

DETROIT (AP) - George Steinbrenner, owner of the New York Yankees, denied today he has fired Manager Billy Martin.

"There's nothing happening. Martin hasn't been fired," Steinbrenner told The Associated Press from his hotel room here. And he said he had no plans to call any news conferences or makes any announcements.

Martin expressed surprise at Steinbrenner's presence in Detroit. When asked if he thought he might be fired, he replied: "Not to my knowledge.'



There are a lot of steps you can take to reduce energy consumption around the house that won't cost you a cent - or are very inexpensive considering the eventual savings over time.

For example, if you have a dishwasher, don't run it until it's completely full. You'll save on hot water — and the energy it takes to heat that water.

Get family members in the habit of taking quick showers, instead of tub baths, to save even more on the amount of energy you use to

provide that hot water.

A piece of vapor barrier type plastic placed underneath the cover plate of wall switches and plug-ins will help keep outside heat from filtering into your home during the summer . . . or cold air from blowing in during the winter.

Be careful not to wrinkle the plastic when replacing the cover. Then, trim around the edge of the plate to finish

Since plastic is a nonconductor, you can plug an appliance in right through it. Another simple way to block some of the heat out of your house in the summer is to keep shades and curtains drawn or blinds closed on windows during the day when they are exposed to direct sunlight.

In your home is air conditioned, leave storm doors and windows on year 'round. Or put them back on during the hottest part of the summer - especially on those windows that will seldom be opened.

Air leakage around window air conditioners is a frequent cause of wasted energy. Put heavy plastic or foam weatherstripping completely around the unit to seal any places where hot outside air could seep in.

You might also think about having an automatic, clockoperated "turn down" installed on your furnace thermostat before the heating season starts next fall.

If your house is vacant during working hours, the type of clock-operated thermostat that offers four settings (2 higher and 2 lower) would give by far the greatest savings.


