Tigers Hit With 2 Losses

The Carroll Tigers suffered two losses over the weekend as their season record plunged from 5-1 to 5-3.

Lake City, a 7-3 victim of the Tigers in the two teams' first game earlier this season, held off a Tiger rally Friday night to hand Carroll a 5-4 loss. Saturday night Carroll suffered a 12-2 beating in six innings at Jefferson.

The Tigers put on an 11th-hour rally Friday night, but fell short as the Eagles put Dave McIntire on the mound in the seventh inning to put the brakes on Carroll.

McIntire came in with runners on first and third and two outs. The Eagle, who was moved from third base, forced

Brad Edwards to ground out to end the game.

Starting pitcher Jay Yunek got himself in trouble earlier in the seventh after giving up a pair of singles to Todd Buck and Lonny Lehrkamp and walking two batters. At one point, Yunek had thrown seven consecutive balls. That's when McIntire came in.

Lake City jumped to a 4-0 lead in the first inning as Dan Conrad belted a double off Tiger pitcher Todd Pettitt and Larry McCauley tagged a single.

The Eagle's fifth runs came in the fourth as Eric Siemer, Pettitt and Tom Reiman each singled. Two tiger runs scored

in the seventh inning as the Eagles committed two infield errors.

Carroll was plagued with errors in their match-up with Jefferson Saturday as the Rams roughed up the Tigers in a game called in the sixth inning on the 10-run rule.

The Tigers committed nine errors in the Saturday game, and allowed six Jefferson runs to score on errors.

Carroll coach Ted Edwards said after the Rams scored their twelfth run that "Carroll High baseball players don't take baseball too seriously."

The dejected Edwards continued, "it seems that once our players are out of Senior Little League they have no desire to improve."

But Edwards praised pitcher Eric Siemer who allowed seven hits and stroked two doubles in his first two times at bat. "I thought Siemer did a heck-of-a-job tonight," Edwards added.

Jefferson pitcher Nick Wand, who went the distance for the Rams, held Carroll to four hits as the Rams' record went to 7-2.

The Rams scored one run in the first inning, two in the third, four in the fifth and five in the sixth. Ten of the runs were unearned.

Carroll scored in the fourth inning as Siemer doubled to left center field and came in on a single by Edwards.

The Tigers' second run came in the sixth inning as Ron Bernholtz singled to left field and went to second on an error, while Lehrkamp reached first on a fielder's choice. Two consecutive walks to Edwards and Jim Molitor scored Bernholtz.

Carroll meets cross-town rival, Kuemper, in an 8 p.m. contest tonight (Monday) at the Carroll Stadium.

Wednesday the Tigers meet the Rams again in an 8 p.m. game at the Carroll Stadium.

Ed Figueroa figured wrong. "When I found out last night that Fergie Jenkins would be pitching for Texas, I told my wife that it would be a tough game," said the California right-hander who proved tougher than Jenkins Sunday.

Not that Fergie pitched a bad game, losing a nine-hit shutout on an unearned California run. But Figueroa was seven hits and one run better than his veteran opponent, and that meant a 1-0 Angels triumph over the Rangers.

He was shaken somewhat in the ninth inning, however, when a mistake nearly meant trouble. Roy Smalley led off with a single, and two outs later, Figueroa had walked the bases loaded. His 3-2 pitch to Jeff Burroughs was launched towards the alley in left-center field, where Morris Nettles patrolled.

"I just said to myself, 'Mo,

get going," said Figueroa, who watched Nettles speed over and surround the last out.

"I was kind of expecting an alley shot," said Nettles. "I got a good jump on the ball and I knew it was mine all the time."

Obviously, he figured right.

Elsewhere in the American League, Oakland swept a doubleheader from Kansas City 7-6 in 12 innings and 8-1. Baltimore beat Boston 3-0 then dropped the nightcap 5-1. Chicago swept Minnesota 6-5 in 10 innings and 9-2. New York trimmed Detroit 5-3, and Cleveland edged Milwaukee 3-2 in 10 innings.

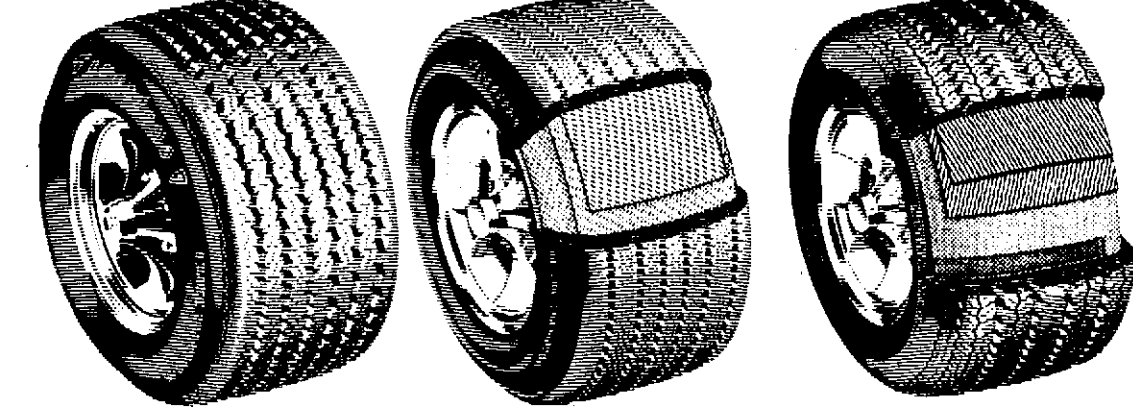
