

Tigers Beat Knights Third Time

DENISON — The third time wasn't the charm for Kumper here Sunday night as cross-town rival Carroll beat the Knights for the third time this season, 4-2, to take consolation honors in the Monarch Invitational baseball tournament.

The game was shortened to five innings because the Carroll squad was in downtown Denison eating at 6 p.m. when the third-place game was scheduled to start.

According to Denison baseball Coach Joel Franken, there was a communication error on when the game would start.

Gary Luchtel's two-run single in the fourth proved to be the winning hit for the

Tigers, now 21-3 and who face 20-4 St. Bernard of Breda at 8 p.m. tonight at Carroll Stadium in a first round Class A sectional tournament clash.

Luchtel's hit in the fourth off of losing pitcher Kirk Lengeling gave Carroll a 3-2 lead.

His hit drove in Jerry Hamers who had walked and Mark Steffes who had singled.

Carroll got an insurance run later in the frame when Jim Petersen's ground out drove in Jim Molitor who had earlier reached on an error.

Carroll sent 11 men to the plate in the fifth, scoring their seven runs on just two hits.

In the big frame, the Tigers were aided by five walks and an error.

Getting run-scoring hits were Jim Petersen and Eric Siemer, both wind-blown singles.

Jim Molitor's bunt in front of home plate broke a 5-5 tie

up one hit and striking out four in the final two innings.

Carroll got insurance runs in the sixth as Brad Edwards scored from third on a wild pick off attempt at first and Mark Steffes blooped a single to score Siemer.

Todd Pettitt went the first five innings to post his 10th victory without a loss.

He allowed four hits and fanned six.

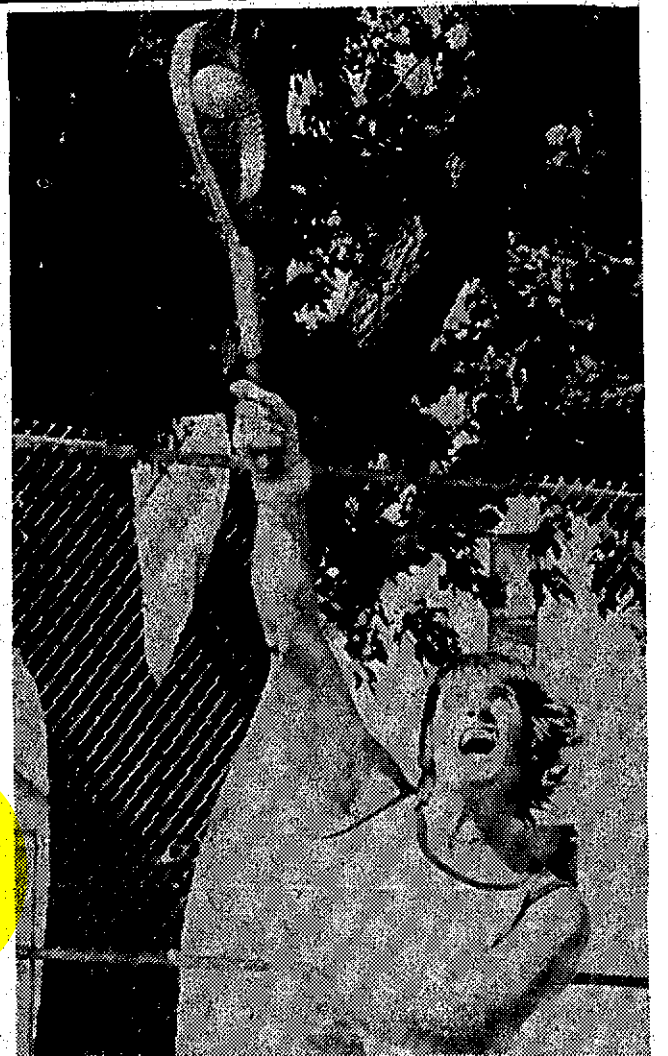
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Returns Shot —

DENISON — Denison held off Carroll here Sunday afternoon, 4-3, to advance to the championship game of their own invitational.

The Tigers threatened in the bottom of the seventh as Eric Siemer singled with two outs and moved to third on Dan Volk's single to right.

But Monarch lefty Pat Millea fanned Mark Steffes to end the game.

Carroll jumped to a 1-0 lead in the first as Siemer singled home Todd Buck who had earlier singled.

Denison then took a 2-1 lead after three innings on single runs in the second and third frames.

The Tigers knotted the game in their third as Jerry Hamers' singled home Buck.

The Monarchs, who managed just three hits off of Siemer, took a 3-2 lead in the fourth on Greg Steele's single and made it 4-2 in the fifth as Pat Sullivan scored on a pass ball.

Rusty Staub's two-out, 12th-inning single scored John Wockenfuss and gave Detroit its victory. Wockenfuss had walked and advanced to third on successive sacrifice bunts.

John Hiller, 8-4, got the victory in relief, while Steve Mingori, 3-1, was tagged with the loss.

The Royals had tied the game in the seventh inning with three runs.

The Tigers' Aurelio Rodriguez got his sixth homer of the year, a two-run blast, in the fourth inning.

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Three-Hitter for Yanks' Figueroa

Ed Figueroa will spend the All-Star break with his family this year, but he knows his time is coming.

After firing a three-hit shut-out Sunday in New York's 5-0 victory over the Chicago White Sox, Figueroa reflected on his role with the Yankees and his own stature in baseball.

"It is my second year in the big leagues," said 27-year-old native of Puerto Rico. "I just want to win my games. Then next year I have the name. Maybe I can win 20 games with this club."

"Last year I had only seven wins before the All-Star Game. This year I have 10," said Figueroa, 10-6, the third Yankee pitcher to win 10 games before midseason. The other two are Catfish Hunter and Dock Ellis.

In other American League games, Detroit nipped Kansas City 6-5 in 12 innings. Boston defeated Minnesota 6-4, Baltimore beat California 3-1. Oakland

fore giving way to Jim Willoughby in the ninth. Denny Doyle had a two-run single in the third for Boston, which evened its record at 40-40 going into the All-Star Game.

Orioles 3, Angels 1

Reggie Jackson blasted a two-run homer off Nolan Ryan and Dave Pagan, in his first start for Baltimore since being traded from the Yankees in June, earned his second victory in five decisions this season.

Ryan, 7-10, was the loser, despite striking out 12, as he walked five and allowed nine hits. It was the sixth time this season and the 77th in his career that Ryan has fanned 10 or more batters in a game.

A's 9, Indians 3

Bill North drove in two runs, scored three more and extended his league-leading stolen-bases mark to 42 with a single swipe in Oakland's victory. The A's have won seven of their past eight games.

Winning pitcher Paul Mitchell, 5-5, got relief help from Paul Lindblad, who gave up just one hit and held Cleveland scoreless for the final 3 2-3 innings. The loser was Dennis Eckersley, 4-8.

Brewers 6-5, Rangers 3-4

Hank Aaron homered in the 10th inning to give Milwaukee a sweep of its doubleheader with Texas and a sweep of their five-game series. The Rangers now have lost six in a row.

Aaron's 340-foot homer into the left field stands was his ninth of the season and 754th of his career.

Milwaukee tied the nightcap 4-4 in the ninth on run-scoring singles by Bernie Carbo, who

Soybean yield could increase up to 30% if hybrid experimentation now underway proves successful. And prospects look good! Agricultural scientists have been trying unsuccessfully for years to develop a commercial hybrid soybean. Because of the bud structure of the soybean the plant has always been self-pollinating. But the only way to get a hybrid seed is by cross-pollinating two different strains of the same plant. Researchers trying to overcome the problem have bred two strains of a natural soybean plant to produce loosely bound buds. Loose enough, in fact, to be penetrated by leaf-eater bees. The bees then carry pollen from one strain to another. Of course, bees cannot pollinate every plant, but hybrid seeds are different in size from natural seeds, and mechanical sorting may be possible.
