nati Reds. The 31-year-old Bowa was always noted as a fine-fielding shortstop and a light hitter. But Wednesday night he smacked the first grand slam homer of his career, went 4-for-4, with four runs scored as the Phillies outslugged the

Reds, 15-9. 'Besides getting to the big leagues, it was my greatest thrill," said Bowa. "It was the first homer I've hit that I knew was out. I can't explain the feeling in my body as I went around the bases.

Bowa's blast came off Joe Hoerner in the seventh inning of the slugfest.

"I threw up my hands as I went around the bases," said Bowa, who has hit four home runs this season after socking just four in his first eight seasons as a Philly.

"It was the first grand slam hit off me in my 21-year career," said, Hoerner, the 40year-old Cincinnati reliever. 'He hit the heck out of it. It, was just a bad pitch. I'm not making any excuses, but my hand hit my knee as I threw.'




