# Knights Club Carroll

Kuemper is alive today in the Midwest Conference Eastern Division title race, while Carroll is dead as the Knights clubbed the Tigers, 17-7, in five innings Monday night at Carroll Stadium.

The lopsided triumph left Kuemper 5-2 in conference play and they can gain a share of the league crown if it can beat Perry at home tonight.

Tigers are now 3-4 in loop action and have been eliminated mathematically. Had Ted Edwards' club won, they still would have had a chance of gaining a piece of the championship.

It wasn't exactly a pitcher's night, especially for the Tigers' Lonnie Lehrkamp as

he was battered for 14 hits. But Lehrkamp didn't receive much support as his

teammates committed nine errors, including five in a five-run Kuemper fourth.

Tom Nurse started on the mound for Lou Galetich's club, but was knocked out in the second inning after giving up five hits and five runs, but he did plenty of damage at the plate.

Nurse went four-for-four, collecting a two-run, 350-foot homer in the third inning to go along with a triple and two singles for four rbi's.

Teammates Phil Baldus, Mike Gute and John Heithoff each added two hits in the attack.

Righthander Tim Roetker came in to shut the Tigers down in the second after the losers had narrowed Kuemper's lead to 6-5.

He finished for Nurse, tossing one-hit ball over the final three and two-thirds innings, allowing two unearned runs, while fanning five to earn his second win against no losses.

Carroll grabbed the lead first in the wild game by scoring three runs in the top of the first.

A single by Lehrkamp and a triple by Ted Nam to deep centerfield scored the first run. A single to left by Todd Pettitt made it 2-0 and Larry Book's double made it 3-0.

But that was Carroll's last lead in the game as Kuemper erupted for six runs in their half of the first as a single to Baldus and a triple by Gute made it 3-1.

A single by Nurse and an overthrow scored Gute to make it 3-2 and a single by Joe Roetker tied things up.

Kuemper added three more runs with the help of two errors, a hit batsman, a walk and a single by Russ Ruppier.

Carroll battled back in the second, scoring two runs to cut the deficit to 6-5, but Kuemper then made it a rout by scoring three times in their second and third innings and adding five more in the fourth.

Carroll made it 17-7 in the fifth by scoring two runs with an infield hit, an error, a hit Kuemper. See Page 9

## Hole-in-One for Mackanos on Par Four Hole; Behn Also Gets Ace

George Mackanos, golf professional at the Carroll Country Club, scored a double-eagle, hole-in-one on the 355-yard par 4 fifth hole at the County Club Monday.

Earlier in the evening, Bus Behn scored a hole-in-one on the 150-yard par 3 eighth hole. Behn, whose playing partners were LeRoy Vonnahme, Dave Schroeder and Pat Lehman, used a six iron on his shot which came in the Monday Men's Supper League.

Mackanos was playing with Fred Dolezal and Dr. David McCoy.

Mackanos said he plans to measure the hole exactly and send the information to Golf Digest magazine, which serves as a clearing house for hole-in-one records. Mackanos feels the shot will have a good chance of being the longest hole-in-one recorded during 1974.

Golf Digest says the longest hole-in-one on record was by Robert Mitera on the 444-yard 10th hole at Miracle Hills Golf Course in Omaha on Oct. 7, 1965.

Art Wall holds the record for the most aces, with 41

recorded during his career. Wall is a former touring pro from Honedale, Pa.

Monday's shot was the fourth hole-in-one of Mackanos' career. Earlier this year he scored another hole-in-one with a 9 iron shot on a 200-yard par three hole. That shot came in the qualifying round for the Quad Cities Open at Crow Valley CC in Bettendorf.

Mackanos qualified for the event, a regular stop on the PGA tour. The event officially starts on Thursday, July 11.

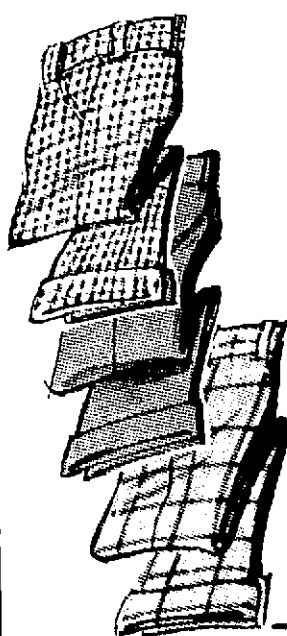

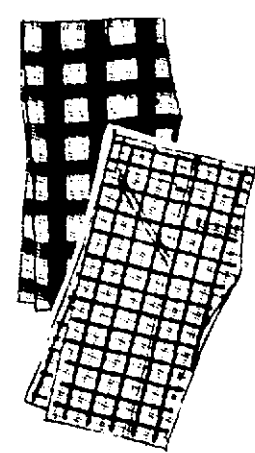

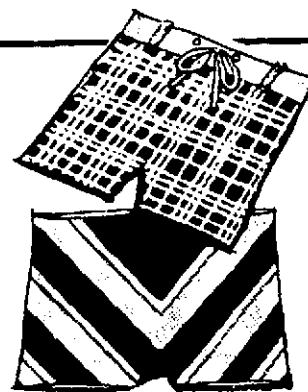
