.

Catcher Joe Roetker, batting next, drilled a double to left center putting runners at second and third.

John Heithoff then singled to score Nurse and it was 3-1. A wild pickoff attempt brought home Roetker and the fifth run came around on a single by Larry McLellan.

The Knights added single runs in the fifth and sixth innings to make it 7-1.

In the fifth, Gute led off with a bloop double, but was out at the plate as he tried to score on an infield error.

As Gute was trying to score, Nurse went all the way to third on the error. He scored moments later on an infield hit by Joe Roetker.

Kuemper's final run in the sixth scored as Russ Rupiper singled with one out. He went to third base on a wild pickoff attempt at first and came home on a wild pitch.

Woodbine made it 7-2 in the bottom of the sixth as McElwain reached on an error and scored later on another error and a fielder's choice.

# Carroll Falters, 8-0

Friday night belonged to Jefferson pitcher Chris Blackburn as he tossed a two-hit game, scored a pair of runs and batted in two more in an 8-0 shutout of Carroll High.

The game on Carroll's home diamond was the first time this season the Tigers have been blanked.

Blackburn fanned eight batters and walked five in his complete game, facing 28 batters.

After two scoreless innings, the Rams took a 1-0 lead in the third on one hit. Another run came in the fourth on a couple hits and a third run crossed in the fifth to give the visitors a 3-0 margin to work with.

Four Tiger errors in the sixth frame let four unearned runs to cross the plate and handed the Rams a 7-0 lead and complete command of the game.

The first four Jefferson batters in the sixth reached

first because of Carroll errors. The first run scored on an error and the next two came off the bat of Blackburn, who lashed a single. Bob Tuhn accounted for another tally with another single.

Jefferson piled three hits together to score another run in the seventh to finalize the score at 8-0.

The loss dropped Coach Ted Edwards' club to 5-5 overall on the year and 2-2 in Midwest Conference action. The Rams are 6-5 and 2-2.

The Tigers will try to rebound from the loss Wednesday at 8 p.m. at Perry in a league contest.

Lonnie Lehrkamp started the game on the mound for the Tigers, but tired in the fifth. Eric Siemer then took to the hill.

Last year the rallying cry was "You gotta believe!" But now, the New York Mets' chant might as well be, "You wouldn't believe."

The defending National League champions, currently residing in the Eastern basement, took on Philadelphia Friday night. The Phillies, who owned the cellar a year ago, now have the keys to the penthouse.

The Mets, for the most part, played liked they belonged ex-

actly where they are. They put on a show reminiscent of the Keystone Kops — or at least the Mets of a decade ago — making five errors, including three in one inning.

What was really funny, though, was that, despite all the unscheduled clowning around, the Mets still managed to win 3-1.

In Friday's other National League games, Chicago edged Pittsburgh 3-2, Atlanta nipped Cincinnati 1-0, Houston topped San Diego 2-0, Los Angeles

downed San Francisco 4-3 and St. Louis beat Montreal 5-1.

Jerry Morales' game-tying homer in the fourth inning and tie-breaking single in the seventh carried the Cubs past Pittsburgh. Don Kessinger led off with a single, continued to second when Willie Stargell fumbled the ball, then Rick Monday walked before Morales lined his single to center field. Jose Cardenal added what proved to be the winning run with a sacrifice fly.

Ken Henderson crashed two home runs and drove in six runs and Carlos May delivered five hits as the White Sox unloaded a 21-hit attack, equaling the all-time record against Minnesota pitching. The White Sox had 21 hits in a 1967 game against the Twins.

# Conservation Unit Eligible For \$675,000

**DES MOINES** — The Iowa Conservation Commission will be eligible to receive a preliminary apportionment of \$675,000 from the federal government on July 1 for funding fish and wildlife restoration projects. The funds are part of the Federal Aid in Fish and Wildlife Restoration programs.

The U.S. Department of the Interior's preliminary report indicates that under the Dingell-Johnson (D-J) Act, which is the fish restoration phase of the program, Iowa will be apportioned approximately \$138,000. Pittman-Robertson (P-R) Act funds, those in the wildlife restoration phase of the program, will come to approximately \$498,000. An additional \$39,000 will be allocated for the state's hunter safety program.

Les Fleming, Superintendent of Grants-in-Aid for the Commission, said the fish and wildlife restoration funds in the preliminary report do not represent the total apportionment Iowa will receive. The total fiscal year allotment will be allocated after January 1, 1975.

According to the preliminary report of D-J and P-R funds, Iowa's share is 1.7 per cent of the \$37,550,000 destined for the various states. These monies are distributed to the states based upon the number of fishing and hunting license holders and the total land area of each state.

P-R and D-J funds are derived from the federal excise tax on firearms and fishing tackle, respectively.

# Harkin Urges Action for Cattlefeeders

Tom Harkin, the Democratic candidate for U.S. Congress in the Fifth District, declaring that "disastrous federal intervention in 1973" has created the worst beef market in ten years, today urged the government to take "sincere" steps to assist the beleaguered cattlefeeder industry.

Harkin, in a telegram to Secretary of Agriculture Earl Buttz, charged that government plans to purchase \$100 million of premium-grade hamburger beef for school lunch programs are "inadequate" and "reveal almost insulting indifference" to the plight of cattlemen.

"Government beef and red meat purchases are urgently needed," Harkin said, "but at realistic levels which can be real help to cattlemen."

Harkin called for federally guaranteed, low interest or no interest long-term loans to cattlefeeders, "some of whom are thousands of dollars in debt because of this crisis."

Harkin also called for a "crash program of Kissinger-type agricultural diplomacy to convince foreign nations to accept greater American beef exports."

"Price-gouging between the producer level and the consumer level, where it exists, must be ended," Harkin declared.

"There can be no doubt that the weird economic theories which lead to Phase IV last year completely ignored or misunderstood basic market psychology," Harkin charged, "and as a result cattlemen are now sitting on a surplus of over-fitting and under-valued beef, and are losing up to \$200 a head."

# May Store Omaha Sewage In Iowa

**COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa (AP)**—A Council Bluffs city official says he would recommend acceptance of a proposal, if offered by Omaha, Neb., officials, for a sewage treatment storage area in Iowa.

A proposal is reportedly underway to dig tunnels under the Missouri River for storage of Omaha sewage in Pottawatomie County.

An Omaha official has said the area in Iowa was recommended because of large, flat agricultural areas in the flood plain there.

Rod Phipps, Council Bluffs city planning director, said he considers the entire idea of a tunnel under the Missouri River a little outlandish but if it comes, the city should take advantage of it.

# No Pesticide Disposal Rules In Iowa

**AMES, Iowa (AP)**—Iowans are "part of a continuing national problem" when it comes to the safe disposal of unwanted pesticide, an extension entomologist said Friday.

"Like many states, Iowa has no guidelines for the safe disposal of unwanted pesticides and empty pesticide containers," said Steve Ryan of Iowa State University. "Federal guidelines appear impractical."

Ryan said getting rid of unneeded pesticides safely is a dilemma faced, for example, by "a chemical dealer with leading drums of World War II vintage DDT, a housewife with an illegal arsenic weedkiller and an Iowa farmer with partly solidified liquid rotoform insecticide."
