

Tigers Clip Denison, 5-4

DENISON — Carroll built up a 5-0 lead after the first three innings here Wednesday night then hung on for a 5-4 victory over Denison.

The victory evened the Tigers record at 2-2, while the Monarchs fell to 1-2. Denison got its first run in the fifth inning off of Carroll pitcher Lonnie Lehrkamp who went the distance on a three-hitter.

With one out, Pat Sullivan reached base on just one of two Tiger errors in the game. Two pass balls and Sullivan scored his team's first run.

Then in the seventh Denison made it uneasy for Lehrkamp and the Tigers as Mike Curnyn got on base on Carroll's second error of the night.

After Lehrkamp got Wiebers to ground out, Sullivan lined a single to make it 5-2.

Sullivan moved up to third on two pass balls and Steve Marsh walked to put runners at the corners.

After Lehrkamp got Bill Miller on a strikeout, his 11th of the game, Marsh stole second.

Then Ron Lechtenberg lined

a clean single to score Sullivan and Marsh to make it 5-4.

But the Tiger righthander stiffened and got Scott Jones to ground out to end the game.

The Tigers didn't waste any time getting to Monarch starting pitcher Scott Lingle.

Todd Buck, who was the Tigers' hitting star in the game by going three-for-four,

reached base on an error to start the game.

Buck moved to second on another error and went to third on a pass ball. He scored later on an infield hit by Eric Siemer to make it 1-0.

Carroll made it 4-0 in the second as Todd Pettitt and Larry Bock walked to start the inning.

After Lingle got Tom Reiter on strikes, Buck singled to right to load the bases.

Lehrkamp then helped his own cause by walking, forcing in a run to make it 2-0.

Then Ted Nam slammed a two-run double and it was 4-0.

The Tigers wrapped up their scoring in the third inning as Pettitt walked and came around on a triple to right by Buck.

Carroll threatened two more times in the game as they got runners on second and third in the sixth and seventh innings, but couldn't score.

In the sixth, Buck singled for his third hit of the game and went to third on a wild pickoff attempt.

Lehrkamp walked and moved to second on a ground out, but Denison relief pitcher

Tony Mullinger got out of a jam by getting Nam on a ground out and Pete Marz on a strikeout.

In the seventh, Siemer walked to start the inning. With Rick Beyer running for Siemer, Pettitt laced a single to left, putting runners at second and third with one out, but once again Mullinger got strong and got Bock and pinch hitter Kirk Wenck on strikeouts to end the inning.

The Tigers' next game is Friday night at 8 p.m. at Jefferson in a Midwest Conference opener for both clubs.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Woody Hayes, Ohio State University football coach, was admitted to University Hospital today and taken to the Coronary Care Unit.

Hospital officials refused to confirm Hayes, Ohio State's football coach for the last 24 years, had suffered a heart attack.

A hospital spokesman said, however, that the 61-year-old Hayes was "in guarded condition until such time as final diagnosis can be established."

Hayes, who has produced three national and nine conference championships, was at home when he became ill early this morning. He was admitted to the hospital at 8 a.m.

Cleveland Supplies The Fireworks

The fans left the fireworks to the baseball team in Cleveland Wednesday night. Home runs exploded at Municipal Stadium instead of people. It resulted in a 9-3 Cleveland victory over the Texas Rangers in relative peace and quiet.

"I really liked it when the fans stood up and cheered our boys when they hit their homers," noted Cleveland Manager Ken Aspromonte. "That's the kind of fans we want to come out and see us. They can enjoy our success with us. Those others, I don't ever want to see around."

I was a far more civilized scene than Tuesday night when their game was torn apart by a riot. Hundreds of fans, apparently hyped up by

"10-cent beer night," threw debris and flooded the field, chasing the players to cover. The Indians had to forfeit the game.

On Wednesday night, only about 8,000 persons showed up — about one-third of Tuesday night's audience. The public address announcer told them that fines would be levied if anyone ran on the playing field. And they cheered the announcement.

There were mostly cheers from then on, as Oscar Gamble and Dave Duncan hit three-run homers for the Indians in a seven-run sixth inning. The only boos throughout the entire evening came when Texas Manager Billy Martin walked to the mound to change a pitcher.

Vida Blue, 5-5, scattered four hits in seven innings for his fourth consecutive victory and fifth in his last six decisions.




