McGinnis, the 6-foot-8 All-Star forward of the Philadelphia 76ers, has been absolutely awful in the current National Basketball Association playoff finals against the Portland Trail Blazers.

On offense he has shot just 33 per cent from the field and scored a méager 9.8 points per game. On defense, he has been unable to contain Portland's Maurice Lucas, the only forward in the game who ranks on a par with McGinnis and is solidifying his position with this series.
